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# School Boards Plan Joint Meeting

Klamath Falls elementary and high school boards of education will meet jointly tonight and the Klamath Falls City Council will hold its regular session at City Hall. The school boards will meet at 7:30 p.m. at the Administration Building, 475 South Alameda. That meeting will be preceded by a meeting of the elementary board at 7:15 for payment of bills. The two boards will hear reports from Superintendent Ray Hunsaker on music summer school, the Riverside project, training of bus drivers and summer school policy. In addition, Hunsaker will report further information on the proposed usage of the Oregon Technical Institute campus by Klamath Union High School when the campus is abandoned next year. Committee will report on custodial working policies and insurance and the trustees will take up the matter of election notices, among other items. The City Council, meeting at 7:30 p.m., will hold three public hearings and consider six ordinances.

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# Bishops Court Power; See No Threat To Pope

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Liberal cardinals from North America, Western Europe and Africa assured the Ecumenical Council today that no threat to the primacy of the Pope is involved in a proposal to enhance the powers of bishops. A parade of prominent prelates strongly defended in council debate the idea that bishops of the church constitute a "college" or sacred body which shares with the Pope responsibility for the government and welfare of the whole church. Some conservative council fathers have voiced fear that the concept endangers papal supremacy. Another highlight of today's debate was a vigorous rebuttal by Julius Cardinal Döpfner, liberal archbishop of Munich, Germany, of a speech delivered last week by Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York. Spellman had attacked a provision in the document on the church which would permit the ordination of married deacons in missionary territories which have a shortage of priests. Döpfner disputed Spellman's contention that "the proposal would threaten the tradition of priestly celibacy. He said the deacons would be carefully chosen to meet special circumstances and would not be merely 'second class priests without the obligation of celibacy.'" Strong statements in favor of the "collegiality" concept were made by Albert Gregory Cardinal Meyer of Chicago, Paul Emile Cardinal Leger of Montreal, Franziskus Cardinal Koenig of Vienna, Joseph Cardinal Lefevre of Bourges, France, Bernard Jan Cardinal Alfrink of Utrecht, Netherlands, Laurean Cardinal Rugambwa of Tanganyika and Patriarch Maximov IV Saigh of Antioch, of the Melchites. # FAA Brings Military Aircraft Under System

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Federal Aviation Agency (FAA) is bringing all military aircraft under its Air Traffic Control (ATC) System. The move is designed to reduce the possibility of collisions between fast-flying fighters and private planes. The FAA has tried out the concept in the Indianapolis, Detroit and Chicago Air Traffic Control Center areas with "very successful" results. This major air safety action was revealed in the FAA's monthly publication "Aviation News," which contained a digest of a hitherto unpublished speech by the agency's top ATC official, David Thomas. Thomas said nearly half of the 2,500 near-collisions reported to the FAA in the past five years involved military aircraft. Several near-misses between fighters and airliners have occurred this year. Changeover Soon Thomas said as soon as expanded equipment and personnel requirements are met, all intercept activities will be under ATC guidance except for the actual intercept portion of a mission. He said the FAA also is providing personnel to assist the Air Defense Command in setting up a training program for all personnel in fighter-intercept operations. The civilian agency also is encouraging the military to conduct as many flights as possible under the FAA's ATC system—such as filing instrument flight plans which enables ATC to keep better track of military aircraft. Thomas said the FAA's study of 2,500 near-collision reports since 1958 showed that: About 20 collisions involving civil aircraft occur each year. This rate has been fairly consistent since the immediate post World War II days. Luck Not Skill —Sixty to 100 incidents annually were so close that collision avoidance was pure luck rather than resulting from evasive action by pilots. —Most "near-misses" occur in daylight, in clear weather and in

# Aide Raps Madame Nhu

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Do Vang Ly, South Viet Nam's new ambassador to the United States, leaves here today for Washington to present his credentials to President Kennedy. Arriving here Sunday night, the new envoy quickly disassociated himself from the controversial views of Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu and declared that he would be his country's sole spokesman in the United States. Mme. Nhu, the outspoken sister-in-law of South Viet Nam President Ngo Dinh Diem, is expected to leave Paris and arrive in New York later today. "As long as I am chief of mission of the Vietnamese government in the United States, I shall speak for the government, and only me," Ly said. "Her (Mme. Nhu's) actions and my actions have nothing in common. She is not a member of the government. She is head of a political party, the Women's Solidarity Association, of which she is the founder. But she cannot talk for the government."

# Tree Dealers Told Of Law

YREKA—The Siskiyou County Sheriff's Office recently announced that 1963 Christmas tree dealers must comply with the new amendments to Section 384A of the penal code of the state of California. Any person now cutting or transporting more than five trees or five pounds of shrubs or boughs must make application for transportation tags at the sheriff's office in Yreka. A landowner may cut his own trees, but may not transport them or have them transported without making application. Anyone cutting on property not his own must submit a written permit to the sheriff's office, signed by the landowner of his authorized agent and acknowledged before a notary public, before he can make application for transportation tags. The permit is to contain the number of species of trees and the legal description of the real property, as usually found in deeds and conveyances, on which cutting or removal or both will take place. One copy of the permit must be filed with the sheriff's office prior to the cutting of trees. Any person violating any provision of the subsections of Section 384A will be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$500, imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding six months, or both.

# Interpreter Asks Asylum

TOKYO (UPI) — An interpreter for a Communist Chinese scientific delegation climbed over the wall of the Soviet Embassy before dawn today and asked for political asylum, diplomatic sources reported. The Japanese Foreign Office identified the defector as Chou Hong-cheng, 44, who came here with the delegation last month for an international conference on oil pressure machinery. The sources said Chou made his way to the Soviet Embassy about 4 a.m. today, climbed over the seven-foot concrete wall, and asked Soviet officials for asylum. Airline sources said five members of the delegation left for home today but three others, including the leader, remained in Tokyo. One report identified Chou as a member of the faculty at Peking Industrial University. Soviet and Chinese spokesmen declined comment on the defection, the second of a Peking official in recent days. In Moscow, Communist sources said Sunday that Chou Hsing-pu, second secretary of the Peking Embassy in London, had elected to stay in the Soviet capital with his wife and two children. Chou arrived in Moscow several weeks ago, ostensibly on his way home, but he did not continue his trip to China. Since the Sino-Soviet split became public, there have been no known instances of Soviet defections to the Chinese.

# Trash Sparks Cause Of Blaze

BLY — Sparks from a trash fire were believed to have caused a fire which completely destroyed a storage shed and child's playhouse owned by Mr. and Mrs. Jim Baker on Oct. 2. Quick action by the Bly Volunteer Fire Department, KPFA, and forest service crews kept the fire from reaching surrounding homes and buildings. The fire was first observed by Mrs. Ray Nelson, who turned in the alarm at 1:30 p.m. Tall dry grass in the area caused the fire to spread rapidly. No estimate of the damage to the contents of the shed was available.
