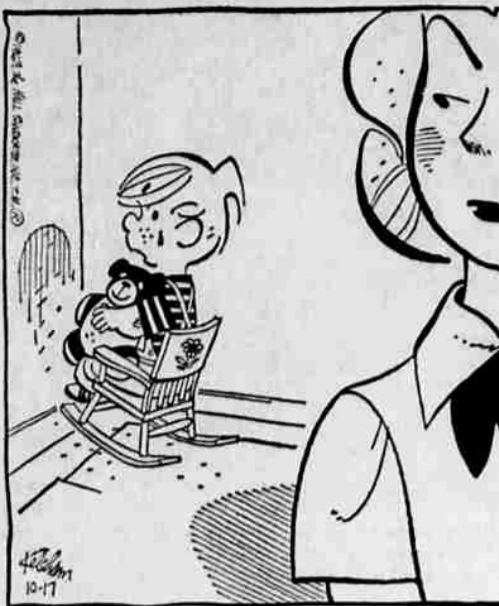

Quilting Bee Tip

DEAR POLLY—My hint is to make quilting much easier. Heat paraffin (same as used for jams and jellies) until it is good and hot. Place whole spools of thread in it and keep hot for a few minutes so the melted wax permeates the whole spool. The thread then glides through the material so much more easily and it makes threading the needle simpler, too. DEAR POLLY—I saved baby food jars, painted the lids to match the walls in the room where I sew and placed them on a rack near my sewing machine. **When Should Child Have Pet?**

Should your child be allowed to have a pet?  
If you already had an animal in the house before your baby was born, there is no problem, otherwise the answer would depend largely on the age of the child and how badly he wants a pet.

The dangers of disease transmitted from pets to your child or other members of your household are slight. No aspect of life is without danger, but your child is in less danger of getting a disease from a healthy pet than he is from the next-door neighbor's child.

Because dogs and cats are still the closest pets to come by—almost any child can get a mixed breed puppy or an "alley" cat—it is well to consider the rules set forth by Dr. H. E. Hilleboe, New York's state health commissioner, for the prevention of bites and scratches.

The first lesson your child must learn is not to leave his pet. Pets are sometimes surprisingly tolerant of teasing, but patted too far they may react with vicious suddenness.

If your child is old enough, he should read a pamphlet or book on the care of his pet. Such material can be obtained from your local anti-rabies society or the public library. Don't approach or touch a pet when it is eating and above all never try to take its food away from it.

Eating is just as absorbing a matter to the pet as it is to a human being. Don't wake your pet suddenly. If your child surprises a sleeping animal, it may snap at him. The old proverb "let sleeping dogs lie" can be taken literally as well as figuratively.

**Italians Rap Dam Report**  
ROME (UPI)—The government's preliminary report on the Vajont Dam disaster that killed an estimated 2,500 persons drew rumbles of dissatisfaction today from political parties ranging from the Communists to the neo-fascists.

Public Works Minister Fiorentino Sullo told parliament Tuesday night that a landslide had been expected above the dam—but not such a large slide as the one which roared down Mount Tovo a week ago, spilling millions of tons of water over the lip of the dam and through the Piave River Valley.

The survivors want to know if the tragedy could have been avoided. Giacomo Corona, for the Belluno area, said in the chamber of deputies. Some deputies demanded a full-scale parliamentary investigation of the disaster.

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
