### Golden Agers Hear Speaker

Seventy Senior Citizens gathered at the Old Armory to hear the talk by Julia Johnson who is the executive secretary of the State Council on Aging. She talked about gerontology in general but about Golden Age clubs and what is being done by retired senior citizens who enjoy meeting together for visiting, cards, dancing and who busy themselves in various localities by performing civic duties for the community.

There are orchestra and choral groups, square dancing, ceramic painting, and language classes or something for any interested senior citizen. She also described the benefits available now under the Kerr-Mills bill as changed by the last session of the legislature. This medicare program is being administered by the Public Welfare Department and she urged anyone who might be eligible to go to that office and register so that, if they became ill they would not have to wait for assistance but could apply immediately.

She described the programs of friendly visiting, meals on wheels, checking for prevention of illness, and the outlets for sale of craft work made by senior citizens. She complimented the activity recently set up by a couple who are members of the local Golden Age Club for a calling service for anyone confined to their homes and said this was being done in many communities. Ten or 12 former members of

the Community Council on Aging met for coffee with Miss Johnson and discussed plans for publicity for the programs that are being planned by the president of the local Golden Age Club for every Wednesday and Friday. She has organized a sewing group called Friday for Friendship that meets in the forenoon, with each member bringing a sack lunch and they are joined at 1 o'clock by other senior citizens for folk dancing one Friday and moving pictures or slides the alternate Friday afternoon. All citizens over 50 are cordially welcomed at these gatherings. Transportation will be furnished to anyone needing a ride.

Miss Johnson talked to the Soroptimist Club about the need to prepare for retirement well in advance, even as youngsters, pointing out that older folks are hesitant about learning to sew or to dance or to play cards when they reach retirement age, but that if crafts or various activities are acquired during the youthful years they are of value when retirement brings leisure time. She pointed out the many ways that volunteer groups could be of assistance to the older citizens, stressing the need for a survey of senior citizen needs.

In 1917, the Eppersons came to Klamath Falls and he served as vice president of the First State and Savings Bank. Not eligible for service in World War I, Mr. Epperson was active in the Liberty Loan campaigns and was Klamath County manager of the Victory Loan campaigns. The highlight of this activity was the construction in one day of a tabernacle seating 3,000 persons for the address of the famous evangelist, Billy Sunday.

Later, he was associated with various financial activities, was local representative of the Pacific First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Tacoma and in recent years and at the present time has concentrated his activities in the fire insurance business.

The Eppersons are connected in many ways with the Masonic Order. Both are members of the Eastern Star and served as worthy matron and patron of Alpha Chapter, and both are charter members of Naomi Chapter, Order of the White Shrine. Mrs. Epperson is a member of the Daughters of the Nile and had an active part in the organization of the local club. She also has served many years as secretary of the Alpha Past Matrons Club. Her husband is a past master of an Iowa lodge, and, as a member of Klamath Lodge No. 77 has been presented with a life membership representing 50 years in that organization. He is also a member of the Scottish Rite in Masonry.

The Eppersons have one son, George Marion, born in Klamath Falls in 1919. He is a graduate of KUHS and Oregon State University and has been in the armed services about 29 years. Presently a lieutenant colonel, he is stationed at the Pentagon, Washington, D.C.
