

# The End: Waivers Asked On Star Pair, Johnny Logan, Jim Lemon

Johnny Logan and Jim Lemon reached the same sad point in their major league baseball careers today, that awful moment when a ballplayer hears he's just about all through.

Logan, 36, received the news when the Pittsburgh Pirates asked waivers for the purpose of giving him his unconditional release.

And the 35-year-old Lemon was similarly advised when the Chicago White Sox requested waivers so that they could give

him his walking papers, too. Logan, who broke into the majors with the Braves in 1948 and has a .268 lifetime average, still feels he can help some ball club as a utility infielder. He batted .232 in 40 games serving in that capacity with the Pirates last season.

**Started With Indians**  
Lemon began his major league career with Cleveland in 1950 and spent most of it with Washington. He started the 1962 season with Minnesota, was acquired by Philadelphia and then returned to the American League with the White Sox.

During 31 games with the Phillies, Lemon batted .271 while his composite average in the American League with the Twins and White Sox was .196 in 43 games.

The two veterans were let go as the major league clubs revised their rosters to conform with the Oct. 15 deadline.

In addition to asking waivers on Lemon, the White Sox added rookie pitchers Bob Guzek, Tom Hongland and Ed Nottle. The club also placed outfielder Manny Johnston to Indianapolis of the International League.

Added Three Rookies  
The Indians also added three rookies to their roster—outfielder Paul Dicken, infielder Vern Fuller and pitcher Tom Kelley.

Washington purchased catcher Tony Brumley from the Los Angeles Dodgers for an unspecified sum. Brumley, 25, batted .292 for Spokane of the PCL and was named to the league's All-Star team.

Don Heffner, popular New York Yankee infielder of the 40s and manager of the San Diego Padres of the Pacific Coast League the last two years, was appointed to the New York Mets' coaching staff for the 1964 season.

The 52-year-old Heffner won the pennant with San Diego by 12 games in 1962 and lost out by a half-game the past season when a controversial game that was halted by rain was not replayed.

Heffner previously served as a coach with Kansas City and Detroit. He joins Mel Harder and Wes Westrum as Mets coaches and gives manager Casey Stengel an entirely new staff for next year.

## 49er Spark Seen Due In Return Of Kilmer

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (UPI)—The San Francisco Forty Niners, looking for an offensive spark, may get one in about a month.

Halfback Billy Kilmer, a never-give-up performer on and off the field, was to return to the practice field today after a remarkable recovery from an auto accident that almost ended his career—and his life.

Last Dec. 6, Kilmer narrowly escaped death in a Bayshore freeway accident that left his right leg nearly shattered.

Kilmer refused to give up. He did 40 chin-ups a day in the hospital and exercised the leg whenever possible.

Doctors will take X-rays in a month and it will be decided then if Kilmer can be re-activated for the Forty Niners' final four games.

Quarterback John Brodie also may be available for these games so the Prospectors could

wind up with an offense after all.

Both the running attack and the quarterbacking again broke down Sunday at Baltimore as the Colts moved to a 29-3 win.

Coach Jack Christiansen has little to say about the offense, but was high on the defense against the Colts.

"Those guys certainly gave the offense enough chances to score points, but they (the offense) never capitalized," he said.

Christiansen said that defensive end Clark Miller played his "best game ever" at Baltimore.

Place-kicker Tommy Davis missed three field goals and hit one in still another disappointing Forty Niner performance.

But Christiansen said that Davis received a charity horse at Detroit and has not been able to get his leg loosened up since then.

## 1st Masters Champ Horton Smith Dies

DETROIT (UPI) — Horton Smith, 55, the first Masters champion and a member of the PGA Hall of Fame, died today of Hodgkins disease.

Smith had been suffering from the disease for the past five years.

The pro at the Detroit Golf Club since 1946, Smith was attending the Ryder Cup matches Sunday when he collapsed.

Smith returned to Detroit Monday but collapsed again in his car and was rushed to a hospital where he was reported in satisfactory condition. But he took a turn for the worse and

died shortly after midnight. Smith, a past president of the PGA, won the first Masters at Augusta in 1934 and won the title again in 1936.

Smith won numerous other golf crowns including the French Open title on his 21st birthday in 1930.

Horton, who was married and divorced, is survived by his brother, Wren of Chicago.

His mother lives in Springfield, Mo., and a son lives in Pinehurst, N.C.

Smith was a native of Springfield.
