Punchless Forty Niners Drop 12th Straight Game

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The San Francisco Forty Niners got back to work today on what seems to be a losing proposition. The team dropped its 12th straight game Sunday to Baltimore 20-3 and next Sunday it plays host to the Chicago Bears, who lead the Western Division of the National Football League with five straight victories and no losses. The Forty Niners' record this year is 0-5. Most of the difficulty with the San Francisco club is lack of offensive power. The team gained only 120 yards net and for the first time in Forty Niner history it failed to make a first down rushing. "The defensive unit played pretty well," said coach Jack Christiansen, "and the offensive team showed some progress. We've got to improve every department each week."

No serious injuries were reported. Bob Waters, the quarterback whom Christiansen worked most of the game, also will get plenty of attention this week. The Forty Niner coach said he stuck with Waters because "I wanted to give him every chance to get the team moving."

Lamar McLean also will continue to familiarize himself with the offensive plays and should improve each week. The only score made by the Forty Niners was a 32-yard

Bears Wax Rams 52-14

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—George Halas and his undefeated Chicago Bears fear the San Francisco Forty Niners, he says, but it's hard to tell why today.

The Bears got their fifth consecutive win of the season Sunday before a crowd of 40,476 at Memorial Coliseum when they clobbered the Los Angeles Rams, 52-14.

End Mike Ditka caught four touchdown passes, Bill Wade threw three scoring strikes and his relief man, Rudy Bukich, threw two.

The Bears intercepted a total of six Ram passes thrown by alternating quarterbacks Terry Baker and Zeke Bratkowski. Bennie McItee ran one interception back 35 yards to a touchdown. Two other interceptions set up the opportunity for Bear TDs and two Ram fumbles led to other Chicago scores.

The 33-point margin was the worst defeat the Rams have suffered since they came here from Cleveland in 1946.

Like the Forty Niners, the Rams are 0-5 this season. Halas, in a pique mood after the game, was asked if he was worried about the Green Bay Packers whom the Bears beat 10-3 in the season's first game.

"The second Packer game is too far away," he said. "We're worried about the Forty Niners."

Baker set up one Ram touchdown with a 48-yard pass completion. He had one pass intercepted.

Oregon State Regroups Following 34-7 Shocker

State faced the job of pulling its battered football forces back together today after a shocking 34-7 loss to Washington here Saturday.

It was the first loss in 11 games for the Beavers and the first win in four tries this year for the Huskies, who failed to score more than one touchdown in each of their first three contests.

"We've been doing the same thing all along, only this time we did it better," Washington coach Jim Owens said after the contest.

"There was a kind of feeling. We've been frustrated so long and then the kids make and intensely a really good effort," Owens added.

Oregon State did not score until the last play of the game. Washington jumped off to a 7-0 lead in the first quarter on Charlie Browning's four-yard touchdown plunge. Steve Bramwell returned an OSU punt 92 yards in the second period for a 13-0 halftime lead and Browning scored again on a one-yard plunge for 20-0 edge after three quarters.

Then the Huskies caught the Beaver secondary asleep twice in the fourth quarter and scored a 28-yard pass and a 45-yard pass.

Big Six Teams Fold Again In International Contests

By SCOTT BAILLIE UPI Sports Writer That engaging ditty "I Get a Kick Out of You," only registered a dull thud today with Southern California and Stanford who were wrecked by field goals last Saturday as Big Six football representatives again folded on the intersectional front.

A 13-yard field goal by sophomore Ken Ivan gave Notre Dame a 17-14 win over ninth-ranked Southern California and the first win of the season for the Fighting Irish. Then in Houston, Tex., namesake Larry Rice booted a three-pointer that started the Owls toward a 23-13 win over Stanford.

But California, which wasn't expected to do much against Duke, pulled out a 22-22 tie with the Blue Devils who missed three field goal attempts and were penalized a vital 15 yards when the kicking team was thrown out at the wrong moment.

Next Saturday's Coast schedule brings Ohio State to Southern California while UCLA is at Notre Dame. Stanford is at Washington in the weekend's lone Big Six contest. San Jose State at California, Washington State at Oregon State, Oregon at Arizona, the University of the Pacific at Idaho and Cal Poly of San Luis Obispo at Fresno State.

After Syracuse had methodically worked over UCLA on Friday night, 29-7, Southern California ran into a band of fighting Irish at South Bend on Saturday led by Frank Budka, one of five Notre Dame quarterbacks.
