He was a native of Germany, and had been a resident of Klamath County since 1919. During his earlier lifetime he farmed in the Spring Lake District and later on followed the carpentry trade.

Mr. and Mrs. Noll lived in a trailer home for 16 years and spent their winters in Palm Springs, Ariz. Mr. Noll died a short time ago.

He was an ardent hunter and fisherman. Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Wayne (Erica) Wakku, Mrs. Lawrence (Frances) Westlund, both of Klamath Falls, Mrs. L. (Anna) Lambert, and five grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren.

She was well-known for her active work in the Suburban Christian Church.

Survivors include two daughters, Opal Ferguson, Klamath Falls, and Leta Beers, Vallejo, Calif.; two sons, Wayne Robertson, Salem, and Howard Robertson, Eugene, also 10 grandchildren, 16 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

OTI Founder Retires From Public Life

O. I. Paulson, who founded Oregon Technical Institute here in 1947, is retiring after 40 years of public service.

Paulson is an assistant superintendent of the State Department of Education in charge of the Division of Vocational Education. He is leaving the department at

the end of October, but was honored Wednesday with a reception in Salem.

Oregon Tech was known as the Oregon Vocational School when Paulson started it in 1947 while

in his post as head of the Division of Vocational Instruction. He is also credited with starting practical nurse training and the Future Farmers of America in Oregon.

Paulson came to Oregon from North Dakota in 1906 and attended public schools in Corvallis. He graduated from Oregon State University and later taught at the college.

Rouse Rites On Monday

Graveside services will be in Eternal Hills Memorial Gardens Monday, Oct. 14, at 2 p.m. for Walter Kall Rouse, 64, a former resident of Klamath Falls.

Mr. Rouse died Oct. 7 in a Woodland hospital from burns resulting from an explosion in his Sacramento trailer home. Actual cause of the tragedy is not known. Relatives say he had opened the gas refrigerator door to prepare a meal when the explosion blew out the living room, critically burning him. He lived several days following the accident. He had moved to the location a short time before his death.

Mr. Rouse was a World War I veteran. He left Klamath Falls last September to make his home.

Survivors include a daughter, June Maxwell, San Francisco; brothers, William Rouse, Mesa, Ariz., and Chester Rouse, Klamath Falls; also a sister, Mrs. Esther Billingham, Akron, Ohio.
