Adult Agricultural Study Slated At Lakeview High

LAKEVIEW — Monday evening, Oct. 21, has been set as the starting date for adult education courses in agriculture at Lakeview High School, according to Bob Elden, adult director. Two courses are being planned this fall in agriculture, one in veteri-

nary medicine and one in farm income taxes.

The veterinary medicine course has been set for Oct. 21 at 7 p.m. in the Vo-Ag classroom of the Vo-Ag building at Lakeview High School. The course is designed to help farmers and ranchers in areas of health, sanitation, and livestock disease control. All aspects of disease control in classes of livestock raised in Lake County will be included.

Instructor for the class will be one of Lakeview's local veterinarians. Persons interested should contact Bob Elden at WH 7-2335 or WH 7-3212 prior to the start of the course. Fee for the course has been set at \$3.

Ed Casto, local public accountant, will instruct the second fall course in farm income taxes. All aspects of farm income tax reporting will be covered, with particular attention paid to working on problems and forms. Starting Oct. 22, the class will also meet in the Vo-Ag classroom. The course fee is \$8.

Persons are reminded that a minimum of 10 students is required in order to offer either of these courses. It is necessary for all students to contact the adult director at the high school prior to the opening dates.

Forestry Report Notes Continued Fire Danger

LAKEVIEW — With forested areas extremely dry on the Fremont National Forest, all persons are urged to be extremely careful with cigarettes and campfires. A few fires during the hunting season have spread rapidly and require many taxpayers' dollars to control. Hunters are urged not to build warming fires.

On the Bly district there are logging trucks hauling on the Fish-hole road, the county road to Camp Six, Road No. 345 to Sycaon Siding, and Road No. 3610 from the Lee Thomas Meadows area to Bly. There have been three fires in the district because people have failed to clear a safe area for camp and warming fires. Hunting success has been slow as a result of unusually hot and dry weather; fishing is reported good at Lotton Reservoir.

In the Drews Valley district, yellow jackets and flies have been bad for several weeks in the campgrounds. Fishing is still good at Cottonwood Meadows Lake; conditions are too dry for good deer hunting.

In the Paisley district, roads are dusty and there is still fallen timber to watch for on trails. Fishing is poor on the Chewaucan, Sycaon, and Sprague rivers; fair at Deadhorse and Campbell lakes; hunting is poor. Shovels, buckets and axes are required because of high fire danger.

In the Silver Lake district, logging trucks are hauling over all main roads to Silver Lake. Fishing is reported good at Thompson Reservoir. Fire danger is high in upper elevations and extreme in heavy blowdown and lower elevations.

Deer hunting is only fair on the Warner district. All campers are required to have a shovel, axe, and water bag because of the high fire danger in all areas.

However, last weekend three fires were caused by hunters. One hunter's campfire escaped and completely burned up his pickup and all his camping gear. "Unless we receive some rain, the woods will be tinder dry this coming weekend," Supervisor Simpson said. He urged all hunters to take extreme caution with their fires and smoking and to comply with state laws requiring a shovel, axe, and a water bucket while traveling or camping in the forest.

About 12:30 p.m., Wednesday, Sept. 25, a smoker flipped a burning cigarette from his car on the Warner Canyon highway. This act of carelessness started a fire which burned over one-half an acre along the highway. Prompt action by the county road grader and a few local people kept the fire from spreading.

Fort Klamath Man Joins Peace Corps

FORT KLAMATH — Alonzo Grover Jones, 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alonzo John Jones, left Friday, Sept. 27, bound for Hilo, Hawaii. A native of Burns, Ore., Jones has signed up for a two-year term in the Peace Corps, with Thailand as his ultimate destination.

He left by prop-jet from the Klamath Falls airport on the first stage of his trip, flying to San Francisco and from there to Los Angeles where he boarded a plane for Hawaii. He will remain in Hilo until Christmas to receive training for the Peace Corps, including instruction in the language of Thailand.

After successfully passing his final tests at Christmas, he will become a qualified member of the Peace Corps and leave immediately for Thailand. Members will be there on invitation of the Thailand government, and their project will be to help establish and relocate new villages there.

Jones' father has been employed by the National Park Service in Crater Lake Park for the past 11 years, so he completed his eighth grade education at the park elementary school. He attended Chiloquin High School for two years and then transferred to Klamath Union High School, where he was graduated with the class of 1958.

For the next two years Jones studied at Oregon Technical Institute in Klamath Falls as a machinist major, graduating in 1960. From the winter term of 1961 through the spring term of this year, he studied mechanical engineering at Southern Oregon College in Ashland. He decided late this summer to join the Peace Corps.

During summer vacations for the past six years, he was employed in the Crater Lake National Park Service. Jones' parents are local residents, and he has a younger brother at home, Carl, 14, a freshman at Chiloquin High School. Mrs. Jones is employed this year as school bus driver from Crater Lake to the Chiloquin schools.

Arkansas Crowds Shun Kennedy, Turnouts Listed As Disappointing

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI) — The Arkansas Republican party today seized upon what it said were "disappointing" crowds during President Kennedy's whirlwind tour and claimed he would be in trouble politically in the state in the 1964 presidential campaign.

At least one pre-administration Democrat agreed. Another top state Democrat disagreed. Kennedy dedicated the \$46.7 million Greers Ferry Dam at Heber Springs, Ark., Thursday and then went 84 miles northeast to Little Rock to make a speech.

William L. Spicer, GOP chairman in Arkansas, said "it was the second time in two years President Kennedy has been in Arkansas and both times he has gotten very disappointing crowds. It again indicates the trouble he may be in politically in our state."

Calls Trip Disappointing
State Rep. Hardy Croxton, an unannounced Democratic candidate for governor, said "that (the trip) was very disappointing. I don't think there is any doubt but what the President is in disfavor in Arkansas. I think he has his work cut out for him."

Croxton has favored the Kennedy administration over Gov. Orval Faubus' state leadership. The President spoke to 10,000, about one-third of what officials anticipated, at the dedication of Greers Ferry Dam and returned to Little Rock to address a crowd which officials said was 30,000, but veteran observers placed closer to 10,000.

Arkansas is one of only two states (the other one is Georgia) which has not gone Republican since the Reconstruction era.

The President's other appearance referred to by Spicer was in Fort Smith in 1961 when Spicer said a crowd of 50,000 was expected and 20,000 turned out. Tom Harper of Fort Smith, chairman of the Democratic party

in the state, disagreed with Spicer and Croxton. He said the crowds were good and the President showed strong personal appeal.

Faubus Springs Surprise
Gov. Faubus said Kennedy got a "good reception," but the governor also brought the biggest surprise of the day when he attacked Kennedy's proposed civil rights legislation in front of the President on the speaker's platform at Greers Ferry.
