

Henley Hornets To Face Trojans Oregon Tech Preps For Invasion Of Grays Harbor JC Grid Eleven

A week ago the Henley Hornets opened Rogue Valley League action against Eagle Point.

And coach Len Weber's Hornets were not taking the Pointers lightly despite a convincing win in 1962 by a 27-12 score. It had been the first Henley victory over the Pointers in 15 years.

Weber's caution was not without foundation as the Hornets were forced to come back from a 13-0 deficit in the final quarter last Friday night to post a 14-13 victory.

Friday night the Hornets returned to league action at home hosting the Sacred Heart Trojans and, although according to results thus far the Hornets figure to have little difficulty in winning, again Weber and crew are Friday night.

The Hornets opened the season with a 20-0 triumph over Class B Chiloquin, followed with a setback at the hands of Mount Shasta and came back for their initial league win of the season last Friday to own a 2-1 mark at this stage of the campaign.

The Trojans, in their second year of A-2 competition, opened with a loss to Bonanza by a 13-6 score, followed with a defeat by the Klamath Falls JV's 6-0 and last Friday were bombed by the

No. 1 ranked A-2 team in the state, Phoenix, 60-6.

The only thing about which coach Ross Carriago's Trojans had to shout occurred in the second period of this game when quarterback Martin Davis connected with Jim Kersen on a 20-yard touchdown heave.

Weber gives just credit for the quarterback Bob Lewis, who came off the bench in the final period to guide the Henley club to its winning touchdowns.

Prior to the Eagle Point contest, Weber had spoken of the fact he owned three quarterbacks and a choice for a starting role from the three was difficult indeed.

This problem may have been eased somewhat by the work of Lewis.

In glowing terms Weber speaks of his junior field general who guided the Hornets to their first TD of the final quarter and then proceeded to calmly repeat this performance in the closing minutes of the contest.

"With some five minutes left in the game, we had the ball on the Eagle Point 31, with a fourth down and eight yards to go.

"Lewis went back to pass and then took off and rambled the entire distance for the tying touch-

down. I don't think he had more than one block the entire run," Weber offers.

With the score deadlocked, it was the cool quarterback who stepped up and sent the point after touchdown kick through for the 14-13 win.

The Hornets will possibly be without the services of halfback LeVoy Young and fullback Bill Fisher against the Trojans.

Young was injured on the opening kickoff against Eagle Point and has been nursing an elbow. Fisher earlier injured an ankle and in the second half of the Eagle Point contest was racked and injured the other ankle.

The whirlpool has been the order of the day for Fisher this week.

Freddie Rodriguez will possibly receive the call at one of the halfback posts against the Trojans.

Rodriguez is a 127-pound bundle of power and desire figured to give opposing clubs fits either on offense or at his linebacker post on defense.

Modoc fought back with a 27-yard pass play from quarterback Jim Van Loan to end Rich Cloud in the first quarter and a two-yard plunge by Cliff Danuser in the second.

Charles Avery, Tiger halfback, made a 46-yard run early in the third quarter to put Dunsmuir in scoring position and two plays later he scampered nine yards to tie the score. In the fourth quarter Dunsmuir picked up 47 yards when quarterback Joe Blevins passed to Benkosky. Five plays later Ed Flowers plunged over for the winning TD. Blevins then kicked the only extra point of the game.

The Alturas visitors won the jayvee game 12 to 0.

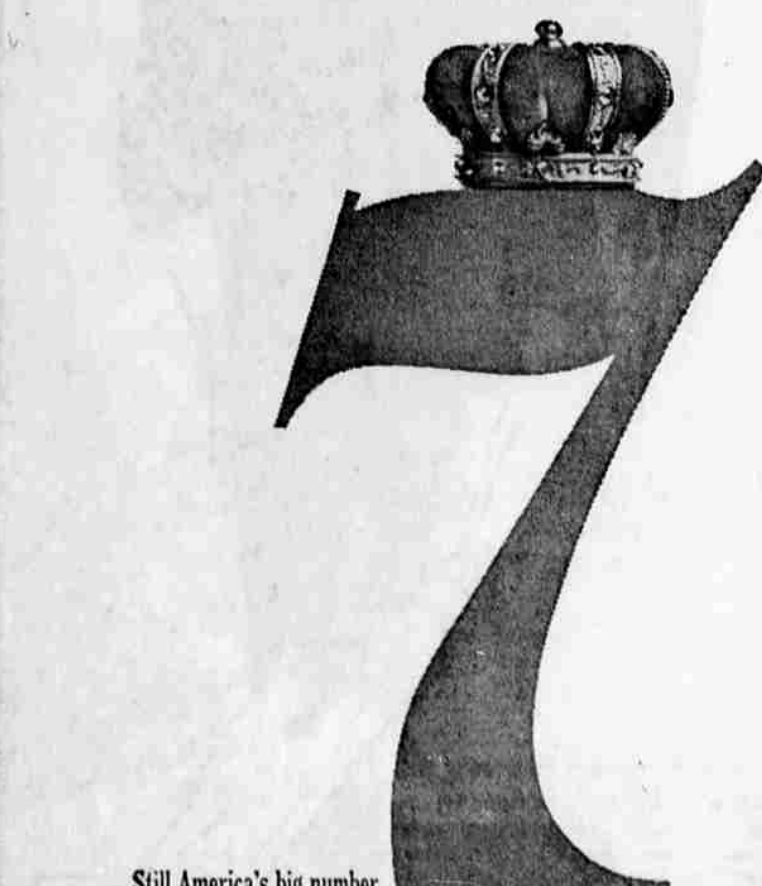

PORTLAND (UPI)—Portland State quarterback Mike Schunk and end Jim Hollingsworth were named Oregon Collegiate Conference back and lineman of the week by conference coaches today.

Schunk completed 12 passes for 177 yards and three touchdowns and Hollingsworth caught six aerials for 100 yards and two touchdowns to spark the Vikings to a 27-7 football victory over Pacific at Forest Grove last Saturday night.

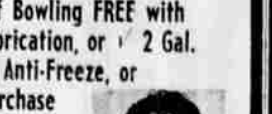

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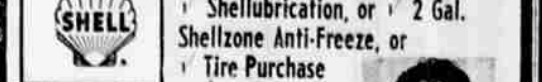


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
