Koufax Collects 'Daily-Double'; Takes MVP Award In National

BOSTON (UPI) — Sandy Koufax hit a \$50,000 to \$50,000 "double" today — a Cy Young award and a most valuable player award in one season.

The 27-year-old Los Angeles Dodger fireballer won the "second half" of the double Wednesday when the Baseball Writers Association of America selected him as the National League's MVP. Earlier, he was named winner of the Cy Young award as the outstanding major league pitcher of 1963.

The first man to win both awards since Don Newcombe of the Dodgers in 1956, Koufax' selection as MVP should lift him into the \$50,000 to \$50,000-salary class in 1964. Sandy may have hinted at his salary intentions when he called the MVP award, "the most important in baseball."

Nearly Unanimous
A 25-game winner with a 1.68 earned run average, 11 shutouts and 306 strikeouts, Koufax was named on 19 of the 29 ballots cast by veteran members of the BBWAA. Fourteen of the writers made him their No. 1 selection, three chose him second

and he got one third and one fifth for 237 of a possible 260 points.

Shortstop Dick Groat of the St. Louis Cardinals was second with 190 points, slugging outfielder Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves was third with 135 and relief ace Ron Perrazini was fourth with 130.

They were followed, in order from fifth through 10th, by outfielder Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants, infielder Jim Gilliam of the Dodgers, first baseman Bill White of the Cardinals, outfielder Tommy Davis of the Dodgers, third baseman Ron Santo of the Chicago Cubs and outfielder Vada Pinson of the Cincinnati Reds.

Very Surprised
"I didn't think a pitcher would get it," said Koufax when BBWAA National Secretary Hy Hurwitz informed him of his triumph. "I feel Groat would be up there but I'm amazed that Gilliam didn't finish higher than sixth. Jim never gets what he deserves. He deserved to be higher."

The sophisticated, Brooklyn-born Koufax capped his brilliant season by scoring two victories in the Dodgers' four-game World Series sweep of the New York Yankees. He set a series single game record of 15 strikeouts in a 5-2 opening-game win and beat the Yankees, 2-1, in the fourth game.

Koufax's 11 shutouts were the most achieved by a left-hander in one season during the modern era and his 306 strikeouts are a National League record. Walter Johnson, Rube Waddell and Bob Feller are the only other pitchers who have struck out 300 or more batters in one season.

Lewis & Clark Climbs To 12th Place In Small College Grid Poll

NEW YORK (UPI)—The race for the national small college football title has narrowed to two teams — Northern Illinois and Delaware—but neither the Huskies nor the Blue Hens show any signs of letting up.

Both Northern Illinois and Delaware pulled farther away from the pack as a result of convincing triumphs Saturday. The Huskies piled up 43 points in blanketing Eastern Illinois, and as a reward received 32 more points from the 35-man coaches board of United Press International for a total of 300 points and a third consecutive first-place rating.

The Blue Hens, who defeated Connecticut for their second straight victory over a major college team, actually received one more first-place vote than Northern Illinois—15 to 14—but accumulated a total of 281 points to rank second in overall standings.

Florida A&M maintained its hold on third despite a loss to Tennessee A&I, but the Raiders dropped out of serious title contention for the present with a total of 180 points, and three first-place votes.

Wittenberg jumped two positions to fourth and Massachusetts made a similar advance to sixth while Texas A&I slid one rung to fifth. San Diego State dropped two spots to seventh, and Western Kentucky

about equal, it's the guy in the goal who makes the difference, and that is why San Francisco is back in first place in the Western Hockey League today.

Floundering Kansas City Chiefs Favorite Topic In AFL Ranks

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)—What's happened to the Kansas City Chiefs?

"Don't count us out yet," insisted Hank Stram, optimistic coach of the defending champions of the American Football League.

In pre-season polls, the Chiefs were solid favorites to repeat as AFL champs. But with the season half over, Kansas City has a 2-4 record and is trapped with the Denver Broncos in the Western Division cellar.

In 1962, when the Chiefs were the Dallas Texans, they lost only three games all season.

Stram, asked frequently what has happened to his team, always has a ready answer. The stocky, well-spoken coach immediately takes the offensive.

"Nothing is wrong with the Chiefs," he insists. "We have a good, solid ball club and we'll win some games. We're not out of the race yet."

Without any urging, Stram will give an almost play-by-play account of each Chief loss and convince his listeners but for fickle fate it could have been a victory.

But pinned down for specifics, he will list three things which might account for the Chiefs' poor record. They are:

— "We're the champs and everyone points for us."

— "Every team in the league is better than it was in 1962."

— "We've had some key injuries, especially to our offensive guards."

Stram emphasized, however, that these points were not excuses.

"Even though the other teams are keying for us," he said, "we still must be strong enough to accept the challenge. And we just haven't been doing that this year."

Don Klosterman, Chief talent scout, added what may be a fourth reason in an interview following a recent loss. All-star back who helped though the Chiefs have all the win the title in 1962, Klosterman blamed the loss on youth.

"We've got a young club," he said. "We're a year away."

Young or not, Stram still thinks the Chiefs can win.

"Every one of our veterans is playing as good or better than he did last season," Stram said. "And our rookies are coming along fine."

SHUE ENDS RETIREMENT

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Knickerbockers have some help coming.

The team announced Friday that veteran backcourtman Gene Shue decided to end his retirement and signed a 1963-64 contract with the Knickerbockers.

Shue, who has played in the National Basketball Association for nine years, was with the Knickerbockers last season and scored 916 points for an 11.7 average.

Three Tied For Top Honors In Scoring

NEW YORK (UPI)—The shared three-way crown in college football this season is most evident by the race for the major individual scoring championship. It appears that nobody wants to wear the traditionally coveted crown this year.

NCAA Service Bureau statistics released today show three players tied with 48 points each, a figure that is approximately half what it took to lead the way at this point in any recent campaign. Jim Gray, Toledo, last week's leader, finds himself in a three-way tie with Cosmo Iacavazzi of Princeton and Dave Casinelli of Memphis State, but there is only a one-touchdown difference between the top 17 players.

Conspicuous by his absence in this closest scoring race in memory, is Jim (Preacher) Pilot of New Mexico State, heir apparent to the title won last year by Jerry Logan of West Texas State. Pilot won the crown with 138 points in 1961 and was runner-up to Logan with 92 last year. He began the season needing only 77 points to break Glenn Davis' three-year scoring record of 306 points, but has managed to score only six points after six games.

While Gray lost two-thirds of his scoring lead, he remains the leader in punt runbacks, although he added only one for 12 yards Saturday. Cornell's Gary Wood is the new leader in kickoff runbacks; Dick Van Raaphorst is the new field goal pace setter with eight and Larry (Moose) Elkins of Baylor has overhauled John Simmons of Tulsa in pass receiving.

Battle Adds Rushing Lead To 'Best Back'

PORTLAND (UPI)—Bob Battle of Oregon Tech has taken over the rushing lead in the Oregon Collegiate Conference after a 146-yard display last Saturday against Oregon College.

Battle has gained 428 yards in six games for a 3.7 average. Frank Ellis of OCE was second with 376 yards and Andy Berkis of Portland State third with 351.

Bill Bailey of Southern Oregon regained the passing lead with 67 completions on 134 attempts for 693 yards and five touchdowns. Mike Glines of Oregon Tech is second with 54 for 122 and 706 yards while Mike Schrumk of Portland State has completed 47 of 89. Schrumk is the yardage leader with 768.

Doug Olsen of Southern Oregon is the scoring leader with 60 points to 48 for Mike Hollingsworth of Portland State. Denny Ellis of SOC tops punters with a 33.8 yard average.

Back of the week honors were shared by Schrumk and Battle. Hollingsworth was named line-man of the week.

49ers Add Players From Viks, Packers

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (UPI)—The San Francisco Forty Niners today hoped that a couple of men named Williams could fill the gaps caused by injuries to key personnel.

They Wednesday claimed Howard Williams, a second-year defensive back from Green Bay on waivers and they acquired rookie Roy Williams (no relation), a defensive tackle from Minnesota in return for a future draft choice.

Rookie Walter Rock, a promising defensive lineman, underwent a knee ligament operation Wednesday and will be out for the year.

There is still no room for Roy Williams, but tackle Charley Krueger also may be out for the year with a knee ailment.

A decision was expected today or Friday on whether to operate on Krueger. If he can play again this year, another player must be out before the team hosts Detroit Sunday.

Veteran defensive back Abe Woodson was released from the hospital Wednesday and is expected to play Sunday. He injured his shoulder this week at Los Angeles.

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Special Hunt Set

PORTLAND (UPI)—Oregon hunters with unused deer tags will have the first three weekends in November to hunt on lands adjacent to Western Oregon agricultural lands.

The Northwest Agricultural deer hunt is scheduled for November 2-3, 9-10, and 16-17.

Open areas for the hunt, which includes land within one mile of cultivated agricultural sites, are Benton, Clackamas, Lincoln, Linn, Polk, Washington, Marion and Yamhill counties. Also included are designated areas west of Highway 47 in Columbia County, and east of the Coast Range summit in Lane County.

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
