

City To Get State Check For Airport

State and local aviation officials and pilots Friday will gather at Kingsley Field for the presentation of a check to the City of Klamath Falls for the resurfacing of two runways at Kingsley Field.

The \$19,840 check is from the State Board of Aeronautics, and covers the cost of materials for the job.

Work was completed last month on the two runways, 5,165 and 5,261 feet long respectively.

They were recovered with asphalt and a sealer was added. In addition, a shoulder was laid along each runway. City crews did the work. Complete cost of the job was \$30,522.17, of which \$19,840 will be paid by the state.

The check presentation will take place during a noon luncheon Friday at the Satellite restaurant. A representative of the State Board of Aeronautics will present the check to Klamath Falls Mayor Robert Veatch.

POLLY'S POINTERS Help For Bride

DEAR POLLY—To make shoe trees for women's pointed-toe shoes, unwind two wire c o t a hangers, place the straight end of the hanger in a toe and bend it at the desired length for the heel. I hang mine on the clothes rod by using the hook that was in the hanger. My feet are wide and my shoes get out of shape but this certainly helps to keep them nice looking.—MRS. J. S.

GIRLS—I liked this basic idea but was afraid the straight, rather sharp end might damage the shoe. I bend the end of the wire so there is a narrow V and its point goes into the toe. I love the idea of hanging them on a rod.—POLLY

DEAR POLLY—Ever try to work with a stiff chambray? It is a tough job. Place the chambray in a pan of warm water with a teaspoon or two of vegetable oil, soak for a few minutes and then rinse thoroughly. Softens it in a jiffy!—POLLY P.

DEAR POLLY—I have found a good way to store flower pots. Take a strong cord and tie a big knot (bigger than the holes in the pots) on the bottom of the cord. Then slide the flower pots on to the cord through the drainage holes. After the pots are strung on the cord, hang the

cord from a hook or shelf in the garage or basement.—MR. H. D. GIRLS—Another neat gentleman has thrown in his dollar's worth. If you have trouble making the knot large enough, tie an old clothespin in it and the pots will not slip through.—POLLY
