Gun Victim Is Critical

LAKEVIEW — A Lakeview man remained in critical condition today with a 22 bullet in his hip and his landlord has been charged with assault with a dangerous weapon in connection with the shooting early Saturday morning. Tony Martin, 39, also known as Felix Lorente Vasquez, is in Lakeview Hospital. Doctors have not been able to remove the bullet, which is lodged in the pelvic region. Iona Edwards, 55, was scheduled to be arraigned this morning on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, but the arraignment was postponed until Wednesday morning at 10:30. He was charged on an information filed by the district attorney and his bail was set at \$5,000.

Police said the shooting occurred about 2 o'clock Saturday morning in front of Martin's cabin, 856 North G Street. Officers said Martin, a farm laborer, rented the cabin from Edwards, a logger. Police still didn't reveal any other details of the shooting.

Services Held For L. Hansen

Johnson of Reno; a brother, Chris Hansen, and a sister, Mrs. Bertha Warren, both of Cedarville. Mr. Hansen had been a Mason for 50 years and was a member of the Surprise Valley Lodge No. 231, A.F. & A.M. Services were at the Community Church in Cedarville, with the Rev. Floyd Bailey officiating, and burial was in the Cedarville Cemetery. Committal services under the direction of the Surprise Valley Lodge, A.F. & A.M. Ouseley-Osterman Mortuary of Lakeview handled arrangements.

3 Miners Wait For Rescue Hole

PEINE, Germany (UPI) — A giant drill rig gnawed the rocky earth beneath a north German beet field today in an attempt to rescue three men trapped since Thursday 262 feet down in a flooded iron mine. In the murky underground cavern, the three miners played cards or joked with the rescue crew over a microphone lowered to them Sunday. "You poor chaps, I guess you've got to work night shifts," one told rescue officials. A rescuer sent word that "we had the season's first frost during the night and it's also pretty foggy." "We also have some fog down here, but no frost. It's sort of cool, though," came back the reply. The three men, in a pocket of high pressure air that has held back the flood waters, have been entombed since 8 p.m. Thursday. The Hessler Huette Mining Co., owners of the Mathilde Mine four miles south of here at Lengede-Bronstedt, said 39 or perhaps 40 miners died when a huge sedimentation basin burst and 19 million gallons of sludge and water poured down into the shafts and tunnels. Seventy-nine of the 129 men below escaped during the first few hours, scrambling up last-flooding ways and passing water to

Two Places Burglarized

Police said the burglar entered an unlocked rear door, then pried open a locked door leading to the pastor's study. Nothing was taken. The other burglary occurred at the AAA office, 1409 Esplanade, early Sunday morning. The thieves entered the office by removing glass from the skylight and searched for money, but found nothing. That burglary was discovered by a patrolling policeman who found the office's rear door open, apparently left that way as the burglars departed.

State Board Gives Okay To Building

PORTLAND (UPI) — The State Board of Higher Education today gave the go-ahead for condemnation suits to acquire part of the site for a proposed \$3.4 million physical education building for Portland State College. Money for the building was appropriated by the 1963 legislature, but its future is in doubt since voters defeated a tax increase Oct. 15. However, the board authorized the condemnation proceedings against half a dozen land parcels and also payment of \$142,000 to buy two others at the site, which will be east of new Foothills Freeway. The board authorized purchase of a 32-unit apartment house for \$121,000 and land containing a one and one-half story house for \$10,700. The proposed structure would include a swimming pool, gymnasium and classrooms. In other action, the board gave names to two new dormitories at Oregon State University. Ida Burnett Callahan Hall was named for a late English teacher at the school and Wilson Hall was named for the late Edly Elbride Wilson, once a member of the school's board of regents.

Boards Set Joint Meet

The Klamath Falls elementary and Klamath Union school boards will meet jointly tonight to discuss school reorganization. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the schools' administration building, 475 South Alameda. The elementary board last week adopted a resolution calling for a common appraisal of all schools' properties in the county as the basis for discussion of division of assets. The same resolution is to be presented for approval of the Klamath Union board.
