

State Board Of Health Warns Of Flu Danger

An outbreak of Asian (A-2) influenza is anticipated on the West Coast this fall or winter, according to the Oregon State Board of Health.

An upswing in the disease was noted throughout the state for the week ending Sept. 28 when influenza led all communicable diseases reported in the state with 180. Next came pneumonia with 42, followed by measles with 27.

In Klamath County seven cases of flu were reported for the same period with fewer numbers of the same disease noted in nearby counties. Lake County had three cases and Jackson and Deschutes counties reported two each.

The state board reported that this year's flu vaccine has been supplemented by strains of both A-2 (Asian) and B types to assure that the public is more fully protected from the viruses that have been involved in the recent outbreaks.

People requiring the yearly booster need only receive one dose for the year 1963-64; however, all others should be given two doses of the vaccine.

The board reported further that influenza has been particularly dangerous in those over 45 years of age, for persons with chronic cardiovascular, metabolic, renal, or pulmonary conditions, and for pregnant women.

Among these groups the illness is most severe, deaths occur, and complications and prolonged convalescence are most likely to result. In addition, every consideration should be given to immunizing persons who hold positions in transportation, communication, medical care, fire, police, food, and other vital activities so that influenza will not disrupt community services, the board advised.

'Recruiting Office' Enlists Blind Dates For Cadets

CHICAGO (UPI)—Chicago area college girls answered a call to arms by the hundreds today and volunteered for blind dates with Air Force and Army cadets.

Military and civilian matchmakers tried to line up 1,500 light-footed coeds to match with cadets at a gala civic ball after the Army-Air Force football game at Chicago's Soldier Field Nov. 2.

Five thousand cadets are expected at the ball, but some loyally invited their own dates. Hundreds of girls have already volunteered.

More than 300 gingham ballerinas called special recruiting offices set up in the headquarters of Mayor Richard J. Daley Tuesday.

They besieged city hall after Col. Jack Reilly, special events director for the mayor, sent out word that 1,500 more girls were needed to keep the cadets from being lonely in the big city.

Mrs. William H. Arnold, wife of the commanding general of the 3rd Army, mother of a West Point cadet and chairwoman of the dance, picked and chose from among the volunteers.

She said she was most interested in coeds averaging 18 and 19 years old and attending Chicago area colleges and universities. She said a few 17 year olds might sneak in if they have high school diplomas.

Miss Joanne Nealin, 26, a city hall worker temporarily assigned to telephone duty, said hopeful girls "call up every five minutes."

"We tell them to sit tight," she said.

Those who pass inspection will be asked to muster out at the Conrad Hilton Hotel for pairing off the night of the dance.

Reilly, an old Army man, warned that there will be no nonsense after the ball is over.

The cadets will board trains for

the service academies about midnight, he said.

"We'll see to it that none of the young ladies tries to follow the trains."
