Thurlow of Winslow, Cohn & Stetson says that "we have no way of knowing how long this zany, day-to-day speculative behavior can last before the conservative investor finally senses that what we are now seeing in the stock market has its closest parallels in the experiences of 1929 and 1937."

"The risks of a sudden and severe decline in the near future are greatly increased by the irrational behavior of stock prices during the past few days," he adds.

A panel of business and government representatives tonight will explore "New Foundations for Basin Building" at a joint meeting of the Klamath Kiwanis and the Business and Professional Women.

Stabbing Tops List Of Weekend Reports

A Tulake man who was the victim of a stabbing during the weekend has been treated for a head wound at the Klamath Valley Hospital and released, in one of five criminal matters reported to Oregon State Police during the weekend.

The wounded man was Manuel Luna who told doctors at the hospital that he had been slashed in a Tulake potato cellar and his attacker was in the custody of Tulake police. Authorities at the hospital reported the incident to state police.

The four other cases being investigated by police involve two thefts, a burglary, and an act of vandalism.

In one of the thefts, Conrad Schweiger, 4677 Peck Drive, told police that a tachometer and a Fenton floor shift knob was stolen from his late model automobile sometime Saturday.

The following evening thieves stole 75 gallons of stove oil from a fuel tank and gasoline from an automobile belonging to Peter Costelli, 2837 Altamont Drive, the victim reported to police.

The object of the burglary was the Midland Store and Post Office where thieves entered between the hours of midnight and 7 a.m. Saturday and escaped with two turkeys, quantities of beer, wine and cigarettes. In addition, they removed an adding machine, a stereo set, \$150 in stamps and \$25 in coins.

Police are still seeking clues leading to the identity of the burglars.

Also on Saturday, a vandal used a sling shot to shoot out 32 windows at Altamont School sometime during the evening, police reports indicate. Police have recovered 24 marbles they believed were used to smash the windows.

Investigations are continuing in each of the five cases, police stated.

It had been necessary for the council to change the zoning ordinance to allow mortuaries in the central commercial zone where O'Hair's plans the new mortuary on Pine Street.

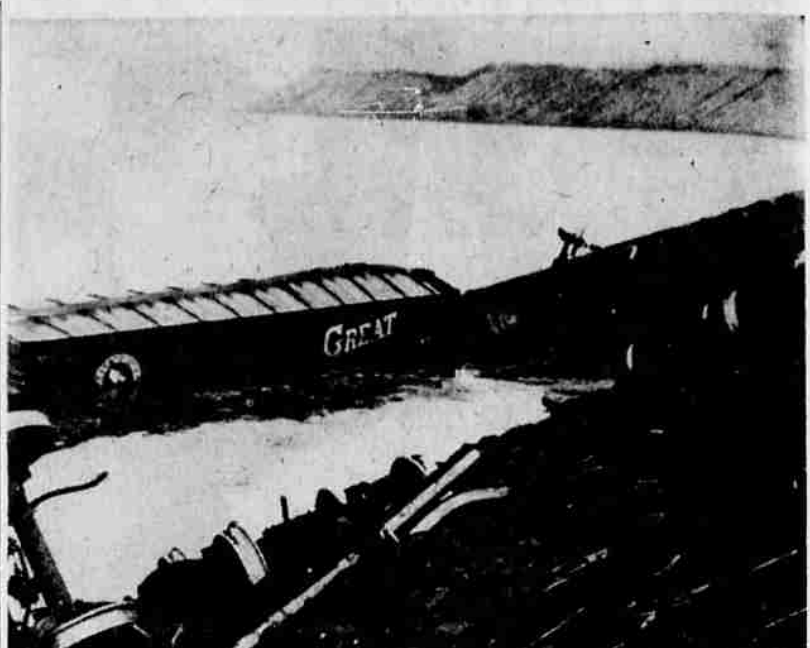
Hearings also will be held by proposed assessment rolls for a street improvements project and a sewer improvement project.
