Beavers Come Back Blasting WSU 30-6

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI) — Oregon State capitalized on the deadly passing combination of quarterback Gordon Queen to end Vern Burke and Washington State mistakes for a 30-6 homecoming football victory Saturday.

Queen connected for three touchdowns, two of them to the rangy Burke.

The junior quarterback also has a 16-yard scoring pass to halfback Danny Espalin. Fullback Bruce Williams got the other Oregon State touchdown on a one-yard plunge and Steve Clark added the rest of the points on a 33-yard field goal and three conversions.

It was the fourth victory in five starts for the Beavers, who rebounded from a 34-7 beating by Washington last week.

Washington State scored first on a one-yard plunge by fullback Larry Eilmes.

Eilmes carried the ball nine times in the drive.

Leroy Whittle's 41-yard kick-off return and an exchange of fumbles gave Oregon State the ball in Cougar territory and Burke hauled in an eight-yard pass to tie it 6-6.

Washington state then moved to the Beavers' five but was held. For all intents and purposes, the Cougars were dead right there.

Tim Osmer's fumble recovery set up Clark's field goal. Then a pass interception by Marv

Crowston on the Washington State 39 led to a Queen-to-Burke touchdown just before halftime. This one covered 21 yards and Burke caught the ball while falling down after it had been deflected.

Burke caught six passes for 77 yards. He has only 19 for the season but six of them have been for touchdowns. Last year Burke caught 69 passes for 1,007 yards, both NCAA records.

Queen now has 10 touchdown passes for the season.

Nicklaus Snares Tie For Sahara Top Spot

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Big Jack Nicklaus, using his tremendous wrist power to come out of the deep rough, fired his second consecutive 66 Saturday to tie long-shot Al Geiberger and Goy Brewer for a 49-yard lead in the \$70,000 Sahara golf tournament with 54-hole scores of 207.

The 207 totals gave the leaders a one-shot lead over Don Whitt, playing his first tournament in three months; Bob Harrison and Claude King, who both had chances to tie for the lead, but three-putted the 18th hole.

Geiberger shot a 69 Saturday and Brewer had a 70.

Ducks Roll On Downing Arizona Wildcats 28-12

TUCSON, Ariz. (UPI) — Quarterback Bob Berry spread Arizona's defenses with accurate passes Saturday and halfback Mel Renfro gained 116 yards for a 28-12 Oregon win in a penalty-filled game.

A regional television audience and a stadium crowd of 16,000 watched the ducks, ranked 15th nationally, score in each period behind Berry who passed for 190 yards and one touchdown. A 19-yard scoring pass from Berry to end Rich Schwab climaxed a 66-yard march in the first quarter.

Berry tallied a touchdown on a one-yard keeper in the last period. Renfro hurdled the lighter Arizona line to score from three yards out in the second quarter. Biggest play of that 75-yard march was a 34-yard pass from Berry to tight end Dick Imwalle. Fullback Lu Bain bulled over left tackle from three yards for Oregon's other touchdown.

Arizona, going down to its third defeat in five games, avoided a shutout with two touchdowns against Oregon substitutes in the last quarter. Fullback Dave Knott swept right

Ashland Club Increases Oregon Collegiate Lead

SOUTHERN OREGON COLLEGE, Ashland — The league leading Southern Oregon Red Raiders received their most severe test to date here Saturday night.

An inspired band of Oregon Tech Owls gave the Raiders fits before bowing in the final quarter by a 29-14 count.

It was in the one phase of the defensive game in which the Owls had been lacking in some games this year—pass defense—in which the Oregon Tech club found its biggest success.

And it was All-American Sonny Luke, turning his football talents to defense and grabbing three Bill Bailey aeriels two of which were turned into Oregon Tech touchdowns.

The Owls completely dominated the first half of the contest moving to a 14-0 score at the intermission and giving the Red Raider coaching staff plenty to discuss in the dressing room.

The initial score of the contest came following an OTI punt to the Raider eight. Two plays later Bailey attempted a pass and the speedy Luke came out of nowhere to gather it in and race into the end zone untouched.

Dave Dirksen came off the bench to add his talents with the PAT kick and the Owls owned an unexpected 7-0 lead.

Not content with this slim lead against the dangerous Raiders, the Owls struck again in the second period and it was another pass interception by Luke setting up the score.

Luke stopped the SOC drive on the Oregon Tech 15 with this interception and the Owls drove the required 85 yards in 16 plays with Mike Glines scoring from the one.

The largest gain of the drive was a 39-yard pass from Glines to Ben Olson putting the Owls within scoring distance on the Red Raider 25. After the TD, Dirksen again kicked the PAT.

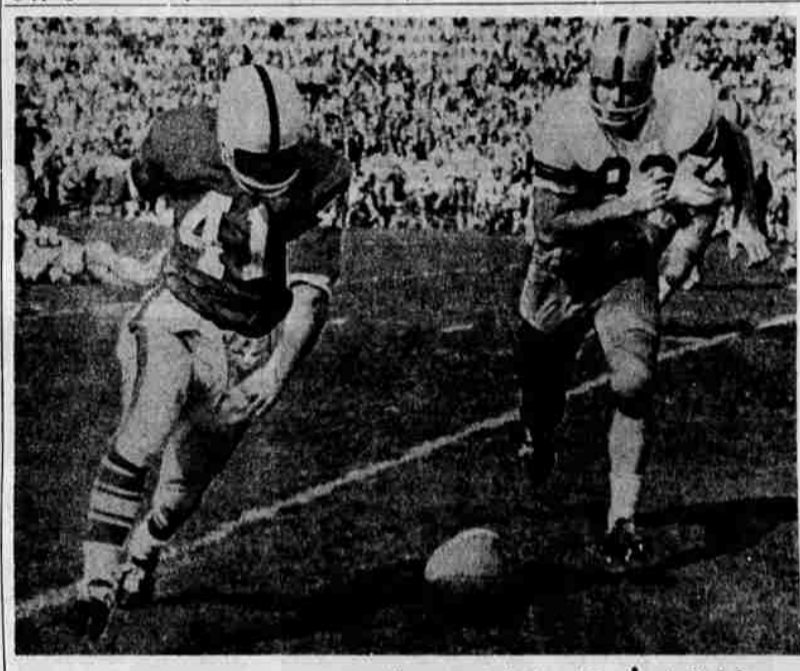
In the third chapter the Raider came back to tally twice on a 56-yard march and a 64-yard drive to deadlock the issue.

The Raiders repelled another Owl scoring probe in the final stanza as the Oregon Tech club drove from its 20 to the Red Raider six before a fumble ended the threat.

Following an exchange of punts and the Owls with the ball on the Raider 14, the Oregon Tech "toe" was again called upon this time for a field goal attempt, however, the Raiders charged through to block the effort and take over.

The Raiders took over on their 17 and in two plays had the lead for the first time in the game with 7:04 left in the contest.

Trojans Rip Ohio State; Auburn Upsets Georgia Tech

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Pete Beathard came into his own as one of the nation's top quarterbacks Saturday by guiding University of Southern California to a surprise 32-3 victory over Ohio State in an intercollegiate football clash witnessed by 61,883.

Ohio State ran into a swarm of bees as Willie Brown and end Hal Bedsole joined Beathard in stinging the Buckeyes into their first loss of the season.

Brown started the rout in the second period by breaking over tackle for a 49-yard touchdown to put the Trojans ahead 9-3. Beathard ran for one score in the third period and passed for another to put the game out of Ohio State's reach.

Tech Stopped

ATLANTA (UPI) — The unbeaten Auburn Tigers paralyzed the passing and running of quarterback Jimmy Sidle Saturday into a 29-21 upset of sixth-ranked Georgia Tech.

With Sidle, a 200-pound junior from Birmingham, Ala., rolling up 200 yards, the 16th ranked Tigers ran up the highest score any team has made against defensive-minded Georgia Tech since 1950 when Alabama beat the Yellow Jackets 54-19.

A record crowd of 53,091 sat in stunned silence in the closing minutes of play after Auburn halfback Tucker Frederickson intercepted a pass on the Auburn 1 yard line to doom Georgia Tech's last-ditch hope to salvage a tie.

Bruins Downed

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (UPI) — Notre Dame's Hugh Devore used his Irish Legions — four full teams of them — Saturday and demolished UCLA 27-12.

The Irish used 13 ball-carriers and Devore had his second and third teams in action in the second period when the Uclans scored for the first time. Five Irish quarterbacks played on offense.

The Irish first team punched out a 14-0 lead in only 17 minutes of play and thereafter the entire starting lineup was rarely in action at the same time.

Frank Budka, the starting signal caller, scored one touchdown on a four-yard run and passed for two others for 11 yards to Joe Kantor and for 18 to Jim Kelly.

For the game, he connected on seven of 10 tries for 86 yards.

Falcons Lose

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (UPI) — Maryland upset Air Force, 21-14 Saturday on a 36-yard touchdown pass from Dick Shiner to flanker Darryl Hill in the last two seconds of play.

The electrifying play, giving the underdog Terps their first victory of the season, climaxed a second half rally during which Maryland completely outplayed the Falcons, who had jumped off to a 14-0 halftime lead.

The winning points came after Maryland had battled back to a 14-14 tie and then got the ball on halfback Ernie Arizzi's interception of Terry Isaacson's pass on the Terps' 38 with 55 seconds to go. Shiner hit Hill with a perfect pass in the Air Force 28 and three plays later, with the clock running out, rifled one down the middle to Hill again, the speedster catching it on the two and diving over.

Pitt Triumphs

MORGANTOWN, W. Va. (UPI) — Pitt's Paul Martha broke over tackle and outraced the entire West Virginia secondary on a 46-yard touchdown run midway in the fourth period to give the third-ranked Panthers a 13-10 come-from-behind win over the Mountaineers Saturday.

West Virginia had taken a 10-7 lead over Pitt with about eight minutes remaining in the final period on a five-yard pass from Jerry Yost to Dick Leftridge.

Tribe Nipped

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI) — Quarterback Bill Douglas and end Jake Kupp hooked up for a touchdown passing combination twice within five plays Saturday as Washington rolled to a 19-11 Big Six football victory over Stanford.

But the play that electrified the crowd of 54,000 came in the first period when Washington halfback Ron Medved broke through right guard and raced 88 yards for a touchdown to open the day's scoring. Medved carried the ball eight times for 129 yards and also intercepted two Stanford passes.

The Douglas-Kupp combo started clicking in the third period. Douglas hit Kupp with a 38-yard pass to cap a scoring drive that covered 57 yards in four plays.

Duke Scores

DURHAM, N. C. (UPI) — Sophomore sensation Scotty Glacken tossed four touchdown passes, three to senior end Stan Crisson, to give Duke a 35-30 Atlantic Coast Conference victory over Clemson Saturday.

Glacken, who moved to a starting job when Dave Uible was hurt in the first game of the season, hit Crisson with touchdown passes of 24, 11 and 28 yards in one of the most free scoring games in the 10-year history of the series.

Halfback Jay Wilkinson, son of Oklahoma football coach Bud Wilkinson, caught the fourth Glacken touchdown pass, this one for 23 yards for the first score of the game.

Wilkinson also ran 67 yards on the opening play from scrimmage in the second half to account for another Duke touchdown.

Detroit Mayor Says Gift Charge Absurd

BADEN - BADEN, Germany (UPI)—Detroit Mayor Jerome P. Cavanaugh said Saturday that charges of "extravagant propaganda" and "gift-making" against his delegation bidding for the 1968 Olympics were "ridiculous, absurd" and "ludicrous."

Detroit lost out to Mexico City in the vote for hosting the 1968 summer Olympics. Lyon, France, and Buenos Aires were the other cities involved.

International Olympic Committee member Olav Dilev-Simonsen of Norway charged the four cities with "too much lecturing, canvassing and party throwing" and accused the bidders of showering gifts on IOC delegates in an attempt to sway the vote. He also blasted Detroit for bringing a delegation of "almost 100 strong."

Cavanaugh, who led the Detroit campaign with Gov. George Romney of Michigan, said "As I pointed out in Detroit's presentation, we had a delegation of approximately 50 people here in Baden-Baden of which more than 30 paid their own way for the purpose of lending moral support to the cause."

"We gave no individual gifts of any nature to any members of the IOC," he said. "This gratuitous attack upon the efforts of our people is ridiculous and absurd, particularly in view of the results of the balloting. Such ludicrous accusations are hardly in keeping with the spirit of Baron de Coubertin and the oft-mentioned Olympic ideal."

Badgers Win

IOWA CITY, Iowa (UPI)—Mighty Wisconsin, continually foiled and frustrated by a stingy Iowa defense, finally found enough offensive punch Saturday to come from behind and eke out a 10-7 Big Ten victory.

The Badgers, ranked second in the nation, were held to a single field goal in the first half and scored the clincher on a 9-yard pass from Harold Brandt to Louis Holland in the third period.

The upstart Hawkeyes, tied for the Big Ten lead with the Badgers heading into the contest, grabbed a brief lead in the third period when reserve halfback Lonnie Rogers scooted 21 yards for a touchdown and a 7-3 Iowa advantage.

Orange Wins

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (UPI) — Halfback Billy Hunter, a speedster who averages close to six yards per carry, sped 53 yards to a first-half touchdown and John Paglio kicked a 24-yard field goal Saturday to give Syracuse a 9-0 victory over Penn State in a battle of Eastern football powers.

A crowd of 39,687 saw Hunter take a handoff from quarterback Rich King and burst through a solid wall of Penn State defenders. He whipped into the open and outraced the Penn State secondary to put the Orange in front 6-0.

Hornet JVs Top Tule

The Henley JV team posted a 25-0 victory over the visiting Tulelake JVs Saturday, scoring twice in the first period and once each in the second and fourth.

Bob Tucker hit paydirt twice for the Hornet JVs on runs of 45 and 25 yards and Steve Bueberg tallied on a 40-yard romp. Geoff Garret passed to Steve Harless for the other TD from 20 yards out.

The two teams meet again on Friday, Nov. 1, at Tulelake.
