

Females Jump Ahead Of Men In Ballot Battle

SULPHURROCK, Ark. (UPI)—The battle of the sexes is in full swing in this north-central Arkansas community of 225. The ladies are far out in front. The women put up an all-female slate to oppose the gentlemen in the city's Nov. 5 election and then the men put together a hurried-up slate to run against them.

But Mrs. Varna Travis, candidate for mayor, kept the women one jump ahead. She waited until after the deadline for filing, and then announced two of the men candidates had not paid their poll taxes and therefore weren't eligible. Mrs. Travis has a state attorney general's opinion to back her up. Monday night she

said, "The boys are still speaking to me though."
"This ought to prove a woman can keep a secret," she said. "I didn't tell a soul about the poll taxes not being paid until after it was too late to refile."
Mrs. Travis admitted that she had not seen the two would-be candidates. She said it still is up to the county election board to rule on whether the two can run, but she is confident the board will see it her way.

Mrs. Travis said it was a mark of carelessness on the part of the men that they had neglected to pay their poll taxes.
"I think if they're so careless, so unfamiliar with the law, it shows we women could do a better job," Mrs. Travis said.
It was fairly easy for Mrs. Travis to get access to the poll tax records. She is the city's recorder and knows for certain who does and who doesn't pay their taxes.

School Lunches Important To Children And Food Industry

WASHINGTON (UPI)—More than 16 million children and about 68,000 individual schools are observing firsthand National School Lunch Week.
The children and the schools are directly affected by the school lunch program—the youngsters because they get a well-balanced noontime meal for a small sum and the schools

because they serve the meals. The program is administered nationally by the Agriculture Department.
A few weeks ago President Kennedy proclaimed Oct. 13-19 as National School Lunch Week. He called on the people to observe the week "with ceremonies and activities designed to increase public understanding and awareness of the significance of the school lunch program to the child, to the home, to the farm, to industry, and to the nation."

The school lunch program has been in operation for 17 years. The program is a non-profit enterprise, receives 20 per cent of its operational costs in food and assistance from the Agriculture Department. The remainder comes from state and local funds and from payments made by children for the lunches. Needy children eat without charge.
The national average charge for a school lunch is 27 cents. A typical school lunch consists of two ounces of meat, fish, poultry, cheese, eggs, peanut butter or beans; three-fourths cup of two vegetables and/or fruit; two teaspoons of butter or fortified margarine; a portion of enriched or whole grain bread; and a half pint of whole milk.

The school lunch provides an important outlet for tremendous quantities of food. Last year more than \$800 million worth went into the school lunch. About 80 per cent of this food was bought by schools from local suppliers. The remainder was made up of contributions from the department to assist local schools in providing nutritious lunches at low cost to children.
The school lunch program has given considerable impetus to

development and expansion of markets for non-fat dry milk, stabilized dried eggs, and canned citrus products. It has broadened outlets for pork, broiler-fryer chickens, and ground beef.
The program also has broadened the use of such regional foods as sweet potatoes, purple plums, cornbread, and Bartlett pears.

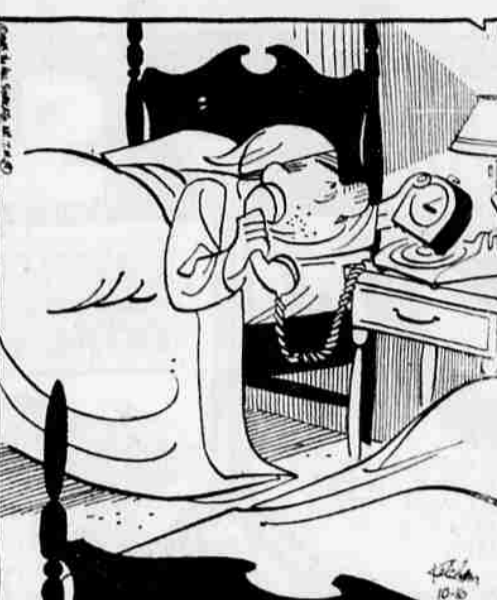

Flemming said at the close of business Oct. 11, the last day to register without special petition, 9,955 students had paid fees. A year ago there were 69 students who were accepted for registration by petition. Flemming said if the percentage trend continued the final registration would be about 10,025.
