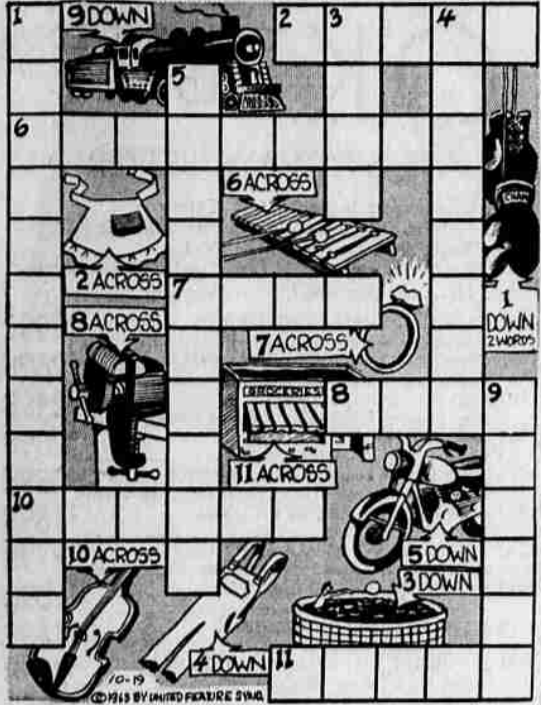

Winners here will enter state competition later this fall. Prizes include a two-week trip to the Caribbean, a college scholarship and \$35,000 in other prizes.

She won a sewing machine in 1961 state competition and a lesser prize last year. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Taylor.

## THE OWL HOOTS

If an institution had no alumni there would be little reason to have a Homecoming. Oregon Tech, of course, does have alumni—and many in which it takes great pride—and it is going to have a Homecoming next weekend. Homecoming, on the other hand, often does not coincide with the opportunities that alumni have to return to the campus.

On Thursday an Oregon Tech grad returned to the campus for the first time since he graduated in 1960. He was raised in Toledo, Ore., and spent two years in the Navy prior to coming to Oregon Tech. Immediately after graduating, he went to S and A Corporation in Livermore, Calif., as a staff assistant in an electronics engineering group. In March of 1963 he accepted a position as an application engineer with Sonex, Inc., a company which manufactures telemetering components for the missile and space-age industry. Actually, he was a trouble shooter for airborne telemetering systems. He visited Oregon Tech last week shortly after being promoted to Western regional manager of Sonex, Inc., with headquarters in Encino, Calif. The company's headquarters are in Philadelphia and the Western Region includes all of the territory west of the Mississippi River.

Oregon Tech's Homecoming will begin next Friday evening at 6:30 with a serpentine to the bonfire site near the new campus. A rally dance in the Student Union ballroom will follow at 9 p.m. A booth for alumni registration will be open throughout the evening in the Student Union. Saturday's events will begin with a 9:30 a.m. parade of floats and bands. The parade will begin at Third and Klamath and proceed down Main Street to Modoc Field. Guided tours of the new campus beginning at 11 a.m. will be open to the public.

The Oregon Tech Owls will meet the Oregon College Wolves in a 1:30 p.m. Homecoming football game on Modoc Field. An innovation in this year's activities during the halftime at the game will be a parade of the floats and the first announce-

ment of the winning float and the winner in the queen contest. Alumni president Bill Glodowski will crown the queen and present the queen and her court to the audience. Considering the beautiful Indian summer weather we are having and the fact that the game will be played in the afternoon and the added attraction of halftime activities, it might be an excellent opportunity for the not-too-ardent-fans-of-football to see the Owls in action.

A highly rated local 18-piece dance band, the Starlighters, will furnish the music for the Homecoming dance which will be held in the campus gymnasium from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. The public is invited.

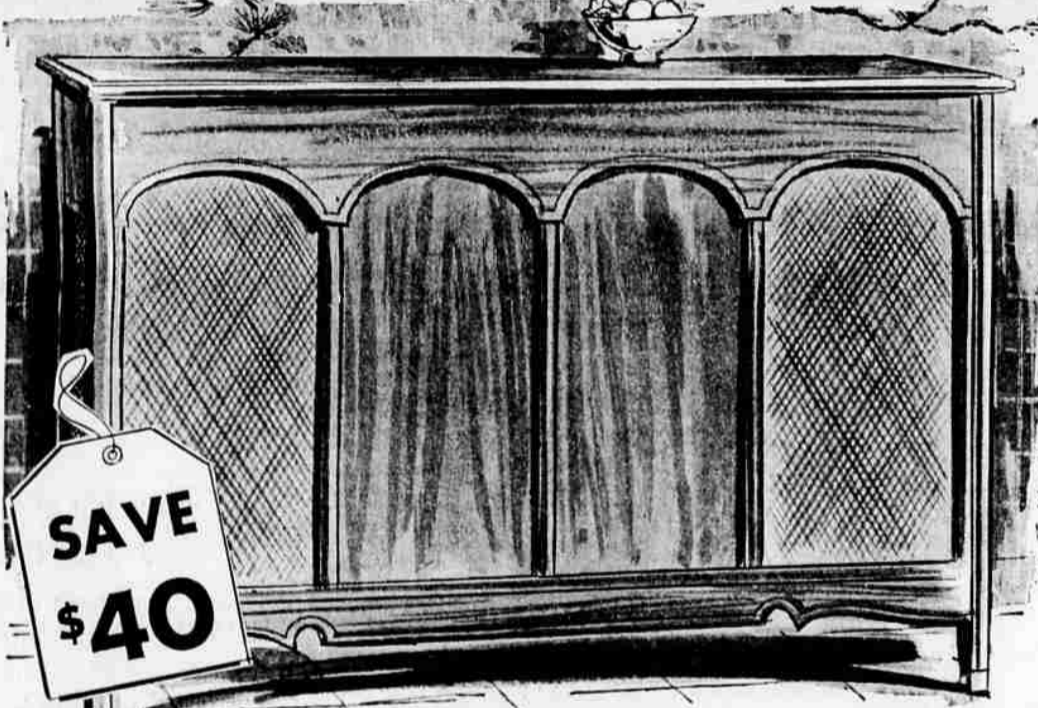
