(Continued From Page 1) "Strong convention-oriented organization." Today's scheduled conference program was a warmup for Saturday's Rockefeller-Goldwater appearances. Rockefeller speaks at noon and Goldwater at 7 p.m., both in the 10,000-seat McArthur Court Basketball Pavilion. They're not expected to meet. The opening day of the conference included a Western problems panel featuring Colorado Sen. Gordon Allott, the Wyoming Gov. Milward Simpson and Rep. John Saylor, R-Pa. Other sessions were concerned with party communications and organization. William E. Miller, GOP national chairman, and Texas Sen. John Tower speak at a dinner session tonight.

Another Goldwater backer, Arizona Gov. Paul Fannon, said Thursday night that the "moderates and liberals" in the GOP were switching to Goldwater and he was "building extremely fast." In an internal hotel lobby news conference Thursday night, Hatfield warned both candidates that they must have strong, "convention-oriented organizations to win the nomination." He said that if Goldwater "feels he can win with just popularity polls his undeniable strong support by party members is waning." As an example, he cited the 1962 GOP national convention when the late U.S. Sen. Robert A. Taft had "popular support" but the eventual nominee, Dwight D. Eisenhower, had a

Highway Chairman Raps Delay On Road Projects

Delay by the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads in completing some of its Oregon projects was criticized Thursday by chairman Glenn Jackson of the State Highway Commission, the Herald and News learned Friday. The protest followed action by the commission in which it approved a \$3.6 million budget for the forest highway program for fiscal year 1963, including some \$300,000 to grade, base, and lay an oil mat on 2.5 miles of road along the Klamath Lake Highway, near Rocky Point. Jackson said he planned to file a formal protest with the bureau. He cited as examples the Otis Junction-Neskowin section of the Coast Highway and a section of the Lake of the Woods Highway in Southern Oregon. Jackson said the first contract on the coast project was awarded in August, 1958, with completion set for 1961. Latest reports are that the road will be opened next month. Work on the Lake of the Woods Highway was started in 1959 and apparently will be completed some time next year, instead of this year, as planned. Klamath County Engineer John Creed said the project in question is the new state highway linking Lake of the Woods with Medford, via Eagle Point. The project, subjected to many setbacks, was delayed further this year as the result of a large rock slide which blocked a portion of the proposed route, Creed said. Meanwhile, the state highway commission was going ahead with its plans for the 1963 forest highway program. The program will include improvements on seven forest highways in the state. Scheduled to receive the improvements are the Oregon Coast Highway, Crater Lake Highway, McKenzie Highway, Cascade Lakes Highway. The improvements program has already received the sanction of the U.S. Forest Service and the Bureau of Public Roads. Projects, other than the one at Rocky Point in Klamath County, include: Crater Lake Highway; Base and pave 6.7 miles and pave 1.5 miles, \$500,000. Cascade Lakes Highway; Base and paving on a 10.1 mile section between Kiva Springs and Bachelor Butte, \$500,000. Mt. Hood Highway; Paving of 6.8 miles of the section from Polallie Creek south, \$350,000. An additional \$200,000 will be used for surveys.

Kresse, fourth. Each of the two teams placed first in their respective sections of the six-section event. Mrs. L. C. Binnion of Lakeview paired with Mrs. Tom R. Parker of Grants Pass to win the charity event. The three-day event drew players from three states. They competed at 244 tables. 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Three-Vehicle Crash Injures Two Drivers

A three-vehicle rear end collision involving a freightliner truck and two passenger cars resulted in neck injuries to the drivers of both cars, in one of two automobile accidents near the Lakeview Junction Thursday. Each of the injured complained to a whiplash and were taken by Peace Ambulance to the Klamath Valley Hospital where they received outpatient treatment and were released. They were Wendel Laverne Wood, 32, of 2544 Union Avenue, and Clarice Melvina Owens, 38, of 4822 Cottage Avenue. A passenger in the latter's automobile, Willie Perry Owens, 44, also of the Cottage Avenue address, apparently was not injured, state police reported. The accident developed as the vehicles operated by Wood and Mrs. Owens stopped behind a school bus which was discharging passengers near the Lakeview Junction, about 2:40 p.m. Meanwhile, George Albert Bedard, 27, of Portland, descended upon the stationary vehicles in a diesel truck and was unable to stop in time to avert the collision. He was cited by state police for following too closely. In the other accident, two vehicles received moderate damage when an automobile operated by Tracy Basel Burkhardt, 71, of 2389 Kane Street, turned left into the path of a car driven by J. Sterling Flagg, 43, of Rte. 3, Box 681, about 11:37 a.m. on South 68th Street in the vicinity of the Farmer's Lumber Company. State police said Flagg was attempting to overtake the Burkhardt car when the collision occurred.

Death Takes A. Minato

CHILOQUIN — Anselmo Minato, 74, a resident of Klamath County since 1916, and of Chiloquin since 1925, died at a nursing home Oct. 10. He had been ill since suffering a stroke in 1956. Mr. Minato had followed the lumbering trade during his life. He was a native of Italy, born at Fonte, Province of Steviso, May 14, 1889. He went first to San Francisco when he arrived in the U.S. in 1913, returned to Italy in 1920 and was married to Maria Forato. He served overseas in World War I with the 32nd Infantry, U.S. Army in France and was both wounded and gassed. Mr. Minato was a member of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Catholic Church, Chiloquin, The Sons of Italy, and was a charter member of Chiloquin Veterans of Foreign Wars No. 4065. Survivors are the widow, Maria, Chiloquin; three sons, Alfeo, Grants Pass, Norencio, Chiloquin, Remo, Portland; one daughter, Mrs. Vernon (Gina) Bier, San Francisco; three sisters in Italy, also nine grandchildren. The funeral will be recited Sunday, Oct. 13, 8 p.m. in O'Hair's Memorial Chapel. Services will be in the chapel at 9 a.m. Monday, Oct. 14, followed by final rites and interment in Mt. Calvary Cemetery.
