

Kingsley Unit Adopts ROTC Outfit

EUGENE—The University of Oregon's Air Force ROTC detachment 690 has been "adopted" by the 408th Fighter Group stationed at Kingsley Field near Klamath Falls.

Col. John W. Koehler, said that the "adoption" ceremony will take place at Howe Field on the university campus at 1 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 24.

The ceremony, to which the public is invited, will include a

color guard, a precision drill marching unit, and a flyover of a formation of supersonic F-101 jet fighters from Kingsley.

Col. Edwin J. Witzemberger, Kingsley Field base commander, will speak briefly at the ceremony, as will University of Oregon President Arthur S. Flemming, Maj. James Price, assistant professor of air science at the university, will be the master of ceremonies.

Prior to the field ceremony there will be a luncheon for visitors and other honored guests in Erb Memorial Union.

"Adoptions" of ROTC units by active squadrons are becoming standard procedure and are designed to acquaint the student-airmen with Air Force base life.

Forest Report Indicates Better Hunting

LAKEVIEW—Hunting success is slightly improved over that at the first of the season on the Bly ranger district of the Fremont Forest, according to this week's report. Fishing is reported good at Lofton Reservoir and Hart Lake. Fire danger is medium because of last week's rain showers.

The warning is still main-

tained concerning logging traffic on the Fishhole Road, the county road to Camp Six, Road 345 to Sycan siding, and Road No. 3610 from the Lee Thomas Meadow area to Bly.

Fire danger is now moderate on the Drews Valley district, but care is still urged because of the slash and tall grass. Fishing is moderate to fair at Cottonwood; hunting has been poor as there were only a few light showers to relieve the dryness, but some of the side roads became muddy and slick.

Hunting is better on the Paisley district due to cooler air and a good soaking rain on Oct. 10. Fishing is fair on Sprague, Chewaucan, and Sycan rivers; Deadhorse and Campbell lakes are poor for fishing. The Summer Lake Rim closure is now open to recreationists.

Howell Fires 18 Workers

SALEM (UPI) — Eighteen maintenance workers were given dismissal notices and a \$340,000 cutback in spending was ordered by Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. Wednesday.

The move was the first major slash made in the wake of the voters' rejection of the tax increase measure.

Appling also said he had voted against the tax measure.

There are some slick spots on roads in the higher country; fire danger is down considerably but caution should still be used. There is frost almost every night and steady afternoon winds.

All main roads into Silver Lake have logging traffic. Hunting is fair to good; fishing at Thompson Reservoir is fair. Hunters are asked to be extremely careful with warming fires and fires built in unimproved campsites.

A few hunters have reported good success in the Warner dis-

trict, but deer hunting is generally only fair. Wild plums are nearly gone. Fire danger is now only moderate as a result of rain last week, but the rain did not materially reduce the hazard in the heavy slash areas. The grass-sagebrush areas have dried sufficiently to also present a fire hazard.
