Shift Can Save Game

There is an old saying, "A stitch in time saves nine." In bridge "A switch in time saves many a game."

West's jump to three diamonds crowded North. He didn't have enough for a three-heart bid, but he certainly did not want to pass so he bid three hearts anyway. Of course, South went on to game.

West opened the king of diamonds and East signaled vociferously with the nine, but West did not feel that he had to follow that signal. East had overcalled with a suit that did not have much at the head of it. Obviously East held a five-card suit and South would be able to ruff that second diamond.

There is usually no great loss in letting declarer use one of his trumps, but in this situation there would be considerable waste of time. West was looking at four spades to the king-queen-jack in dummy and he did not want to give South time to set up the suit for a potential discard.

Therefore, West shifted to the jack of clubs. North's queen led to East's ace. East studied a while. He really wanted to try to cash a second diamond, but finally he decided that his partner knew what he was doing. East led back a club to his partner.

South drew trumps and started after the spades, but he was not in time. West took his ace and set the hand with a club.
