Tulelake Garden Club is slated to host the next spring district meeting at which time a small flower show will be held.

A letter from Mrs. A. H. Mason, state memorial gardens chairman, urged clubs to promote memorial gardens and memorial plantings by non-member groups as well as garden club groups.

Mrs. Chester Main announced that the next Flower Show School is planned for next June 8, 9 and 10.
