Henley's Hornets churned through a lifeless Rogue River squad Friday night for six touchdowns while grinding out 348 yards on the ground and in the air and sent the visitors back over the mountain with a 39-0 whitewash.

It was the fifth straight victory for Henley over the Chiefs and boosted the Hornets into third place in the Rogue Valley League. Both teams had identical 2-1 league records going into Friday night's contest.

The Hornets showed unchallenged mastery over the Chiefs throughout the game Friday and one Rogue River coach said it was the worst showing his team had made all year.

Rogue River could gain only 78 yards on the ground and passed 10 times incomplete, while losing 70 yards in penalties.

Meanwhile, Henley, riding on the legs of halfback Kim Hale and fullback Bill Fisher, totaled 253 yards on the ground and 95 yards in the air.

Hale made two spectacular runs, one for 35 yards and the other for 25 and gained a total of 79 yards. Fisher, carrying the ball 15 times, gained 63 yards.

Hale also passed successfully for Henley's first touchdown and caught another pass for a 23-yard gain.

Little Fred Rodriguez, entering the game late, showed promising running ability by scooting through the line from the halfback slot three times, once for an eight-yard touchdown scamper.

Henley struck for its first touchdown in the second quarter and the score at the half was 6-0. But the Hornets hit for two more TD's in the third quarter and four tallies in the fourth period.

Henley, in rolling up its impressive victory, gained 17 first downs — 10 on rushing, six on penalties and one with a pass. Rogue River got six first downs — five on rushing and one on a penalty.

Both teams were plagued by penalties during the evening and the referee assessed 70 yards against each squad on flags.

The teams traded the ball back and forth during the first quarter and neither was able to drive deeply in the other's territory.

Late in the first quarter, Henley began a drive on its own 45 and had marched up to the

Rogue River 15 with two first downs when the quarter ended.

The first play of the second period saw Henley quarterback Steve Rand get caught behind the line of scrimmage for a 12-yard loss.

But on the very next play, halfback Hale wound up with the ball after a double reverse and passed. The ball glanced off the hands of two Rogue River defenders before Elton Schiro scooped it off his shoe laces and scampered five yards into the end zone for Henley's first score.

The rest of the second quarter saw the teams again trade the ball back and forth until Henley was able to drive to the Rogue River 11. But the Hornets fumbled and Rogue River recovered on its own 10.

The Hornet offense forced the Chiefs to punt from their own end zone to the 23-yard line. On Henley's first play, Rogue River's Arden Liles intercepted quarterback Rand's pass and ran to his own 30. But there was only time for one more play and that's where the half ended.

In the second half, Henley took the opening kickoff to its 40-yard line, then marched on the ground to the Rogue River one-yard line in nine plays. One of the plays was Hale's 35-yard run.

From the one-yard line, fullback Fisher ran around right end for the touchdown. The conversion pass was intercepted and the score stood at 12-0.

Henley and Rogue River again traded the ball back and forth until Henley took a Chieftain punt on its own 47 and began another march, taking the pigskin to the Rogue River 25 in four plays.

Then, from the Rogue River 25, halfback Hale swept around right end for the touchdown. The PAT kick failed and the score was 18-0.

The Hornets regained control of the ball just three plays later when the Chieftains fumbled on their own 30.

Rand passed to Hale from the 24 and Hale went down to the one-yard line. On the next play, Hale again went over for the score. A penalty on the conversion sent the ball back to the eight-yard line from which it was booted over the uprights and the score was 25-0.

Rogue River again was held by the Henley defense after the kickoff, and finally was forced to punt to the Henley 44-yard line.

Another Henley quarterback, Gary Barker, immediately passed to Schiro for 36 yards and the Hornets pushed into the end zone again on a run by 127-pound Fred Rodriguez from the eight-yard line. The kick was good and the score was 32-0.

The final Henley tally came late in the fourth period after the Hornets regained the ball when Rogue River punted.

In three plays and aided by a 15-yard penalty against the Chieftains, Henley again pushed into the end zone with a pass from Rand to end Mike Zagorsky from the 11.

A minute later, the game ended.

Lakeview Slows IV Before Losing, 12-0

The Lakeview Honkers gave the strong Illinois Valley Cougars problems at Lakeview Friday night before dropping a 12-0 decision to the Rogue Valley League co-leaders.

It was a fumble by the Honkers setting up the initial Cougar touchdown and this coming only after the Honkers had stopped an Illinois Valley drive on the Honker four.

Two plays later the Honkers gave the ball back to the Cougars via the fumble and the visiting club capitalized by scoring as Ron Thornhill went over from two yards out.

The next Cougar score was not to come until the third period and only after the Honkers had threatened to tie the contest or take the lead.

It was 75-yard drive put together by the Cougars following

a Honker punt, with Thornhill again scoring this time from four yards away.

Five times the Honkers moved to the five only to be turned back. And, near the end of the fray, coach Roy Robertson's club threatened a final time, but a pass attempt was intercepted on the goal line to end the final try.

"I was real pleased with our defense in the contest. We stopped their bread-and-butter stuff—the outside running—and this gave us a good chance," commented Robertson.

Next Friday night the Honkers travel to Henley, with their overall record now 0-6 and the league mark at 0-4.
