

Giardello Title Shot Anticipated

TEANECK, N.J. (UPI) — A reported \$50,000 advance was expected to clear the way today for Dick Tiger's defense of the world middleweight crown against Joey Giardello at Atlantic City in November.

Tiger, of Nigeria, has consented to defend his 160-pound title against second-ranking contender Giardello of Cherry Hill, N.J., for a guarantee of \$100,000 — one-half of which must be placed in escrow now and the rest no later than one week before the fight.

A dozen of Giardello's Philadelphia admirers are raising the guarantee so that he can get a shot at the title, and they have notified representatives of the Garden State Sports Corporation (GSSC) that \$50,000 will be brought to GSSC headquarters in Teaneck today.

If the \$50,000 arrives as promised, officials of the GSSC and Tiger's co-manager, Jersey Jones, plan to go to Atlantic City Friday to make arrangements about leasing the 40,000-seat Atlantic City Convention Hall for a late-November date.

Henley Hosts Eagle Point In League Game

Coach Len Weber's Henley Hornets attempt to put their gridiron juggernaut back on the rails Friday night when they entertain Eagle Point in their opening Rogue Valley League conference outing.

Smarting from their surprising

loss at the hands of Mount Shasta last week, the Hornets have been double-timing defense and offense workouts in an effort to get the hitches out of their gridiron machinery.

Despite the fact that Eagle Point has been shutout in its two

games thus far, 39 to 0 to Brookings and 26 to 0 to the Grants Pass Jayvees, Weber is not taking the Printers lightly.

"We still figure they're tough," Weber said, adding, "last year was the first time in 15 years that we had beaten them, and

they'll arrive with blood in their eyes Friday night. We beat them 27-12 and, to my knowledge, that's the worst defeat they ever suffered in league play. They'll not forget that."

Special emphasis has been placed this week on the Henley attack with indications that some changes might be upcoming in the Henley signal-calling department Friday night.

Weber indicated that Bill Fisher would start at fullback, LaVoy Young at right half and Kim Hale at left. He added that Fred Rodriguez has also indicated he's ready to go at a halfback slot. Any one of three Hornets may get the call at quarterback, Steve Rand has been starting, but Weber said he had three quarterbacks and any one of the three might start. In addition to Rand, he named Gary Barker and Bob Lewis as ready for duty.

In the line Friday night, the Hornets will start with Elton Schroeder and Duane Larson at ends, Dick Johnson and John Riggs at tackles, although Dave Lindland might get a starting nomination here; Roger Vargo, Don Berry and Tony Vassallo all ready for action at guards and either Lyle Bergstrom or Bob Garrison at center.

"Our biggest job," the Henley

mentor said, "will be to stop big Bill Ayers, Eagle Point fullback. He's 5-10, weighs about 195 and hits like a truck." He also called attention to Dale Chamberlain, 145 wingback for Eagle Point, a speedster and a glue-fingered pass receiver.

Mike House handles the left half chores for the invaders, and Bob Colpitts the quarterback assignments. While Weber termed the opponent's backfield as inexperienced, he also called attention to the fact that only Ayers is a senior and he expects Eagle Point to get tougher as the season rolls by.

Of Eagle Point's starters, only Ayers and Dave Blair, a guard, are seniors.

Kickoff time at Henley Friday night will be 7:30 for this important league opener.

Deer Hunters Await Opening Of Deer Season On Saturday

It's "D" Day for deer hunters. The mass invasion of Oregon forests and range lands by some 260,000 hunters is all set for this weekend, Sept. 28. And without a doubt, most of these hunters will be there when the season opens at dawn on that day.

The quest for deer will continue straight through Oct. 20, with hunters holding unit permits eligible to take deer of either sex from Oct. 12 through the season within the units for which the permits are issued.

And how do the prospects appear? Good, says the game commission. Deer are there with populations on a par with last year in most areas, and down slightly in a few others.

On the west side of the Cascades best results should be in the coast range on the Willamette Valley side. The Cascades should also produce well, but again in the fringe areas adjacent to the Willamette Valley. Opportunities for big bucks await hunters in the hot spots the tree farms around Eugene, Springfield and Cottage Grove. The slopes around Fern Ridge through to Mary's Peak are excellent hunting choices.

Good populations of deer are reported throughout the southwest. Again in this country, hunters will do well to check the brushy bottom lands. Some cagey old bucks will be found in the dense brush patches.

East of the mountains, the Klamath country looks good, al-

though poor lawn crops for several areas may limit the number of forked horns available. The big bucks are there, but hunters may find young deer in short supply. Mid-central Oregon should produce well with the better locales around the Maury mountains, the Ochoco and Grizzly country. The Deschutes should be a good bet, especially if hunters get into the back country. As in the past, hunting pressure will keep individual hunter success down.

In Northeastern Oregon, the Sled Springs and Cheshin units should be top bets although Wallawa County throughout will produce excellent results. Keating, Catherine Creek, Baker and Beulah units should also produce a high take of deer.

The popular Tillamook burn is

expected to produce its share of fine bucks, although second growth fir now makes this country difficult to hunt. The oak and conifer ridges in the Polk area are a good bet along with the brushy slopes of the Alsea.

Almost anywhere in the south Willamette should yield good numbers of blacktails, with the hot spots the tree farms around Eugene, Springfield and Cottage Grove. The slopes around Fern Ridge through to Mary's Peak are excellent hunting choices.

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
