

Chiloquin Defeats Malin 13-6 In League Encounter

Sophomore Erwin Miller rambled 39 yards late in the fourth quarter to tally the clinching touchdown for the Chiloquin Panthers as they squeaked past the Malin Mustangs, 13-6, in a county league game at Henley last night.

The win was the initial triumph of the season for the Panthers who last week dropped their season opener to Tulelake, 12-9. For the Mustangs, the result represented their second setback, including a 14-0 shellacking administered by Butte Valley in another lull-lifter last week.

The singular difference between the two clubs was the ball carrying of Miller, a jolting runner, who collected 67 of the 88 yards his squad gained rushing.

The Mustangs may have fared considerably better except for some untimely penalties and a blocked kick which accounted for

the Panthers' initial touchdown in the first quarter, and their own failure to score from less than one yard out near the closing minutes of the second stanza.

In the first quarter, Chiloquin took advantage of two 15-yard penalties assessed against the Mustangs and moved deep into enemy territory. Malin held and took over on downs but moments later Chiloquin blocked a punt and recovered the loose ball to set itself up in scoring position on the 18-yard line.

Five plays later Jim Bridge skirted the Mustang right flank for seven yards and the opening TD. Then, seconds later, he flipped an aerial to end Tony DiUlio for the point after touchdown and the Panthers went ahead, 7-0.

Late in the following quarter, the Mustangs made their bid to chalk up the equalizing tally

when they moved from midfield to the one-foot line on the running of Chuck Henderson and the passing combination of Dave Rogers to Roger LeQueu. The key play in the drive came at midfield when Henderson took a revenge handoff and scampered 33 yards through right tackle, past four Panther defenders, to a first down on the 17-yard line.

Rogers then hit LeQueu with an aerial over center and the Mustangs were on the six-yard line with another first down. They moved to the one-yard line but the half ended as Jay Parrish plunged to within inches of scoring the equalizing touchdown.

Early in the third quarter, the Mustangs drove 45 yards with Jay Parrish scoring their initial TD on a spinner from six yards out. On the try for the extra point, a pass from Rogers to LeQueu went awry and the Mustangs still trailed, 7-6.

Neither club showed any offense from that point until the fourth quarter when the Panthers took a punt and moved to the Mustang 39, setting the stage for Miller's scamper to pay dirt.

Del Parrish played well on defense for the losers as did Bridge and Miller for the winners.

McCovey Leads SF To 10-0 Win; Attendance Strikes Record Low

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The San Francisco Giants, who recorded a new record for Candlestick Park Thursday, will be shooting for an all-time club record in the final weekend of the 1963 season.

The first is rather dubious—but they've been shooting at the second ever since they moved from New York to San Francisco.

The Candlestick mark was posted Thursday when only 3,691 fans turned out to see the 1962 champions tighten their grip on third place.

The loyal gathering saw Willie McCovey take over the league's home run lead with his 44th and marveled as Billy O'Dell contributed three hits and blanked Philadelphia, 10-0, on the same amount.

When the Giants open their final three-game series of the season against Pittsburgh tonight, they'll be working on their first season of baseball without a rain-out or postponement on their home ground. That hasn't happened in the 87 years the Giants have been in business.

The Giants have only had six rainouts during the regular season since they moved to San Francisco in 1958—two the first year and single postponements each following year through 1962.

The San Francisco club goes into tonight's contest with a two-game edge over Philadelphia and

Cincinnati, tied for fourth place in the standings. Bob Bolin (10-5) of the Giants will oppose Joe Gibbon (5-11) of the Pirates.

McCovey broke his deadlock with idle Hank Aaron of Milwaukee in the home run race Thursday with a three-run shot in the third inning. His 44th homer matched the number of his uniform.

Orlando Cepeda had one hit in five trips to the plate, but remained within striking distance in the hitting race with an average of .318. League leader Tommy Davis sat out Thursday night's

Dodger game to remain at .323, and Dick Groat of St. Louis at .320 was idle.

It's the top game in a day of interesting battles, included among the others are California vs. Illinois, UCLA vs. Penn State, Stanford vs. Oregon, Oregon State vs. Colorado, Washington vs. Pittsburgh, Kansas State vs. San Jose State and Washington State vs. Iowa.

Four B's Roll

The Trojans turn loose their fabulous "B's"—quarterback Pete Beathard, halfback Willie Brown, line-backer Damon Bame and end Hal Bedsole for the home town fans for the first time since their victorious show in the Rose Bowl on New Year's Day.

Coach John McKay's club, unbeaten now in 12 straight contests, didn't look good last week in winning from Colorado. But McKay blamed that on the rainy weather.

The major weather problem Saturday will be the temperature—which has been up around the 100 mark, and probably is 10 to 20 degrees hotter than that in the coliseum.

Stanford, under new coach John Ralston, sends its three-quarterback backfield into action against All-American halfback Mel Renfro of Oregon. The Webfoots should be favored, but their top lineman, Ron Jones, is out with a head injury and the rest of the forward wall lacks experience.

Clark Weaver will call signals for the Indians, but two other quarterbacks, Dick Ragsdale (who scored four touchdowns in the opener against San Jose State) and Steve Thurlow, will be the halfbacks.

Two Former Grid Stars Join Ailing SF 49ers

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A pair of great names from the days when the San Francisco Forty Niners won football games were back on the roster today.

End-flanker Clyde Conner and fullback Joe Perry, pro football's all-time top ground gainer, were placed back on the squad yesterday and will be ready to go Sunday at Minneapolis against the Minnesota Vikings.

Perry, who twice gained over 1000 yards for the prospectors, was picked up two weeks ago after being cut loose by the Baltimore Colts. He was signed to the taxi squad and has not as yet played in a regular game this season.

Conner ranked as San Francisco's third best pass receiver a year ago although he was hampered by injuries throughout the season. This time he is coming off the injured reserve list. His return is expected to free flanker

back Jim Johnson for duty in the defensive backfield.

In other moves Thursday, rookie linebacker Floyd Dean was placed on the injured waiver list leaving the prospectors still two players under the legal player limit of 37.

Linebacker Bill Cooper immediately gave up his number 34 to Perry, who had it in his previous decade with the team. Cooper settled for number 35 instead.

Coach Red Hickey named a revamped defensive lineup with Cooper as middle linebacker in place of injured Mike Dowdle. Johnson at right safety, Elbert Kimbrough at left safety and Kermit Alexander at left wing.
