

Solons Eye Big Probe Of Boxing

NEW YORK (UPI) — A charge by the former special counsel to the Kefauver investigating committee that boxing is still the plaything of the underworld may lead to congressional action and the creation of a federal fight commissioner or commission.

Attorney John G. Bonomi of New York charged Thursday in a new documentary film that "many confederates and allies of Frankie Carbo still hold important positions in the boxing business."

Senator Kenneth B. Keating of New York suggested in the same documentary that federal control might be the answer to the game's problems and ex-heavyweight champion Jack Dempsey declared: "Boxing must have national control if it is to survive and avoid being outlawed."

The film was prepared by "Reader's Digest" magazine in conjunction with an article by Dempsey in the October issue entitled, "The Boxing Mess — And What To Do About It." The film was shown to sportswriters Thursday in Dempsey's Broadway restaurant.

Bonomi said that Carbo and his associates dominated boxing from 1949 to 1961 and that many of them are still in the sport. He did not elaborate.

Owl Outlook

The Oregon Tech Owls went back to the practice field today in an effort to revamp their running attack that looked limp on Saturday's season opener. The Owls bowed to the Seattle Ramblers 12-14. Even in defeat head coach Ron Pfeister was pleased with his yearling effort. Pfeister felt the Ore Tech defense composed primarily of freshmen, did an outstanding job of containing the free wheeling Rambler offense. However, the Owl offense failed to live up to pre-season expectations. The backfield found it difficult to find running room beyond their own line of scrimmage. The only back having a good game was marvelous Mike Glines, the frosh quarterback. Mike unfolded an aerial attack in the closing minutes that almost changed the score to the Owl side. Glines began the attack on the Owl 20-yard line and marched the home team to the Ramblers' 35 before time and loss of the ball halted the OTI squad.

Special praise should be extended Owl captain Ken Lenhardt. Lenhardt, usually an offensive guard for the Owls, expertly filled in when linebacker Vaughn Cartwright was injured early in the game. Even though he was going both ways Lenhardt played a tremendous ball game as he led the Owl defensive demons to a great moral victory over the more experienced Ramblers.

The Owls today are preparing for another rugged crew. They meet Weber College of Ogden Saturday at 8 p.m. on Modoc Field.

Weber is not a small school, with a student body of 5,000. The Ore Tech campus expects 900 this fall. Weber is a supported college and is a member of the new Big Sky Conference. This conference is composed of schools such as the University of Idaho, Idaho State and Montana State University. That is fairly "big time" company for the Owls.

Weber's roster looks like an ad for a travel agency. One third of its squad is from out of state. The Wildcats already have two victories this season. They triumphed over Eastern Montana and our old rival, Southern Oregon. SOC mentor Al Atkins calls the Weber Wildcats "an offensive side-show" and "the Humboldt State of Utah."

On the bright side, the Owl defense will put their strength against the Wildcats in an attempt to reduce the 'Cats' chances of scoring.

Weber State began its practice last spring. The Owls are prohibited from this pre-season session. Weber had three weeks of

All-Americans Perform In Owl-Weber Game

Local football fans will see a star-studded ball game Saturday night at Modoc Field when the Oregon Tech Owls take the field against the invading wildcats of Weber College of Ogden, Utah.

The Wildcats feature four men in their starting lineup who were dubbed All-Americans among the smaller colleges during 1962. Frank Kaaa and Lynn Smith pace the Weber backfield, and Ron Trussell and Lynn Foxley bolster the line. All four earned All-America praise during the past season.

The Owls, however, will not be exactly destitute along that line, either. They can lead with two backfield aces of the same All-America distinction in Bob Battle and Sonny Luke. Both men proved their ability under the toughest kind of fire last week against the Seattle Ramblers.

The job of trying to up their carrying averages may be a bit easier for both Luke and Battle this week because they won't have the ponderous line to face that they did last Saturday.

Against Seattle, they were facing a line that averaged somewhere between 225 and 230 pounds per man. The Weber line averages about 194.

In the bull charges of battle this could mean a big difference in yardage. Despite the beef of the Ramblers and their tremendous experience, Battle gained 2.5 yards per carry and is ranked as the sixth best rushing back in the OCC league statistics thus far.

Mike Glines and Vic Ventura round out the offensive starting backfield for the Owls. Ventura provides the blocking and Glines has sparked as quarterback.

He had a 421 percentage for aials last week when he completed eight of 19. Indications are that his passing arm may be an important factor in the Saturday night clash.

In addition, Glines proved his ability as a ball carrier when he carried six times for a gain of 27 yards.

Top leader in rushing in OCC play thus far is Frank Ellis of OCE who averaged 4.4 yards per carry, netting 84 yards in 19 carries. Bill Bailey of Southern Oregon tops the passing department statistics with 20 completions for 34 tosses for 171 yards gain. Dennis Ellis of SOC was top pass receiver to date with seven for 90 yards.

Glines expects to add to his passing and running prestige Saturday night as do Battle and Luke. The triple threat punch should give the Owls added spark.

Big Ten Teams, Ivy Leaguers Open Grid Action This Weekend

College football, apparently trying to keep up with Broadway, has another "opening" this weekend.

It's the third of the season and features eight of the Big Ten teams and all the Ivy League squads.

As usual, most Big Ten teams open with inter-sectional games and the Ivy League teams will be playing some traditional opening game opponents.

Wisconsin and Northwestern, which opened last weekend, will play Notre Dame and Indiana, respectively, Saturday. The Northwestern-Indiana clash at Evanston, Ill., is the only Big Ten Conference battle.

With the exception of Wisconsin and Purdue, which plays at Miami (Fla.), the Big Ten teams will be opening at home.

The schedule includes Illinois-California; Iowa-Washington State; Michigan State-North Carolina; Michigan-SMU; Ohio State-Texas A&M; and Minnesota-Nebraska.

Switching to the Ivies, Princeton opens against Rutgers in the 33rd meeting between the

schools which played the first intercollegiate football game Nov. 6, 1869 at New Brunswick, N.J.

Brown meets Columbia in the only league game while Cornell plays Colgate; Harvard plays Massachusetts; Dartmouth meets Bucknell; Penn faces Lafayette, and Yale plays Connecticut.

The nationally televised game between Southern California and Oklahoma should be one of the weekend's best. The Trojans are defending national champions while Oklahoma is favored to win the Big Eight title.

The game will be televised by CBS at 4:30 p.m. EDT.

In the East the big ones find UCLA at Penn State and Washington at Pitt. The Nittany Lions unveiled a new "Swing-T" offense in last week's opening-game victory over Oregon and are favored to beat the Bruins Saturday.

Pitt, which drubbed UCLA, 20-0, in Los Angeles last week feels it has its best squad since the 1956 Sugar Bowl team.

Elsewhere in the East, Cincinnati will be at Army; William & Mary is at Navy; Wichita plays at Boston College and Buffalo is at Holy Cross.

In the South, the Missouri-Arkansas game should be one of the top battles of the season. Arkansas coach Frank Broyles came from Missouri and would like a big win over his former employer.

Mississippi, which was tied by Memphis State, 0-0, last week, will be looking for revenge against Kentucky.

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RUSHING STAR — The Owl defense will have to concentrate on stopping Curt Wilker of the Weber Wildcats. Last week, he netted 184 yards rushing, scoring two of Weber's touchdowns on runs of 62 and 25 yards. Wilker is just one of the power-laden backfield stars who will face the Owls Saturday night on Modoc Field.

Medford Seeks Status Against North Salem

Third-ranked Roseburg has a toughie at home against North Bend and fourth-ranked Grants Pass hosts South Salem tonight.

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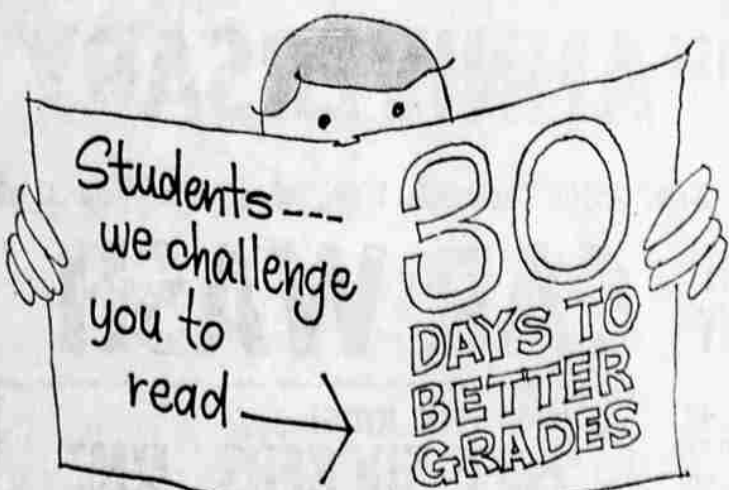
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
