Plans For Parsonage Use Result In Move For New Calvary Family

Moving to Klamath Falls last month from Tacoma, the "first family" of the Calvary Baptist Church will hardly have time to become acquainted with the Garden Avenue parsonage before packing bags and furniture to establish a second residence.

Rev. and Mrs. John T. Davis and three children are preparing to paint their newly purchased home at 1035 Applewood and hope to complete the second move by the end of the month.

The parsonage, adjacent to the church, will then be used for educational purposes.

The old annex to Calvary Baptist Church was torn down prior to the arrival of the minister, and plans have been made to build a modern education wing on the site.

Construction is tentatively scheduled to begin next spring, said Reverend Davis, and until that time the parsonage will provide additional space for Sunday School classes and related programs.

Experienced in promoting church growth and expansion, Reverend Davis came here from the Meadow Road Baptist Church in Tacoma, which he served for four years. Meadow Road held a mission status when he went there, and during the term of his pastorate received its charge and became a sanctioned church body.

Reverend Davis, who has been in the ministry for 23 years, is a native of Siloam Springs, Ark. He was graduated from the John Brown University in Siloam Springs, and received his seminary training at the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary in New Orleans, La.

Following his graduation from the seminary, Reverend Davis continued his ministry in Texas. After eight years there, he re-

signed from a church in Gregory to accept a pastorate in the state of Washington.

Interested in serving in the Pacific Northwest for some time, the minister said he was encouraged by Dr. R. E. Milam, who was then the executive secretary of the Oregon-Washington Convention of the Southern Baptist Church.

His opportunity to relocate came when the call for a pastor was issued by the Kitsap Lake Baptist Church in Bremerton. He

was pastor of that congregation for three years.

With a seven-year residence in this part of the country, Reverend Davis said his family now considers the area as its home.

The David household includes Gail, 16, a junior at KUIS; John T. Jr., 12, a seventh grade student at Mills School; and Sandra, 19, who is employed downtown. A married daughter, 22, and one grandson live in Fort Worth, Tex., where her husband is a seminary student.

Autumn Tea Benefits Fund For Theological Education

The Theological Education Fund, maintained by the Women of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, will again benefit from the annual autumn tea to be held Saturday, Oct. 19, at the Lakeshore Drive home of Mr. and Mrs. William L. Whytal.

The fund is made available by the Episcopal women's organization to theological students from this area who are in need of financial assistance.

Two Klamath Falls candidates for the priesthood, Richard Glidden and Daniel Thompson, received aid from the fund last year. Glidden is studying at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley, Calif., and Thompson is a student at the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Cambridge, Mass.

The Theological Education Fund is also used to help young women who are interested in making a career of Christian education in the church, either in the United

States or on the foreign mission field.

Mrs. Paul Jones and Mrs. Wyatt Padgett are serving as co-chairmen on this year's autumn tea, assisted by Mrs. Richard Hessig, chairman of the Women of St. Paul's. All women in the Klamath Basin are invited to the afternoon event from 2 to 5 p.m.

Mrs. F. M. Bellinger and Mrs. Norman Guyer are in charge of tickets. They may be obtained through any member of the church or at the door on the day of the tea.

Guests will have the opportunity to view several pieces of antique furniture inherited by Mrs. Whytal from her grandfather, B. D. Minkler, who was one of the first legislators in the state of Washington. The early American cabinet desk, side table, and occasional table of carved oak are used to furnish the upper landing of her home.

Auction To Offer 'Harvest' Of Items

A 1955 Plymouth and a pig are among the wide variety of items to be auctioned at the Salvation Army Harvest Festival on Saturday, Oct. 12.

Now in its 42nd year, the annual festival will feature the traditional fresh fruits and vegetables, with auto accessories and equipment, 30 car washes, portable stereo, gasoline, home baked goods, glassware, women's and children's apparel, and canned goods also slated for the auction block.

Adding a new twist to the standard auction procedure, a local firm has offered to put a 1964 MG sports sedan up for bid, and the profit over the \$1,700 base price will be donated to the Salvation Army. The automobile, which retails for more than \$2,100, will be on display all day Saturday.

Auctioneer Bert Smith has volunteered his professional services and will open the bidding at the Salvation Army headquarters, Fourth and Klamath, at 7:30 p.m. Marking his second year on the auctioneer's platform, Smith has also been instrumental in securing many of the donated items, according to Capt. Dale Johnson, commanding officer.

The goal for the 1964 SOS appeal was announced by Canon Almon R. Pepper, chairman of the executive committee of Church World Service, National Council of Churches, which sponsors the program on behalf of major American Protestant and Eastern Orthodox denominations.

Canon Pepper also explained the change in the designation of the SOS appeal this year to "Share Our Substance" from the former "Share Our Surplus."

"The change reflects a desire to better express the spirit of sharing between the American Christian community and our friends abroad," said Canon Pepper.

Scheduled for distribution in 1964 are 446,564,000 pounds of SOS foods destined for the needy in Africa, Asia, Latin America, Europe, and the Middle East. Value of the foods is approximately \$25 million.

The foodstuffs include wheat, rolled wheat, flour, bulgar (a processed wheat derivative), beans, cheese, butter, butter oil, ghee (a semi-liquid butter), corn meal, powdered milk, and cooking oils.

These foods used in the overseas program of the churches are made available from U.S. Government commodities in excess of amounts first set aside to relieve need in the United States.

During the past year, over 400 million pounds of government-donated and other foods were distributed through the SOS program to millions of hungry people in 35 areas of acute human need.

U.S. Boasts Largest Synagogue

DETROIT—The world's largest synagogue is the Shaarey Zedek Synagogue located on a 40-acre site in Southfield, Mich., a suburb of Detroit. Built at a cost of almost \$4,000,000, it is capable of seating 5,000 people.

The synagogue includes a 13,000-square foot arched roof sanctuary flanked by two multi-purpose social halls, as well as five chapels, a library, numerous meeting rooms, and a school wing of 29 classrooms.
