NEW YORK (UPI) — The Texas Longhorns today became the first college team ever chosen unanimously by football coaches as No. 1 in the nation, despite one of the most topsy-turvy seasons on record.

No less than 10 different teams have occupied the first

five places in the ratings by the UPI board of coaches this fall and only Texas has managed to appear for more than two weeks in the same position.

Thanks to the almost unprecedented wave of upsets the list of major unbeaten-untied teams has shrunk to four with the season just past the halfway mark.

An NCAA executive said he could not remember a season

with more upsets than the current one.

The Longhorns, No. 1 for the third straight week, were named first by all of the 35 famous coaches on the UPI rating board, the only unanimous choice in the 14-year-history of the rankings.

Illinois, unbeaten but tied, replaced Wisconsin in second place and Mississippi, also tied but undefeated, dislodged Pitts-

burgh from third place. The Badgers and Panthers were the latest to fall from the perfect record class.

Once-beaten Alabama and Navy forged into Wisconsin, which fell to sixth.

Auburn, the only other unbeaten-untied team in the ratings, had last Saturday off but still made a step up to seventh place, changing places with Ok-

lahoma, No. 8.

Southern California, the defending national champion which has been climbing back steadily since absorbing two defeats, was placed ninth and Syracuse, No. 10, made its first appearance in the top 10 this season.

Six teams included in the ratings last week were knocked out of the standings by losses. They were ninth-ranked North-

western, and Notre Dame, Mississippi State, Oregon, Iowa and Iowa State, all listed in the second 10.

Ohio State returned to 11th, Louisiana State and Pitt tied for 12th, Nebraska was No. 14 and Michigan State finished 16th.

Raylor, Missouri, Arkansas and North Carolina State rated 16-17-18-19 and Duke and Purdue tied for 20th.

Four games involving the ranking 20, the most in one weekend this season, are scheduled this Saturday. They involve Illinois hosting Purdue, Mississippi at LSU, Wisconsin at Michigan State and Syracuse at Pittsburgh. Two other top five teams are scheduled for tough road engagements. Texas is at Southern Methodist, which upset Navy and the Middies travel to Notre Dame.

### Washington's Redman Backed For A-A Honors After Duck Win

SEATTLE (UPI) — Rick Redman gets a big bang out of meeting people — especially if they happen to be carrying a football.

Redman, in fact, has been chairman of so many reception committees for the University of Washington this season on his coach, Jim Owens, thinks his 216-pound guard should be All-America.

"He's the best," says Owens. "All they have to do is count the tackles."

To wit:

Against Pitt and Air Force, the chunky linebacker contributed 13 tackles each. Against Oregon State he was credited with 15, against Stanford 8 tackles and 9 assists and against Iowa 10 unassisted tackles and 8 assists.

Redman is a bearcat on pass defense, handles the kicking chores for the Huskies, can play both ways and, an accounting major, could help keep the statistics if anybody asked him.

Teammates kiddingly call the former Blanches of Seattle High School player "Reggie" and opponents a variety of other names, most of them unprintable.

Redman is extremely mobile and cat-quick for a big man, and although hampered by a pinched nerve in his shoulder, exhibited both those traits in last Saturday's 26-19 victory over Oregon.

Washington already had its 26 points on the board when Oregon mounted a final threat which, with a two-point conversion, could have won the old ball game.

With 1:10 left, Oregon quarterback Bob Berry fired a pass to Dennis Keller on the Washington 15.

Dave Kopay racked up Keller so convincingly the Oregon reserve halfback could not hold onto the ball and it squirted loose.

Redman was on the scene.

"All I thought of was, I've got to get that ball—and the game will be over," says Redman.

He lunged, nestled the football and came up waving it wildly as if he had just swiped

the payroll at the local bank. From then on it was just a simple matter of Washington running out the clock.

After it was over, there was lots of whooping and shouting and his teammates whacked him on the back and called him "Reggie."

Oregon's comments were not recorded for posterity.

### Cotton Draws Nod For Championship

FLINT, Mich. (UPI) — Veteran Eddie Cotton of Seattle is ranked a solid favorite over Detroit's Henry Hank tonight in a 15-round billed as a world light heavyweight title bout in Michigan.

Cotton, ranked as the No. 1 challenger to champion Willie Pastrano's throne by the World Boxing Association, has a 47-14-1 career record including 21 knockouts. He has taken the count only once.

Hank, sixth-ranked by the WBA, has won 54 fights, lost 17 and fought three draws. He has knocked out 18 foes while escaping this fate himself.

This is the second time Michigan has staged its own version of a world title fight having little significance elsewhere.

It held a lightweight bout between Kenny Lane of Muskegon and Paulie Armstrong of Los Angeles in Saginaw Aug. 19. Although Lane won, Carlos Ortiz still is recognized as world champion in most parts of the world.

Michigan bolted the WBA when the organization reneged on its ruling depriving Ortiz of his crown.

### 49ers Now Counting Injuries

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (UPI) — Just when San Francisco Forty Niner coach Jack Christiansen had his troops looking like a football team, a wave of injuries hit his squad.

The Forty Niners lost to Los Angeles 28-21, but it was the second week in which the team looked improved over its five preceding efforts.

But the Ham game left three men injured.

Christiansen was told Monday that defensive tackle Charlie Krueger and end Walter Rock might be lost for the season, while defensive back and rumbac ace Abe Woodson is also fighting an injury.

Krueger and Rock both suffered knee injuries. They have been declared out of Sunday's struggle against Detroit and will be out for the rest of the year if surgery is needed.

Woodson has an injured shoulder and is considered a question mark for next Sunday's game.

### Ducks Lose Standouts

EUGENE (UPI) — All-American halfback Mel Renfro suffered a cracked rib on his right side in Oregon's 26-19 football loss to Washington last weekend, X-rays revealed today.

Renfro and starting quarterback Bob Berry, who received strained ligaments in his right knee against the Huskies, were listed as "doubtful" for the Ducks' game with San Jose State here Saturday.

Starting tackle Milt Kanehe suffered a broken ankle and will miss Oregon's remaining four games.

If Renfro and Berry are ruled out of the San Jose State contest, Dennis Keller will replace Renfro and Jack Sovereign will take over for Berry. Both are sophomores.

### Trojan Leading Big Six Rushing Marks

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Southern California halfback Mike Garrett took over as the rushing leader of the Big Six during the past week, with 414 yards to his credit and an average 7.8 yards per carry.

He has been thrown for a loss only one time this year—and that was for only one yard.

California's Craig Morton continued to lead in passing with 63 completed for 919 yards; and in total offense with 901 yards to his credit.

Tom Bennett of UCLA is the leading punter with an average of 44.4 yards per kick, although he has punted only eight times. Ernie Jones of USC, kicking 27 times, has averaged 42.1 yards. Willie Brown of USC has received 19 passes for 294 yards and three touchdowns to lead the receiving department; and Pete Beathard of USC and Dick Ragsdale of Stanford are tied in scoring with 30 points each.

## Subs Fill Gap As Green Bay Packers Still Win

GREEN BAY, Wis. (UPI) — "Indispensable? Nonsense. No man is indispensable to this team."

The man speaking was Coach Vince Lombardi of the Green Bay Packers. The occasion was shortly after his team had the New York Giants 37-9 for the 1961 National Football League championship.

This season, after another title was added in 1962, Lombardi's getting a chance to show what he meant.

Starting last spring and continuing right through to last week a series of incidents happened that has robbed the Packers of five starters from the championship teams. But Green Bay has kept on winning and the reserves who filled in are directly responsible in many cases for the trend.

Aldridge Fills Gap

Rookie end Lionel Aldridge has taken over the defensive spot that had been occupied by the traded Bill Quinan. Aldridge has been nothing short of sensational in his first year as a pro.

Veteran Tom Moore stepped in for the suspended Paul Hornung and until he was injured two weeks ago was one of the NFL's top rushers. When Moore was hurt, another veteran reserve, Elijah Pitts, moved in and picked up 151 yards in a game and a half.

When Bart Starr broke a bone in his throwing hand, several Green Bay fans thought their team's chance at a third successive NFL title would be all but forgotten after the Baltimore game.

Roach Came Through

But John Roach, who had seen very limited action the last three years, came through under pressure and guided the Packers' last win, their sixth in a row this year, to keep Green Bay tied with the Chicago Bears for the Western Division lead.

The latest "sub" to take over and perform gallantly in the face of challenge is first year man Marv Fleming, a giant 6-foot-4, 230-pound offensive end from Utah.

Fleming, who looks like a king-sized Sonny Liston, stepped in Sunday when regular end Ron Kramer suffered a painful knee injury. But the Colts didn't reckon with Fleming.

The 21-year-old rookie caught three passes for 51 yards on a 58-yard touchdown march. The score came on an 11-yard pass from Roach.

### Top Teams Retain Poll Positions

PORTLAND (UPI) — Roseburg, Medford and Grants Pass remained in that order today at the top of the state's class A-1 high school football teams in the weekly Journal coaches poll.

Phoenix led the A-2 poll.

Team physician Dr. Chester Semel said Monday he didn't think the 224-pound center and linebacker would recover for even the last game of the season.

Sagoupe suffered a torn cartilage in his knee in last Saturday's 36-6 romp over California.

Dr. Semel said the leg was placed in a cast, but recovery from this type of injury was slow.

The big lineman was voted Big Six Lineman of the Week in the 32-3 rout of Ohio State two weeks ago.

Armando Sanchez, a guard last year, will take over the center spot, according to coach John McKay. McKay said Sanchez often alternated on defense with Sagoupe, and the veteran's loss may be more on offense than on defense.

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The UCLA Bruins continued to work on offense today, hoping to be able to contain the California Bears in their game Saturday at the Coliseum.

Things began looking up for the Bruins Monday when both first-string ends were able to suit up for practice. Mel Profit, who suffered a neck injury in the Illinois game, and Gary Callies, who was injured in the Syracuse game, both worked out.

Coach Bill Barnes said he hoped the Bruin running game would be better against the Bears than it was against Illinois last week.

SEATTLE (UPI) — The University of Washington scored its biggest win of the season Saturday and now faces an even bigger test next Saturday.

Washington faces Southern California and most people agree that the winner will wind up representing the Coast in the Rose Bowl this year.

The Huskies concentrated on defense Monday in working out for the Trojan tussle. Don Sanford was moved to first string right end on the strength of his performance against the Ducks.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI) — Oregon State worked on defending against the halfback option pass-run play Monday.

Also receiving votes were end Dick Irmwalle and tackle Ray Johnson of Oregon and end Jim Hollingsworth and quarterback Mike Schruink of Portland State.

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI) — The Stanford Indians were given the day off by head coach John Ralston as a reward for their stunning 24-14 win over Notre Dame last Saturday.

Ralston said the squad was in good condition for Saturday's game at Oregon State.

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### THE 'EIGHTH' WONDER OF THE WORLD . . .

## Nicklaus' Canada Cup Triumph Adds To Glowing Golf Record

PARIS (UPI) — The eighth wonder of the golfing world today must be a rotund, pink-cheeked, golden-blond young man with a large waistline named Jack Nicklaus.

There is a question in mind as to who the first seven wonders would be. You can mention a lot of names such as Bobby Jones, Ben Hogan, Bryon Nelson, Arnold Palmer, and so on into the night.

But there's a possibility, even a probability, that before he's finished this rotund young man from Ohio will be the first wonder of the fairway universe.

You must consider first of all he is a mere 23 years old. And, to boot, already he has won such coveted baubles as the U. S. Open championship, the Masters and the Professional Golfers Association crown.

So what does he do now but go out and grab the wedge world by the tail in winning the International Trophy and with an assist from Arnold Palmer sweep the United States to its sixth Canada Cup "World Championship in 11 years.

Tied With Player

Nicklaus was tied, as they started a fog-shrouded and fog-shortened fourth round at St. Nom la Breteche golf club, with tough little Gary Player. The undersized weightlifter from South Africa is a former

PGA king, too, and it might understandably have shaken up young Jack on the final nine hole fling when Player started with an eagle.

It was akin to spitting in the eye of a bobcat, calling young Jack Dempsey a sissy or trying to beat Jack Kramer at Wimbledon with a ping-pong paddle.

All Nicklaus did was start out with five birdies on the first six holes — including a skein of five straight threes — and Player wished he was back in South Africa, or Boru Boru or some other place far away.

It was cold enough at St. Nom la Breteche golf course, formerly King Louis XIV's favorite farm, to raise frozen artichokes. The mud was ankle deep and the fog was thick enough to grace the top of a banana split.

But it didn't bother young Jack.

Applies Final Touch

He applied the coup de grace on the sixth hole before a gallery which included the Duke of Windsor whose regal proboscis was just as purple as any of the other 2,000 spectators. The team from Spain at this time was even with the Yanks for there was Jack in a bunker some 75 feet from the flag.

He gave it a whop, the ball took one tiny bounce, struck the flag-stick and fell into the cup for a birdie three. The "Joak,"

as we used to say in Flatbush, almost fell off his shooting stick. Jack just tossed his wedge up in the air and gave out with a piano key smile.

It was the kiss of death for the Spaniards and, as one feller put it, you could hear guitar strings snapping from Barcelona to Seville.

At the end, Nicklaus was five shots ahead of Player and Spain's Sebastian Miguel in the individual race for world supremacy. And he and Palmer, who finished with a 34 to Nicklaus' four under par 32, had won the team title by three shots with Palmer eight strokes off the individual lead.

The king was dead, Louis, of course. A long while back it was a long way to come for a funeral — and a coronation.

WALTON PLAY

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Howe Seeks New Mark

CHICAGO (UPI) — Gordie Howe of the Detroit Red Wings, already the National Hockey League's record holder for most games, assists and points, goes after the league mark for most goals against the Chicago Black Hawks tonight.

Howe, in his 10th season in the league, scored his 544th goal Sunday against Montreal, tying the record set by the Canadiens' Maurice "Rocket" Richard in his career from 1942 through 1960. Richard attained the total in 978 games and Howe in 1,127.

The Hawks, leading the league with 12 points, will be aiming for their first win of the season over Detroit. The Red Wings inflicted Chicago's only loss so far and the teams tied in another outing. Tonight's match will be Detroit's first on Chicago ice this season.

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
