Crater Comets Bomb Pelicans In Final Period

Aerial Warfare Good For Quick Touchdowns

The Crater Comets turned on the offensive steam in the last three and one-half minutes at Central Point Friday night and also turned a close 8-0 football game into a rout.

The Klamath Falls Pelicans were seeking a final victory of the season against the Comets and had remained within striking distance throughout three quarters of the contest only to see the Comets explode for three quick touchdowns in the closing minutes for a 27-0 triumph.

It was the work of the Comets' Darryl Summerfield which was the biggest factor in the game.

And the stat sheet more than indicates this fact.

The Comet return rushed for 46 yards, passed for an additional 166 yards, scored one touchdown, passed for two others and added an extra point.

The Comets had collected a second period touchdown by turning a pass interception into six points.

The Pels were driving following the recovering of a Crater fumble on the KU seven. On third down play a John Parisotto pass was picked off by Chuck Taylor and returned from the 21 to the Pelican 14.

Six plays later the Comets scored, with Vern Swanson carrying over from the one. The PAT attempt via placement failed and it was a 6-0 game at the 3:41 point of the first half.

This was to be the score for the next quarter and a half as Klamath Falls' drives were repeatedly stopped either on untimely fumbles or pass interceptions.

Nearing the end of the first half the Pels started a drive on their 25 after Terry Eccles had intercepted a Crater aerial.

A pair of aerials by Parisotto to Bob Moore carried the Pels 26 and 39 yards respectively to the Crater 10. But there the Comets dug in and halted the threat.

Both teams booted the ball around considerably, however, the final fumble for Crater oddly enough was turned into additional scoring for the Comets.

The Comets had driven from the KU 31 to the Klamath one-yard line where the fumble occurred and was recovered by John Jendzjewski.

On the first play, Moore was downed in the end zone for a safety and the score increased to 8-0.

Following the Klamath Falls kickoff which was returned to the Pel 40, the Comets struck again.

It was a 24-yard pass from Summerfield to Frank Armstrong putting the Comets on the KU 16.

The Pels again got tough and limited the Comets to no gain in three plays, however, on fourth down Summerfield hit Armstrong for a 15-yard gain to the one and a first down.

On the next play Summerfield carried over for the score and it was a 14-0 contest with 5:14 left.

The Pels started again follow-

ing the kickoff and Bob Williams hit Les Thurman on a 39-yard pass and a first down.

However, on the ensuing play, a Williams aerial was picked off by Armstrong and returned to the Klamath Falls 38.

Again the Pelican defense was tough and the Comets failed to gain in two running plays.

And again Summerfield took to the air and this time connected with end Bob Turner on a 38-yard pass play for the score with just 56 seconds left.

The Pels took to the air again from their 29 following the kickoff and gained one first down on the 44. Then came four passes which failed to connect and with 16 seconds left in the contest the Comets took over.

Summerfield lost nine yards looking to pass and on the next play hit Armstrong on a 35 yard effort to the KU seven.

Just two seconds remained as Summerfield faded to pass on the final play of the game and as the horn sounded he spotted Turner in the end zone and hit him with the final scoring effort. Summerfield added the extra point and the Pels had lost their final effort of the year.

Before the Comets had caught fire, the Pelicans had started as if to collect their second win of the season.

However, untimely fumbles stopped each drive.

In the first period the Pels fumbled the ball twice and the Comets recovered both. And in the second period it was a pass interception and another fumble.

The 10-yard line was the closest the Pels came to scoring against the fired-up Comets.

So ends a disastrous season for the Pelicans—one which saw a record of 1-7 go into the books.

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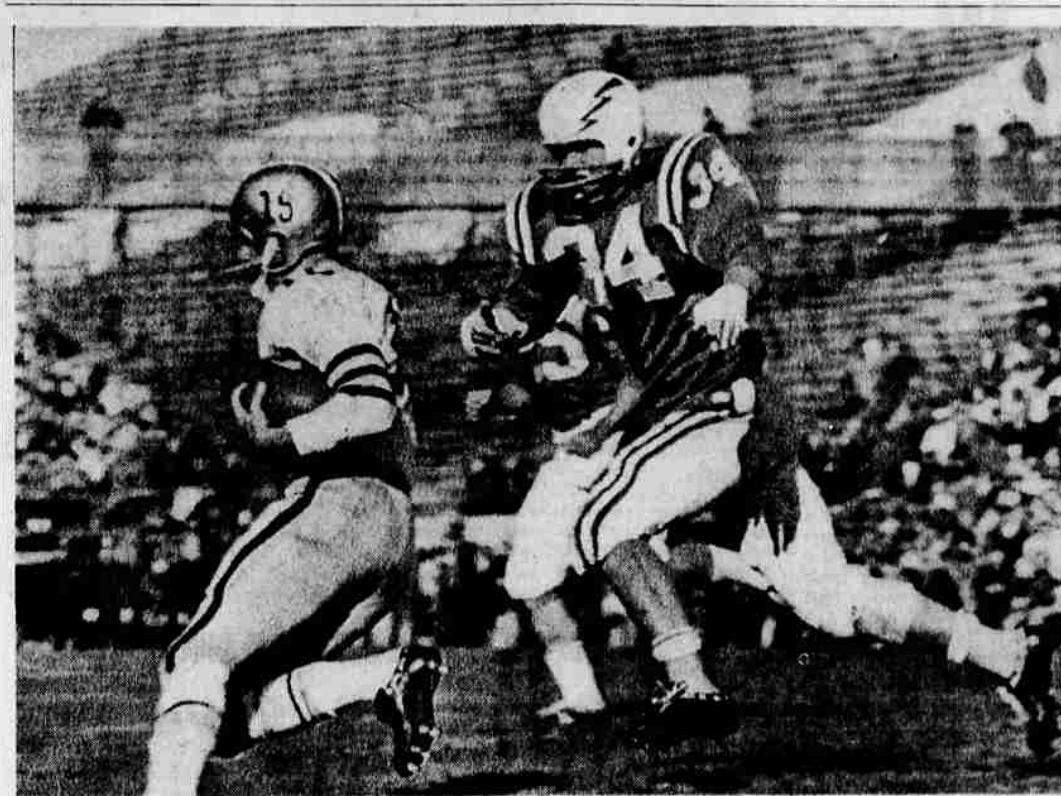

Three Points Large

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI) — Senior specialist Steve Clark's first period field goal stood up for a 10-7 Oregon State football victory over fumbling Stanford Saturday.

Clark's 21-yard kick opened the scoring and proved decisive as Stanford was unable to hold onto the ball in the second half.

A 66-yard punt return by sophomore halfback Craig Ritchey accounted for the Indians' touchdown. It came on the last play of the opening period and put his team ahead 7-3.

But the Beavers came back to force ahead to stay on quarterback Gordon Queen's 2-yard second period touchdown pass to Len Frketch.

Douglas' Passes End Trojan Rose Bowl Bid

SEATTLE (UPI) — Quarterback Bill Douglas passed for one touchdown and set up another with a 53-yard pass-run play Saturday as the fired up Washington Huskies defeated Southern California 22-7, and took a giant stride toward the Rose Bowl.

A highly partisan crowd of 55,800 saw Douglas put the Huskies ahead 16-7 just before the halftime when he connected with a 21 yard scoring pass to end Ralph Winters. The touchdown drive covered 73 yards in nine plays.

Douglas was the key figure in a 76 yard scoring drive in the fourth period. He and halfback Dave Kopay hooked up with

that 53 yard effort to put the ball on the Trojan 11, and Kopay sliced over from four yards out three plays later.

It was evident at the opening whistle that Washington did not come out to lose. The Huskies scored on the fourth play of the game when guard Koll Hagen blocked Ernie Jones' punt from the Southern Cal 22 and tackle Mike Briggs fell on the ball in the end zone.

San Jose Collects Victory

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI)—Three touchdowns underdog San Jose State scored twice in the first period and made it hold up for a stunning 13-7 football upset of Oregon Saturday.

The Spartans scored in the opening period on a 91-yard punt return by halfback Jerry Collette and on a 75-yard pass interception run back by quarterback Jack Sovereign.

It was San Jose State's first win in an eight-game rivalry with the Ducks.

Oregon collected its touchdown in the third period on a three-yard run by halfback Dennis Keller. The home team marched 86 yards in eight plays for its score.

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Bulldozer Bob Crashes For Three Touchdowns

The Mounties attempted 33 aerials and connected on 11 for 142 yards—almost three times the figure collected by the Eastern Oregon team on the ground.

In adjusting to the new-to-the Mounties—offense, the Owls intercepted three passes and nearly picked off several more.

The Owls rolled to a 14-0 lead at the end of the half and added two more in the third period before the Mounties fought their side of the scoreboard in the fourth period.

It was the devastating drives spearheaded by Battle giving the Owls their first scores, with Battle—quite naturally—given the honor of crashing the final three and four yards on the first two touchdowns.

In the third period the Bulldozer continued to pile up the yardage as he led Oregon Tech to a third TD and capped the drive by going over from the one.

It was the kicking of Dave Dirksen good on the PAT attempts via placement for a 21-0 Oregon Tech lead in the third.

The passing of Mike Glines jumped into the scoring picture also in the third as he connected with Sonny Luke on a 38-yard effort for the score.

The Owls controlled the ball so much of the third period, the Mounties were given just two minutes of the quarter on offense.

Finally in the last stanza, the Mounties hit for a 33-yard scoring pass from Galbraith to end Lee Wick and Rich Barton added the PAT on a kick to prevent a shutout.

For the Mounties, the loss was the 16th consecutive in Oregon Collegiate Conference play.

The Owl mentor lauded the work of the offensive line and felt the Owls had played the

best offensive game of the year with the possible exception of the Southern Oregon contest.

The Owls now end conference action with a record of 2-2 and now set their sights on the final fray of the year next Saturday when they travel to meet Southern Utah.
