

OCE Homecoming Opponent For OTI

Bruised and sore, but ready. This was the word from the mile-high campus Tuesday as the Oregon Tech Owls made ready for their homecoming contest set for Saturday afternoon against the Oregon College Wolves at Modoc Field.

It was an inspired band of Owls taking the field against the strong Southern Oregon College Red Raiders last Saturday night at Ashland and moving to a 14-0 halftime lead before succumbing to the vastly more experienced Raiders in the second half.

Undaunted, Owls are now setting their sights on the Wolves and an attempt to begin a salvage job of the entire season by posting their second win of the season at the expense of the Monmouth eleven.

The last win for the Owls over the Wolves came in 1960 when a 29-13 triumph was recorded over Bill McArthur's club. In 1961 the teams played to a 7-7 standoff and last year it was a 27-7 victory for the Wolves.

Returning for the Wolves are a pair of gridders who made things difficult for Ron Pfeister's Owls last year.

These are halfback Frank Ellis and Steve Jackson.

It was Ellis, a 5-10, 160-pounder from Jefferson of Portland, who rambled 49 yards on the opening series for the Wolves.

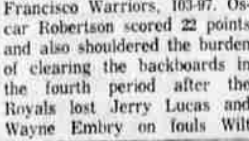

And it was Jackson, a 6-3, 172-pound wingman and a two-year letterman from Salem, who picked off a pair of aerials last year for touchdowns. One was on a pass-run covering 67 yards and the other a 29-yard pass effort.

Ellis and his receiving ability is still a menace for Wolves' opponents, however, this year on the throwing end of the OCE aerials is freshman Dave Laney, a 150-pounder from Scappoose.

Last Saturday the Wolves downed Eastern Oregon, with Laney connecting on nine of 16 attempts for 150 yards.

And his favorite target was Jackson who gathered in six receptions for 124 yards and one touchdown.

Thus far this year, although winning only one of five outings, the Owls have doubled the attendance figure through their wide-open style of play over last year.

Fifty Grand Said Price Slated For Berra Signing As Manager

NEW YORK (UPI)—Sound-thinking Yogi Berra, faced with a choice of two managerial jobs will prove once again he's nobody's dummy when he officially signs to manage the New York Yankees Thursday for \$50,000.

The 38-year-old Yogi thus will turn his back on a decidedly less tempting opportunity to manage the Baltimore Orioles.

His signing at an appropriately elaborate press conference also will complete a high echelon reshuffling by the Yankees which began Tuesday when 44-year-old Ralph Houk succeeded 61-year-old Roy Haney as general manager.

Yogi Was Ready
The naming of Berra as the Yankees' new manager may come as something of a surprise to the general baseball public but it certainly won't bowl over Yogi.

Like Houk, Berra was fully aware all last year that he would step up the Yankee ladder at this time.

When the Boston Red Sox showed interest in Yogi as a manager before they hired Johnny Pesky a year ago, the Yanks advised Berra to "sit tight."

And when President Lee Mac Phail of the Orioles inquired as to Yogi's availability during the past two weeks, the Yankees told him they had managerial plans for Berra themselves.

Began With Yankees
Berra, who began his career with the Yankees in 1946 and served as a player-coach last season, batted .293 for them this year and hit eight homers. He owns a .285 lifetime batting average and his 338 homers are the most ever hit by a catcher in major league history.

Grizzlies Next On Tap For Klamath Falls Pels

It's the Ashland Grizzlies visiting Klamath Falls Friday night as the Pelicans return to Southern Conference action.

Based upon the records of the respective teams, it figures to be an interesting contest.

The Grizzlies just having ended a 13-game losing streak and the Pelicans currently mired in a seven-game losing skein including the final tilt of the 1962 season.

Coch John Gray's Ashland Grizzlies come to Modoc Field Friday night with a new offense, a new spirit and a new coach to match.

Gray took over the reins of the Grizzlies this year after having been in the Ashland system for several years.

Under the new mentor, the Grizzlies dropped the first two meetings of the season to Shasta High of Redding, Calif., and Lebanon respectively before stopping their losing streak which had reached 13 at the expense of Sweet Home.

Since the third game of the season, the Grizzlies have met and defeated Yreka and last weekend lost their opening conference contest to Grants Pass, 39-6.

In running the T offense, the Grizzlies look to a pair of quarterbacks in Dave Barger and Dave Lohman.

With these two, the Grizzlies have been a passing club, with the use of split ends and flankers and have been throwing the ball from 12 to 15 times per game.

The Grizzlies also run their T offense from an unbalanced line and also employ the tackle eligible pass from this formation.

In attempting to slow the Grizzlies, the Pelicans will count on

such people as guard Mike McKibbin and defensive standouts such as Terry Christianson, a 174-pound senior; Don Plowman, a 215-pound junior; 152-pound junior linebacker Ben Kerns and Glen Miller, a 173-pound sophomore defensive end among others.

Both the Grizzlies and the Pels were on the receiving end of blasts last weekend in conference play, with the Grizzlies bombed by the Grants Pass Cavemen and the Pels run over by Medford, 34-0.

In the one comparative score, the Pels have dropped a pair of contests to the Cavemen by scores of 12-0 and 19-0.

A year ago the Pelicans traveled to Ashland to face a winless, but inspired, team of Grizzlies and collected a 20-6 victory.

It was a come-from-behind triumph for the KU eleven as the Grizzlies had proven tough in the first half of the contest and gained a 6-6 standoff at the intermission.

The Pelicans have been drilling hard this week in an effort to shake the losing habit at the expense of the Grizzlies.

All phases of the game have been hit in early week sessions, with more due today before taping off Thursday.
