

# Hornets, Troy Travel Friday

Henley at St. Mary's, Sacred Heart at Illinois Valley and Phoenix at Lakeview.

This is the lineup for area teams in Rogue Valley league action Friday night as the schedule moves to the eighth contest of the year and sixth in counting play.

Ross Carriaga's Sacred Heart Trojans draw a somewhat dubious assignment in taking on the strong Illinois Valley Cougars in their home lair.

The Trojans, currently tied with Lakeview for league basement honors, are figured to receive another sound lesson at the hands of the Cougars.

Illinois Valley lost its first league contest of the season last Friday night to the No. 1 rated A-2 team in the state prep ranks, Phoenix.

Thus, the Trojans catch the Cougars in a vicious mood and eager to make amends for the loss last week. The Trojans were handed their fifth league setback and seventh of the season last weekend by Eagle Point.

At Lakeview, the surprising Hankers have the large chore of attempting to derail the Phoenix express. Roy Robertson's Honkers have surprised teams in their last two outings before losing.

First it was the Illinois Valley Cougars held to a scoreless deadlock at halftime two Fridays ago before dropping a 12-0 decision and last Friday night it was a 7-6 loss to the Henley Hornets.

The Honkers take a 0-5 league record and a 1-6 season mark into the contest against the undefeated records of the Pirates in seven games.

And the Henley Hornets, smarting from a near upset at the hands of Lakeview last Friday, travel to St. Mary's of Medford Friday night.

Len Weber's eleven takes a

4-1 league mark and a season record of 5-2 into the contest. The Crusaders are 3-2 in counting action.

For the Hornets, the meeting will mark an attempt to down the Crusaders for the first time since St. Mary's became an A-2 school three years ago.

In 1951, the Crusaders ripped the Hornets 25-6 and last year the Hornets led melt away as the Crusaders came on for a 19-13 victory.

"We will have to be much sharper than we were against Lakeview if we plan on beating St. Mary's and staying in contention for the league title," is Weber's pre-game thought.

The Crusaders this year are considered to be basically an inexperienced ball club, with their principal hopes riding on the abilities of quarterback Bob Batzer.

Batzer is a junior who missed the first part of the season with a broken ankle. The Crusaders own speed in the person of sophomore Jeff Randolph and the line is centered around all-conference guard John Lucas.

Weber feels the Hornets have yet to play a complete game. "We've either played well during the first half or second half, but not the entire game."

As a result some offensive and defensive changes in the Hornet lineup this weekend is figured.

The Hornets will go into the contest with some players still nursing early-season injuries. Roger Vargo, LeVoy Young, halfback Kim Hale, end Elton Schiro and quarterback Bugs Lewis are all fighting injuries and whether they will be ready for the Crusaders by Friday night is still a question.

## Huskies Seeking Title Clincher, While Mustangs-Antlers Tangle; Honkers Home

The Merril Huskies seek to wrap up their second consecutive Klamath B League title Friday night as they face the always-dangerous Chilouquin Panthers on the Merril gridiron.

The Huskies have rolled to a 6-0 season mark and a 4-0 record in counting action, with two scheduled contests remaining including the Panther meeting Friday night.

On the same night, the Malin Mustangs attempt to keep their winning ways, after dropping early-season league contests, as they meet the Bonanza Antlers at Henley.

Gene Christenson's Huskies are favored to stop the Panthers for the second time this year and thereby insure a return trip into the state grid playoffs.

In an earlier meeting, the Huskies came away with a hard-fought 25-14 decision over Gordy Kuist's Panthers.

The Panthers take a 1-2-1 league record into the contest and a season mark of 1-4-1.

Last Saturday, in the first half of a football doubleheader at Merril, the Huskies topped the Antlers 20-0 for their

fourth league triumph.

That evening, Andy Travis' Mustangs collected their second league win by skipping over the Panthers, 9-6. The Mustangs now own a 2-2 mark in counting action and a record of 3-4 for the season.

Bonanza will face the Mustangs with a 2-3-1 season record and a league standard of 0-3-1.

Out of league play, the Tulelake Honkers attempt to continue winning as they host Butte Valley of Dorris. The Honkers have moved to a 4-3 record as an independent.

Last Friday night a 22-0 victory was recorded by the Tulelake eleven over visiting Cedarville.

This is the weekend schedule for the county small schools, with the Klamath B League nearing the end of the campaign.

The Bears have intercepted 22 passes so far this season and at this pace could surpass the team mark of 42 set by the Green Bay Packers in 1942.

The Cardinals regained the NFL total offense lead this week and remained the No. 1 passing team by a wide margin, according to the latest statistics released today. The Cleveland Browns remain tops in rushing.

There were no changes among the defensive leaders, the Detroit Lions remaining first in total and passing defense and the Green Bay Packers staying on top in rushing defense.

# Oregon Tech Tries Winless Mounties

There's a couple of records involved in the Oregon Tech-Eastern Oregon contest Saturday at La Grande.

Both are in favor of Ron Phester's Owls.

The first is the fact the Mountaineers have now lost 15 consecutive Oregon Collegiate Conference contests over a three-year period.

The second is the Oregon Tech Owls have defeated the Mounties the last six consecutive years.

A definite point against the Owls: It's Mountie Homecoming.

Last year the Owls hosted EOC looking for the first victory of the season.

They found it by a score of 19-7.

This year the Owls take a more respectable 2-4 record into the game and a 1-2 league mark as opposed to the Mounties' league standing of 0-3.

But, despite all the points favoring the Owls, the fact it's Mountaineer Homecoming time remains.

Last year it was the strong Portland State Vikings against the Mounties in this festival time and the Viks were very fortunate to come away from La Grande with a 2-0 victory by virtue of a safety.

And despite their unimpressive record, the Mounties have at least three ball players who can cause big trouble.

One is halfback Rich Barton. The EOC eleven was handled by Weber State last weekend

48-7 and limited to only 75 yards rushing.

Barton picked up 71 of these yards.

He currently ranks fourth in OOC rushing stats with 241 yards and a 4-4 yard average.

Another is end—either left or right—Lee Wick. He's caught seven passes in three league games for 207 yards and two touchdowns and it was Wick scoring the lone Mountaineer TD last weekend on an aerial.

Then there's quarterback Dick VanMatre who has hit on 13 passes for 289 yards and two touchdowns in conference action.
