

Colts, Mets Enjoy Draft

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI) — The New York Mets and Houston Colts, firmly settled at the bottom of the National League after two years, have an opportunity to improve themselves today in a special draft of personnel from the eight other teams.

Four players from each team will be eligible for the draft but under the special rules the Mets and Colts may choose only one of the four unless the other clubs agree. The price on each player is \$30,000.

The special draft was agreed upon during the World Series for the sole purpose of strengthening the two expansion teams. The meeting today was scheduled for 2:30 p.m. EDT.

New York, which has finished 10th both years, will choose first, a right they won by a coin toss last Friday.

Neither team is bound to pick a full allotment of players. For example, the Colts could pick one and the Mets seven if they so choose.

Under the rules, the players up for draft must have been on National League rosters prior to Aug. 31.

Local 'Experts' Make Belated Start

It's a belated start for the annual sports feature "Football Predictions" as the local "experts" start today in attempting to correctly name nine winners in top collegiate contests each week.

Eight "experts" try their luck each week, with just two former participants in the weekly forecasting effort returning this year in Henley Hornet coach Len Weber and Oregon Tech football mentor Ron Pheister.

This year, in order to give the distaff side a say in the weekly proceedings, a local housewife, Wanda Burleson, offers her choices on the winners of the games.

With an almost entirely new group of forecasters participating, we offer the following introductory thumbnail sketches of each:

Wanda Burleson: The wife of Oregon Tech head track coach and assistant football coach, Larry. Wanda attended high school at Los Altos, Calif., and Linfield College.

In both high school and college, Wanda was active in the sportswriting field and at Linfield, where she was a journalism major, she pounded out a weekly column in addition to reporting.

She met her husband while conducting an interview for the Linfield paper. Her interest in sports began at the age of 5 as she attended college and professional football games in the San Francisco area with her father.

Wanda currently pens a weekly column for this paper offering the latest from the Oregon Tech sport camps.

Dick Bumala: A new assistant football coach with the Pelicans, Bumala graduated from Oregon State and attended high school at Astoria where he lettered in football, basketball and track.

Bumala started at Oregon State in 1948 and played rook football and varsity ball in 1949 before entering the service.

He returned to the Beaver campus in 1953, but was unable to play ball due to an injury received in the 1949 season.

He began his coaching career at Silverton where he was head wrestling mentor and assistant in football and came to KU this season.

Len Weber: A native of this area, Weber attended high school at Malin and Oregon Tech one year playing football at both schools. Following a stint in the service, Weber returned to SOC where he played three years of football.

He has been at Henley High School seven years, the last five as head football coach.

Weber is one of the two returnees from last year's forecasting group.

Ron Pheister: Now in his second year as head football coach of the Oregon Tech Owls, Pheister attended Grant High School in Portland where he was one of the top linemen in the state his final two years.

He was named to the all-city and all-state teams and was selected to the annual Shrine All-Star game with the Metro team.

He attended the University of Oregon graduating in 1953 and was selected for play in the annual East-West football game.

He began his coaching at Tigard remaining one year before becoming assistant coach at

Grant in 1956. In 1958 he was named head football coach at Benson of Portland.

Pheister came to Oregon Tech in 1962.

Bob Moore: A Klamath Falls businessman and president of the Pelican Booster Club, Moore attended the University of Maryland and has been a resident of this area for 13 years.

He and wife Doris have two children, Bob, age 14, and a sophomore at Roosevelt School.

Moore has been very active in the Klamath Falls sports picture and has been a masonry contractor for 13 years in this city.

Dick Briggs: Briggs is a member of the Herald and News staff and has been in the newspaper field for 10 years.

He attended Stanford University and San Francisco State and prior to coming to Klamath Falls on the "news side" was sports writer at Chico, Calif., and sports editor at Ukiah, Calif.

Briggs also worked in Alaska in the public relations field.

Dan Walters: A new member of the Herald and News staff, Walters attended high school at Eureka, Calif., and Humboldt State

College.

Prior to joining the staff of the local paper he was with the Humboldt Times for three years. He played basketball at Eureka High School.

Bill Gould: New sports editor of the Herald and News, Gould graduated from Merrill High School and attended the University of Oregon two years as a journalism major.

He spent five years as sports announcer following school and returned to newspaper work in 1958 at Roseburg where he was sports editor before moving to Oregon City in the same capacity.

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Shotgun Enthusiasts Eye Big Day

Probably the most important day of the year for shotgun enthusiasts will be Saturday, which marks the opening of the season for ringneck pheasants and quail over most of the state. Malheur County will remain closed until Oct. 26 to give landowners in this portion of the state an opportunity to harvest seed crops before the onslaught of upland bird shooters. Shooting time for the opener will begin at 8 a.m.

The general season on a statewide basis will extend through Nov. 24 for pheasants, with an extended quail season in eastern Oregon to run through Dec. 31. Malheur County will be an exception to the extended season which will close on Nov. 24. The chukar and Hungarian seasons now underway will also extend through Dec. 31 in eastern Oregon.

Bag limit on pheasants is set for three cocks per day with a possession limit of 12. Gunners may take 10 quail per day in the aggregate with a possession limit of 20. One hen pheasant will be allowed in possession in

bird shooting such as prohibited methods, possession and transportation, and refuges and closures.

According to population trends and production figures gathered by the game commission, the Willamette Valley will be a good producer of pheasants although the population is a little below that of last year. However, pheasant gunners enjoyed a good season last year and the take of ring-necks should again be high.

Some good bets include the agricultural areas of Washington and Yamhill counties in the north Willamette, while the Polk and Benton County areas should produce well in the south.
