Game Commission Itemizes Report On Deer Prospects

PORTLAND (UPI)—The weekly report on deer hunting conditions prepared by the State Game Commission:

Northwest: Prospects good for deer in north coastal district, prospects fair to good in most popular North Willamette hunting areas; Lane County prospects good with deer in excellent condition.

Southwest: Best bet for big buck in Douglas County will be northern edge of Dixon unit and eastern corner of Tioga unit; Coos and Curry prospects good; Jackson and Josephine counties appear to be good prospects with deer plentiful.

Central: Wasco unit conditions should be good with roads in good shape; majority of deer are found at higher elevations; hunters in the Deschutes forest should find better luck generally in well-covered terrain; in Ochoco County deer fairly well distributed over

entire forest; do not expect to find many deer in the open, dry or yellow pine areas.

Northeast: Hunting conditions good for opening weekend throughout region; hunters in Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler counties will find deer scattered; Uklahoma area should be good; recent

storms dropped some snow around the 7,000-foot level; deer number down from past few years in Walla Walla County, but good populations remain.

Southeast: Deer prospects generally fair throughout Lake, Harney and Malheur counties; roads presently in good shape.

Full Schedule Slated For County Loop Action

The Chiloquin Panthers and the Malin Mustangs kickoff the weekend gridiron action in the County League at 7:30 tonight under the lights at Henley.

Coach Carlyle Stuart has revamped his lineup somewhat but looks forward optimistically to the Honker clash.

However, Stuart indicated his squad is ready for the clash and that he will probably start an offensive lineup that includes Rick Steber and Bill Newlan at ends, Greg Williams and Roger Jacob at tackles, Robert Hanks and Don Schme at guards and Gene Pennington, center.

Bill Steber will start at quarter, with Rod Pfeiffer at left half, Ernie Nichols at right and Neil Todell at fullback.

He indicated that Clyde McDonald, Don Schreiner and Ch-

On defense, Larry Mitchell, Zeke McWilliams, Ed Fernlund and Lynn Brotherton come in to team up with the two Stebers, Todell, Jacob, Pfeiffer and Schme. The Antlers lost to Merrill 40 to 21 in their last outing, but after spotting Merrill 19 points in the first five minutes, played them on even terms over the remaining distance.

Tulake was defeated earlier by Merrill, but rolled back last week to score a rousing win over Chiloquin.

Hydroplanes Test Course

STATELINE, Nev. (UPI)—Three unlimited hydroplanes zipped over Lake Tahoe Wednesday in test runs preparatory to Sunday's \$25,000 Tahoe Regatta.

Eight boats were in the pits and four were en route to the race which will determine the national point championship for both boats and drivers.

Although the course was opened for qualifying runs Wednesday, drivers and mechanics devoted their time to tuning the engines to the approximately 6,000-foot altitude here. The best Tahoe Miss, owned by William Harrah, gambler-sportsman who is the race sponsor, turned in test lap speeds of 105 and 108 miles per hour. The Eagle Electric of Spokane churned over the course at 104.2 mph and the Bill of Lampoc, Calif., posted 103 mph.

To qualify for the race, boats must tour three laps at an average speed of 90 mph.

Owls Optimistic For Victory Over Weber Wildcats

The camp of the Oregon Tech Owls is smiling. Instead of being stamped with the mark of defeat as the result of their 14 to 12 opening defeat at the hands of the Seattle Ramblers Saturday night, the Owl camp is taking pride in the bright spots that emerged in their opener.

Despite an opposing line that looked more like seven Sherman tanks than football players, the Owls' Bob Battle managed to come up with a net of 26 yards every time he packed the pigskin. Battle was disappointed at the

effort and felt he should have about an eight-yard-per-carry average but against the ponderous Rambler line his showing was excellent.

The Owl coaching staff was extremely pleased with the overall team performance and hesitated to pick out any individual stars, although admitting that pint-sized Mike Glines had more than exceeded their expectations with his calm, cool and collected direction of the club.

Glines took to the air on 19 plays, connecting on eight of them for 64 yards and an eight-yard

average. He was given excellent protection and picked his targets carefully.

He also turned in the best rushing statistics for the Owls, carrying six times for 25 yards net, an average of 4.2 yards per carry. Again, in this department, too, he exceeded hopes held out for him.

Sonny Luke was pinned down much of the night by the alert and highly experienced Rambler defenders, but still packed the ball nine times for a net 17 yards. He shone in the aerial department where he pulled in

four of Glines' aeriels for 25 big yards. Claude Shipp, former San Francisco star, added another bright spot to the Owl hopes as he ripped out 20 yards in nine carries to take up part of the ground attack for the Owls.

A large share of the coaching staff praise was reserved for the 11 freshmen who make up the defensive alignment. This block of rocks held the Rambler offense in check and turned the game into a bruising rock-em-sock-em duel. Saturday night, the Owls face

another major assignment as they play host to the Wildcats of Weber State of Ogden, Utah.

Weber turned in its second straight victory of the season last Saturday, a 40 to 32 victory of the Red Raiders of Southern Oregon.

The Wildcats opened their season two weeks ago with a convincing victory over Eastern Montana at Billings.

Weber operates from both the multiple-T and single wing-offense and is playing its first season as a member of the important Big Sky Athletic Conference.

The Wildcat line is tough, but a far cry from the blocks of beef that the Owls faced Saturday night in Seattle. The Weber backfield average outweighs the line. Frank Kaa at left half tips the scales at 225, right half Dick Pruitt at 202 and fullback Frank Bentley at 200.

The backfield averages an even 200 and the line 194. Coach Ron Pfeister keyed the Owl attitude for this weekend's game when he remarked, "We've shaken the kinks out, now we're ready to go Wildcat hunting."

Casey Stengel had some real bad news today for his old buddy, Ralph Houk, and he boiled it down to two words — Sandy Koufax.

"The fella is positively amazing and it almost takes a miracle to beat him," Stengel said of Koufax.

Casey was an eye-witness to Koufax' wizardry Wednesday night when the Dodger ace turned up for his opening game World Series assignment by picking up his 25th victory and lowering his earned run average to 1.88 in a 1-0 decision over the Mets.

Sandy pitched only five innings but struck out eight to run his season total to 306. Already the National League record holder for strikeouts, Koufax also became the fourth major league pitcher ever to strike out more than 300 batters in a single season.

The only others to have done so previously were Rube Waddell of the Philadelphia A's, Walter Johnson of the Washington Senators and Bob Feller of the Cleveland Indians.

Run Unearned

The Dodgers scored the only run of the game, an unearned one, off luckless Roger Craig in the first inning.

Wally Moon scored from third base when Craig threw wild trying to pick Tommy Davis off first. Craig's error resulted in his 22nd defeat of the season compared with five victories.

Warren Spahn won his 22nd game and the 340th of his career in pitching Milwaukee to a 9-5 triumph over Cincinnati. A. R. Mahaffey, making his first appearance since being injured on July 31, was credited with Philadelphia's 6-4 win over San Francisco; Houston was held to four hits by Tommie Sick but still beat Pittsburgh, 2-1, and St. Louis snapped a six-game losing

Baltimore beat Chicago, 10-2; New York upended Los Angeles, 3-1; and Washington defeated Detroit, 6-2, in other American League games. Cleveland and Minnesota were not scheduled.

It was in '55 that the A's finished fifth following their move to the Midwest from Philadelphia. But since then, it's been one long season after another.

That's why the seventh-place finish seems so important to the A's. They have four games left in which to achieve their goal compared with only two remaining for the Red Sox.

The A's won Wednesday's game by coming from behind, trailing 5-2, the A's scored four runs in the sixth and added the winning run in the seventh on Jerry Lampe's infield hit, Norm

Stars Feted At Spokane

SPOKANE (UPI)—Twelve athletes who helped put the Inland Empire on the sports map during the past 60 years were honored Wednesday as charter members of the Inland Empire Sports Hall of Fame.

Al Williams, chairman of the Greater Spokane Sports Association subcommittee in charge of the project said the six living members of the charter honor roll will receive plaques Oct. 5 during the halftime of the Washington State — Arizona football game here.

The living charter members are Mel Hein, All America football lineman for Washington State and later a pro-great; Tony Canadeo, Gonzaga University football star and later star halfback with the Green Bay Packers; Greg Rice, Missoula, Mont., high school miler who went on to become NCAA two mile champ for two years at Notre Dame; golfer Marvin Bud Ward; Houston Stockton, Gonzaga football star of the early 1920s; and jockey Albert N. John, who rode winners in the Kentucky Derby in 1922 and 1926.

Those honored posthumously are Alex Arcasa, who starred in football at Carlisle with Jim Thorpe; baseball stars Leon Canadeo and Edward Arthur Brandt; boxer Tiger Jack Fox; Washington State pint-sized football star Butch Meeker; and Whitman football great of 1906-1909, Nig Borleske.

A rundown of the present whereabouts of the living charter members shows Hein is on the coaching staff of the University of Southern California. Canadeo is a Green Bay business executive. Ward is playing professional golf out of San Mateo, Calif. Rice is now a member of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Stockton is a Bremerton businessman, and Johnson currently trains horses in California.

Mets, Colts Beg For Player Help

CINCINNATI (UPI) — It's about time.

That summed up the reaction of officials of the New York Mets and Houston Colts when Warren Giles, president of the National League, announced Wednesday that he has called a meeting in Los Angeles Oct. 4 to determine what can be done to strengthen both clubs.

"It will be just an informal meeting," Giles said. "But I'm hopeful that something constructive will come out of it."

The Mets finished last in their first season in the expanded National League last season and have clinched the basement dwelling again this year. The Colts haven't done much better; they were eighth last year and will wind up ninth this season.

Both clubs spent \$2 million apiece in the expansion draft two years ago and claim they wound up with inferior talent. That's why they have appealed to Giles for help — any kind of help.

"Our attendance is being robbed," is the way manager Casey Stengel has described the plight of his club. He could be right. The Mets wound up with a home attendance of 1,094,000 this year although they have won only 50 games.

Houston's home attendance this year will barely climb over the 700,000 mark. Paul Richards, the Colts' general manager, appealed directly to Giles for help recently and was joined by the Mets' general manager, George Weiss.

During a recent league business meeting in Chicago, Weiss contacted several club officials and said he received encouragement. "They told me they felt some-

thing should be done to help us," Weiss revealed.

Weiss plans to appeal to the owners on the basis of good business sense. He has pointed out before that a better club in New York will bolster the prosperity of the entire league, especially when the Mets move into their new stadium next season.

Jet Racer Trial Set

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah (UPI) — Dr. Nathan Ostich planned to give his jet-powered racer a thorough checkup today before making another assault on the world land speed record.

Ostich's red and black "Flying Caduceus" failed to reach the world record of 407 miles per hour Wednesday because the car's J-47 turbo-jet engine simply wouldn't give maximum output.

The car clocked two runs which were both made at 359 m.p.h. In both instances the 54-year-old Los Angeles physician gave the car full throttle but the engine produced only 93 per cent power.

A quick check was made, and Ostich and his crew found the flow of fuel to the engine was obstructed. They diagnosed the trouble as a malfunctioning air fuel valve that feeds into the fuel valve.

New parts were flown from Los Angeles, and the confident doctor and crew hoped to have the car repaired and ready to go for another try at the record.

The Forty Niners weren't the only team with troubles. The Chicago Bears announced that John Johnson, a 6-foot-5, 260-pound tackle, will replace the injured Fred Williams when the Bears meet the Detroit Lions Sunday.

Williams suffered a severe shoulder separation in last week's encounter with Minnesota.

Two teams announced signings Wednesday. The Philadelphia Eagles signed free agent Bill Byrne, formerly of Boston College. Byrne, an offensive guard, came up with the Eagles as a rookie in 1962 but was injured before the season opened. He had another trial with the Eagles this season but was released last August.

The Washington Redskins signed guard Andy Cverko, who was just released by the Cleveland Browns. He will replace the injured Wiley Feagin. Cverko, in his fifth season, played at Northwestern.

In the American League, the news came from the commissioner's office, where Joe Foss said he expected his club owners to make a formal proposal for a playoff game with the National League.

Foss said there were indications the AFL "is closer to the NFL than at any time."
