49er Injured Okay For Rams Contest

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (UPI) — Coach Jack Christiansen of the San Francisco Forty Niners said today that every player shaken up in last Sunday's game against Chicago would be ready to go this week at Los Angeles.

Four Forty Niners missed practice Wednesday because of minor injuries, Dan Colchico, Clark Miller, Matt Hazeltine and John Thomas. But the Forty Niner coach said they might all return for today's practice and were sure to

be ready to go Sunday. He said the team looked sharp in Wednesday's drills. "There's always a little let-down after a big win," he said, "but they're coming around again now. The spirit is good."

"We're getting ready to play the Rams," he said. "We won't be down this week." Christiansen praised the Rams' running defense, especially the front foursome of Lamar Lundy, Dave Jones, Rosey Grier and Merlin Olsen. He said they were the biggest, and possibly the best, front line in the National Football League.

He returned to the court with a patch over his left eye and tossed in the key points that earned the Warriors a 99-95 victory at St. Louis.

The Hawks carried a 72-67 bulge into the fourth period when Attles and Beaty engaged in their skirmish. Attles shook off the injury quickly, tying the score at 74-all and then tossing in a follow-up basket to put San Francisco ahead to stay.

Attles finished with 19 points and teammate Wilt Chamberlain added 22. Bob Pettit was high man for the Hawks with 24.

The Los Angeles Lakers overcame a 19-point first period deficit in downing the Detroit Pistons, 124-116, and the Baltimore Bullets handed the New York Knickerbockers their fourth straight setback, 115-106 in other games.

The Pistons roared to a 28-9 lead in the opening minutes and were ahead 34-23 at the end of the first period. Then Jerry West and Elgin Baylor went to town to push the Lakers into a 57-54 halftime bulge. West scored 31 points, three more than Baylor.

Walt Bellamy's 45 points and 24 rebounds paced the Bullets to their victory over New York. Art Heyman, the Knicks' prize rookie, strained an ankle muscle in the first quarter and didn't return to action.

Pioneer League President Sees Death Of Circuit Now Certain

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — President Claude Engberg of the Pioneer League said today there was no hope for survival of the Class A circuit which gave birth to many of baseball's top stars.

Engberg, head of the league which has been in operation since 1939, said he was informed by the National Association office that sufficient working agreements will not be available for the operation of the league in 1964.

Engberg said the action meant his league, composed of teams in Idaho and Montana, had no alternative but to disband. "We have no place to go and it looks like there's no chance for survival," said the Salt Lake City insurance executive who doubles as league president.

Folding of the league would take minor league baseball out of the cities of Idaho Falls, Twin Falls and Pocatello, Idaho and Billings and Great Falls, Mont.

The league operated with six teams last season but Boise withdrew at the close of the campaign, citing lack of attendance and high operating costs as its reason for quitting.

The league has operated continuously since 1939, except for three years during World War II. It operated as a Class C league until last year when it was made a Class A organization.

The league was considered one of the best organizations in minor league baseball and produced such big league names as Larry Jansen, Billy Martin, Dale Long, Larry Jackson, Solly Hemus, Dick Stuart, Johnny Temple, Ed Bailey, Woodie Held and many others.
