The ghosts of George Halas' old "Monsters of the Midway" hover over the National Football League.

And the real, live modern-day Chicago Bears are frightening the daylights out of a lot of people around the NFL too.

The Bears, rated only far-out chance of winning this year's Western Division championship, clobbered the Detroit Lions, 37-21, Sunday for their third consecutive victory.

They now have beaten their two toughest rivals, Green Bay and Detroit, as well as Minnesota — all on the road. Not since 1948 had the Bears won their first three games.

And their devastating striking power and rugged defense has begun to revive memories of the famed "Monsters" who won NFL playoff championships for "Papa Bear" Halas in 1940, '41 and '43.

Browns Are Unbeaten

The Cleveland Browns emerged the only other NFL team with a spotless record when they defeated the Los Angeles Rams, 20-6.

The Browns have a date with the one-time Pittsburgh Steelers next Saturday night.

Pittsburgh handed the St. Louis Cardinals their first defeat, rally-

ing in the last seven minutes to win, 23-10. The champion Green Bay Packers and the Washington Redskins also had to come from behind in the last half to win. Green Bay beat the Baltimore Colts, 31-20, and Washington defeated the Dallas Cowboys, 21-17.

In the other games, the New York Giants bounced back from last week's defeat to trounce the Philadelphia Eagles, 37-14, and the Minnesota Vikings set a club scoring record by beating the San Francisco Forty-Niners for the second time in three weeks, 45-14.

Bill Wade, who prefers to wear down opponents with short passing gains rather than the long bomb, threw three touchdown passes and bucked a yard for another in the Bears' win before a crowd of 55,400 at Detroit. The Bears broke open the game with a 26-point second period and their defense held the Lions to a net of 40 rushing yards.

Earl Morrill, who took over for Milt Plum, passed for Detroit's three touchdowns, two to Gail Cogdill.

Held To 95 Yards

Jimmy Brown of Cleveland was held to "only" 95 yards by the Rams, but he scored the Browns' first touchdown on a 17-yard scamper. Frank Ryan then took over and passed 14 yards to Rich Krefting and 39 yards to Ray Renfro for Cleveland's only TD's. Danny Villanueva's field goals of 13 and 45 yards accounted for Los Angeles' scoring.

Billy Triplett's 63-yard run helped St. Louis gain a 7-6 lead over the Steelers at halftime. A 28-yard field goal by Jim Bakken widened that margin before Pittsburgh rallied. Dick Hoak's one-yard plunge climaxed a 57-yard drive that gave the Steelers the lead. Lou Michaels then kicked his third field goal and recovered a St. Louis fumble that set up Bob Ferguson's four-yard scoring run in the final minute. Michaels kicked field goals of 21, 40 and 21 yards.

Packers Rallied

The Packers trailed Baltimore 7-0 at halftime and 17-14 after three quarters. Bart Starr then hit Boyd Dowler with a 35-yard touchdown pass and Jerry Kramer

scored a 15-yard touchdown pass to tie the game at 14-14. In Sunday's only other game, the Denver Broncos scored their first victory of the season by upsetting the Boston Patriots, 14-10. On Saturday night, the New York Jets edged the Oakland Raiders, 10-7, and the Houston Oilers defeated the Buffalo Bills, 31-20.

Rote's first two touchdowns passed, of 19 and 35 yards, were caught by Dave Kocurek. Keith Lincoln caught a 15-yard scoring loss in the second period and San Diego led 17-3 at halftime. The Chargers' defense held the Chiefs to only 27 rushing yards and 137 by passing, intercepting three of Len Dawson's passes and recovering one fumble before a crowd of 22,654 at San Diego.

John McCormick, a National Football League castoff, rallied the Broncos from a 10-0 halftime deficit and knocked Boston out of first place in the Eastern Division.

McCormick, who took over when rookie quarterback Mickey Slaughter was unable to move the club, threw a 72-yard pass to Lionel Taylor for the winning TD in the final period before 18,836 fans at Denver.

A recovered fumble by Chuck Gavin had set up Denver's first touchdown in the third period. Don Stone carrying over from the loss, Denver intercepted three Boston passes and recovered two fumbles.

Gino Cappellietti scored all Boston's points, on an 18-yard field goal, a 31-yard pass from Babe Parilli and a conversion kick.

'Happy Days' Here Again For Ducks, Beavers

It's Blue Monday for the Big Six today — and "Happy Days are Here Again" for grid clubs from the State of Oregon.

Oregon clobbered Stanford, 36-7, and Oregon State romped over Colorado, 41-6. That was the happy news in the evergreen state.

But consider the case of the Big Six: Southern California was downed by Oklahoma, 17-12; UCL lost to Penn State, 17-14; California was licked by Illinois, 10-0; Washington was beaten by Pitt, 13-6; Stanford lost that thing to Oregon — and only little ol' Washington State, a sort of "associate member," was able to get a moral victory, a 14-1 tie with Iowa.

In other words, Saturday was a sad day for the Athletic Association of Western Universities — a group so exclusive that it has refused to accept the Oregon schools into membership up to now. There is a campaign, however, to get the two universities back in the fold within the next year or two.

Brighter Day Ahead

But if things looked gloomy today, they are bound to brighten up this week-end. For one thing, the Big Six season officially opens with UCLA taking on Stanford. There should be one winner there, for sure. Unless it ends in a deadlock.

California gets another road trip to play Pittsburgh, USC meets Michigan State, Washington State takes on Arizona.

Meanwhile, Oregon tackles West Virginia and Oregon State runs up against Baylor.

The hero of the Big Six had to be Clarence Williams of Washington State, who did most of the ball packing on an 89-yard drive to one touchdown and ran 24

yards for another in the last half to gain the tie for the Cougars.

Bob Berry was the key man in Oregon's slaughter of the Indians. He passed for two touchdowns and scored one himself. Stanford made a donation of the game by fumbling seven times, losing the ball to

the Webfoots six of these times; and having two passes intercepted.

Queen Paces Oregon St.

Quarterback Gordon Queen threw four touchdown passes in leading Oregon State to its victory. Southern California went down

in grinding out 264 yards to batter Tulane, 28-0.

Three clubs — Texas Christian, Missouri and Kansas — utilized the ground game to score important upsets. TCU shattered Florida State's dreams of glory by gaining all but 23 of its 165-yard total on the ground to beat the Seminoles, 13-0. Missouri rolled over Arkansas, 7-6, and Kansas, ignoring an overwhelming Syracuse weight advantage, slashed for 209 yards in blanking the Orange, 10-0.

The Big Ten, long the showcase for power running, hasn't changed its style. Michigan State struck for 332 yards rushing in overpowering North Carolina, 31-0. Ohio State stomped for 232 yards in overrunning Texas A & M, 17-0. Michigan rolled up 238 yards by foot to stomp SMU, 27-16; and Illinois outstrutted California, 10-0.

Wisconsin, relying on a passing attack most of the afternoon, still needed a one-yard plunge by full-back Ralph Kurek in the game's waning moments to top Notre Dame, 14-9. Northwestern flashed a balanced attack in outscoring

Indiana, 34-21, in the only conference game.

But Minnesota and Purdue stymied on the ground, dropped their games. Nebraska outdistanced the Gophers, 14-7, and Miami (Fla.) booted the Bollermakers, 3-0. Underdog Washington State outgained Iowa and tied the Hawkeyes with two second-half scores, 14-14.

In football's oldest rivalry, Princeton disdained the use of the pass in smothering Rutgers, 24-0. The Tigers picked up 255 yards on the ground to a minus 4 total for Rutgers.

But there were still enough passing feats to entertain the fans. Billy Lorthridge fired three touchdowns down pass by his only completion of the day to lead Georgia Tech past Clemson, 27-0. Lorthridge also kicked two field goals and three extra points to account for all Tech scores.

Another passing trio — Roger Staubach of Navy, Archie Roberts of Columbia and Terry Isaacson of Air Force — put on quite a show.

Staubach completed 12 of 17

aerials in the process of setting

a new Naval Academy single-game record for total yardage with 297. Roberts threw three touchdowns scores and ran for two others as the Lions walked off with a 41-14 Ivy League opener. And Isaacson passed the Air Force Academy to a humiliating romp over Colorado State, 69-0.

In other top Southern contests, Mississippi clouted inexperienced Kentucky, 31-7. Rice stopped LSU, 21-12. Mississippi State surprised by tying Florida, 9-9; Auburn rallied to edge Tennessee, 23-19; and Georgia blanked Vanderbilt, 20-0.

The eastern powers also flexed their muscles with three interconference victories. Pittsburgh defeated Washington, 13-7, to remain in the unbeaten ranks. Penn State topped UCLA, 17-14, on Ron Coates' 32-yard field goal, and Army scored its second consecutive shutout with a 22-0 win over Cincinnati.

In Far West action, Oregon smashed Stanford, 36-7, and Oregon State drubbed Colorado, 41-6.

The college football powers, dominated in recent years by the heavy artillery of rifle-armed quarterbacks, are dependent once again on the much-maligned infantry in their bid for the national title.

Running backs, football's foot soldiers, are back in the spotlight once again primarily because of Oklahoma. The Sooners pushed overland for 307 yards against Southern California, the defending national champions, on Saturday to hand the Trojans their first defeat since 1961 by a 17-12 count. Oklahoma hasn't been on top of

the football world since 1956 when Tommy McDonald and Cledon Thomas were running wild throughout the Southwest, but the Sooners are making a concerted drive to the top with another explosive running game featuring Joe Don Looney and Jim Graham.

A few other national powers also showed an increased interest in keeping the ball on the ground Saturday, Texas, which meets Oklahoma in a showdown game in Austin two weeks hence, demolishing Texas Tech, 49-7, while picking up 267 yards rushing. Alabama, the collegiate kingpin of 1961, did some plunging of its own
