Lake, Klamath County Forest Receipts Listed

LAKEVIEW—Funds to be derived by Lake County from the Fremont and Deschutes national forests for the fiscal year ending July 30, will amount to \$276,751.98, according to the report of Carl W. Simpson, supervisor, and Ervin Berreth, administrative officer. This is \$38,620.24 less than the county received from this source last year.

Because part of the Fremont Forest is in Klamath County and part of the Deschutes Forest is in Lake County, the monies are distributed in these counties. The amount coming here from the Fremont is \$228,896.48, with \$95,051.60 to Klamath County; Lake County received from the Deschutes Forest \$47,855.30.

Since establishment of the Forest Service in 1906 Lake County has received a total of \$5,586,098.66, most of it since heavy use of national forest timber began in 1940.

Jacoby On Bridge Limit Raises Explained

to three shows 11-12 supporting points for partner and is a strong invitation, but not a force. This has a fine pre-emptive effect as may be seen from today's hand.

North's limit raise to three spades shuts East out and South makes his three spade contract right on the nose after losing one heart, two diamonds and a club.

If North merely bids two diamonds East will surely muster up enough courage to bid two hearts and West will raise him to four. North can sacrifice at four spades or pass and watch East wrap up a game.

In the earliest days of contract if you wanted to raise your partner you did and the better your hand the more you would raise him. Translated into points the single raise indicated 7 to 9 or 10 points in support; the double raise 10 to 12 and the triple raise 13 to 17. The double raise was not forcing and the 13 to 17 triple raise was a wonderful slam killer. If the opener saw slam possibilities he would have no way to move below game and obviously he would be deathly afraid to try for a slam with even 18 points. His partner might have jumped to game with only 13.

The experts solved this crisis by inventing the forcing jump raise and it is described and used in almost all textbooks today. The 10 to 12 point hands are called bids of 2½ and are shown by first bidding a new suit and then raising partner.

Of course, a passed hand still uses the old fashioned non-forcing jump raise so students have to learn two distinct systems at the same time.

The modern trend is to go back to limit raises so that the jump

COLUMBUS DAY and Festa Italiana October 12 and 13

The color and gaiety of old Italy returns to San Francisco as all of North Beach takes part in the Festa Italiana, a typical Italian street festival. Sample foods from sidewalk displays.
