

'Like Taking Candy' Is Performance Of Koufax

NEW YORK (UPI) — It was like taking candy from a baby as it has been so often in the World Series, only this time it was the New York Yankees who were reduced to utter helplessness.

Because this time it was the National League champion Los Angeles Dodgers who had the "superman" in their corner.

Back through the golden years of the Yankees' World Series history they've had the Babe Ruth, the Lou Gehrig, the Joe DiMaggio, the Allie Reynolds and the Mickey Mantle who've proved just too much for the opposition to handle.

But Wednesday it was the Dodgers who had the man who was just too much. He's Sandy Koufax, of course, and he manhandled the lordly Yankees in a way that left American Leaguers gaping.

Other great pitchers have beaten the Yankees but nowhere in

World Series memory is there an instance of a pitcher who so completely overpowered them.

Koufax Took Command

A 25-game winner with 306 strikeouts in 311 innings and a backdrop of two no hitters and two games in which he struck out 18 batters during his career, Koufax took command of the Yankees like a big league pitcher would take command of a high school team.

He struck out the first five batters to face him and nine of the first 12. After four innings the Yankees had hit only one fair ball. He blazed his fast ball past them. He confused them with his deep-breaking fast curve. And he made them look ridiculous with his change-up — thrown with the same motion as the high, hard one.

This was supposed to be a match-up of star pitchers — Koufax vs. Whitey Ford, who started the game with a 10-5 World Series record.

Frank Howard's 457-foot double, singles by Bill Skowron and Dick Tracewski and Johnny Roseboro's three-run homer gave the Dodgers four runs in the second inning and that was it. It was obvious the Yankees could not overcome such a handicap against Koufax and the brilliant left-hander just kept mowing 'em down.

Two Tough Innings

Koufax had two tough innings — because he lost the pinpoint control of his curve ball — in the fifth and sixth. The Yankees put together three singles with two out in the fifth but Sandy fanned pinch hitter Hector Lopez to end that threat and they got two straight walks in the sixth with one out only to have Sandy retire Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris on infield pops.

Tom Tresh hit a two-run homer in the eighth but then Koufax was throwing fast balls for strikes and he quickly closed out the game.

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI) — A sharp battle for fullback developed at Stanford today when the Indian roster went over full strength.

Coach John Ralston had two fullbacks on both the first and second teams. Dan Conway and Tony Delellis were on the first squad and Glenn Myers and Ken Babajian were on the second.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — The University of California Bears fly to Pittsburgh today to battle the mighty Pitt Panthers.

The Bears were defeated last Saturday 10-0 by Illinois and the game Saturday, their third of the season, was expected to be the toughest so far.

STOCKTON, Calif. (UPI) — The University of Pacific Tigers are sharpening up their defense during the week's schedule lull.

The Tigers were run over by West Texas State, 32-8, last week and coach John Rohde said he felt the defense needed "considerable attention."

PULLMAN, Wash. (UPI) — Coach Jim Sutherland of Washington State said today fullback Herm McKee was not expected to return to the Cougar lineup for four weeks.

McKee suffered a knee injury and was out of the lineup Wednesday. Sutherland said the rest of the squad is in good shape.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI) — Oregon State guard Warren Cole and defensive halfback Jim Sinyard will miss Saturday's contest with Baylor University because of injuries.

Coach Tom Prothro ran his charges through a pass defense drill Wednesday, expecting to be bombarded by Baylor quarterback Don Trull.

SEATTLE (UPI) — Coach Jim Owens expects the Iowa Hawkeyes to rely on a strong air game when they come here Saturday to play his Washington Huskies.

Owens concentrated on defense against Hawkeye pass patterns Wednesday.

Steve Bramwell, 150-pound halfback who has returned kickoffs 83 and 70 yards in two games, suited up Wednesday for the first time this week.

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — USC halfback Willie Brown apparently will be able to play Friday night in the Trojans' intercollegiate game with Michigan State.

Brown has taken whirlpool treatments for a sprained foot and ran well during drills Wednesday.

A short workout was scheduled for today.

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The manipulation of quarterbacks, a familiar Los Angeles Ram problem, is also becoming a concern of the UCLA Bruins.

UCLA coach Bill Barnes earlier in the week announced that Larry Zeno would start at quarterback for the Bruins against Stanford Saturday and Wednesday said that Mike Haffner, a former single wing fullback, will eventually get a trial at quarterback, too.

Haffner was one of the top running backs in West Coast football during his sophomore year, 1961, but sat out last year because of injury. Haffner has had difficulty becoming effective as a T-formation halfback.

Barnes said it was hoped his passing ability could be used better at quarterback, although he still stands third in line behind Zeno and Steve Sindell.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Florida A&M, trying to shake the bridesmaid role it inherited last season, was off to another good start today as the nation's No. 1 small college football team in the first weekly ratings issued by the United Press International board of coaches.

Coach Alonzo Gaither's Raiders, who won their 19th straight regular season game last weekend by defeating Lincoln College (Mo.), 44-6, drew seven first place votes for their high scoring performance.

Florida A&M, led most of the way in the 1962 ratings, only to give way to Southern Mississippi in the final three weeks of the campaign. Southern Mississippi has since ascended to major college status.

Delaware, ninth in the final '62 UPI ratings, whipped Lehigh, 20-0, and received two first place ballots. The Blue Hens garnered 121 second place points, 71 less than Florida A&M's 192.

Northern Illinois opened in third place, up three notches over last year's finish, with three first place votes and Lenoir-Rhyne was fourth with the help of two first place ballots.

Central Oklahoma State was

named fifth in the opening ratings, down two notches from last season's finale, and Montana State is sixth, followed by San Diego State, and Texas A&I, Wittenberg and Eastern Carolina were tied for ninth place.

Wittenberg was the only school among the top 10 that failed to receive at least one first place vote.

The 35-man UPI coaches board — made up of five coaches from each of the nation's geographical sections — awarded points on a basis of 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 for votes from first through 10th place.

Title Bout Falls Apart

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A proposed lightweight title match between champion Carlos Ortiz and Kenny Lane in Los Angeles is off, according to peevish matchmaker George Parnassus.

Lane said in Michigan that the bout was set and World Boxing Association president Ed Lassman announced Wednesday at Miami Beach the contract would be signed "momentarily." But Parnassus countered that Lane's manager, Pete Petrosky, never agreed to his terms. The terms were \$10,000, but Parnassus said Petrosky wanted expenses paid also.

Another opponent for Ortiz will be sought, possibly featherweight Sugar Ramos, for a title defense here.

Large Back Joins 49ers

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The San Francisco Forty Niners' squad was at 36 players today following the activation of 220-pound running back Mike Lind of Notre Dame.

Lind has been out with injuries since before the season opener. His return leaves the squad still one man short of the National Football League limit.

New coach Jack Christiansen reported that "both Bob Waters and Lamar McHan have been passing well in practices." Starting quarterback John Brodie is out for a minimum of six weeks with a reinjured arm, so it's up to McHan and Waters to move the team.

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
