

## Many Women Attend Flower Show School

With the completion of Course 1 of the flower show school under the auspices of the National Council of Garden Clubs, those attending are looking forward to Course 2 which is tentatively slated for the first week in June of 1964. At that time studies of individual flowers, their cultural needs and habits will be undertaken. Peonies, primroses and two others to be selected are on the agenda. Instructors and the exact dates will be announced along with more detailed information next spring, well in advance of the school.

Course 1, consisting of horticulture, flower show practice and flower arranging, was attended by 61 local and out-of-town people. Fourteen of this number took the examination for credit.

Mrs. Allen B. Scott, of Corvallis, an experienced horticulturist, outlined basic principles for amateur gardeners. Her lectures explained why a gardener does the things he does and needs to do in order to have and maintain the best possible growing conditions to obtain the hoped for results.

Mrs. Joe Wolff of Bellevue, Wash., lectured on flower show practice and flower arrangements. She brought with her wide knowledge and much experience in her

field. She began teaching flower arranging in 1955 but continues to exhibit flower arrangements in the instructors exhibits at shows. She has taught flower show practice in 30 schools in Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Nebraska and Colorado.

Along with staging flower shows for numerous organizations, Mrs. Wolff was staging chairman for the Seattle World's Fair Flower Show which included 1,000 flower arrangement entries, many garden plot exhibits and Japanese floral exhibits. She is particularly interested in Japanese flower arranging, having received an instructor's diploma in the Japanese Senke School of Flower Arrangement in 1956.

Mrs. Wolff is also a member of the National Chrysanthemum and Primrose Societies and is a judge in the latter. She also holds a certificate as a life accredited judge for the National Council of State Garden Clubs. At present she is taking the National Council of State Garden Clubs landscape courses for credit.

The remaining four courses in the school will also feature outstanding speakers. Any one or all of these courses may be attended by all who are interested.

## Home Extension Work Available To Women

Homemaking in Grandma's day was not so complicated as it is today. But, homemakers today can turn to Home Extension for help. What is Home Extension? Cooperative extension work in Home Economics is a public educational service available to all women in Klamath County. It is called cooperative because it is financed by the federal, state and county. In Oregon it is under the direct supervision of Oregon State University at Corvallis. Its purpose is to extend the services of the University Home Extension Department to the women of the state.

Klamath County began home extension work in 1938. The first agent was Mrs. Winifred Hill (Fulmer), who organized the program and continued in that position until 1947.

County agents at present are Mrs. Frances Hall and Margaret (Peggy) Setzler. They organize work in the areas of foods and home management and equipment, clothing, family life, consumer marketing and recreation. In Klamath County there are 22 units with a total membership of about 550 women, mostly of rural and suburban areas.

The Home Extension Advisory Committee of Klamath County

is made up of seven members, one chosen from each of the seven areas in the county into which the units have been divided. The committee assists with carrying out the extension program in the county and acts as an advisory group to the home agents. Present members of the advisory group are Mrs. J. A. Bunnell, Merrill; Mrs. J. J. Kersten, Crescent; Mrs. F. Keith Swisher, Klamath Falls; Mrs. Norman Knauis, Klamath Falls; Mr. L. B. Andrieu, Midland; Mrs. A. E. Smith, Klamath Falls, and Mrs. Carl H. Chase, Bly.

The program calendar for 1963-64 is as follows: September, casserole cooking; October, color in the home; November, foreign cooking, Scandinavian; December, free choice; January, foundation garments; February, when death comes; March, touch up for wood furniture; April, better baking and broiling equipment.

In addition to the regular program there will be a craft fair in October, a workshop on refinishing wood furniture in February, and a special interest meeting on life insurance in March. Any woman interested in joining a unit may call any member of the County Advisory Committee or the extension office for further information.
