

Barry's TVA Position Puts Admirers On Spot

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater's statement that the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) should be sold to private industry is putting some of his admirers in the South on a political spot.

By his remark, the Arizona Republican also has opened the gates to a flood of political oratory from Southern Democrats who could not ask for better ammunition to use against the GOP presidential contender.

The sprawling government-owned hydroelectric and flood control project is dear to the hearts of politicians in Tennessee and the six other states served by the TVA.

This has been made very clear by two Republican congressmen from Tennessee whose overall political philosophy is closer to Goldwater than to any middle-of-the-roader.

Reps. William Brock and James Quillen were quick to disassociate themselves from Goldwater's views on the TVA, however much they might agree with him on other subjects.

Brock said he would oppose any move to sell TVA to private industry, although he made certain that his listeners knew he was promoting free enterprise. Besides, Brock asked, who has enough money to buy TVA?

Quillen adopted the same line. He said he was opposed to the sale of TVA "... as much as I believe in the free enterprise system."

Another Republican congressman—not from the TVA area but from the South—said he could not understand "why Barry went out of his way to look for trouble." This legislator asked not to be identified by name.

In addition to attacking Gold-

water for wanting to sell TVA, some Democrats have pointed out that the Arizona conservative is sponsor of a bill which would create a \$1.1 billion irrigation project in Arizona.

Rep. Carl Elliott, D-Ala., called it "a sort of Western TVA—for his own state of Arizona."

Comedian Upset By Robbery

NEW YORK (UPI) — Mild-mannered comedian Jack Benny was less than usual Sunday on the subject of security at the hotel where his wife was robbed of \$250,000 in jewels.

"They usually don't want any publicity on something like this but they're going to get it this time," Benny, obviously irritated, said.

Manhattan detectives said they turned up "not a thing" in trying to trace the shabbily dressed bandit who managed to enter the swanky Hotel Pierre on Saturday, get up to Benny's 13th floor suite, and take the jewels at gunpoint.

Poorly dressed in a threadbare jacket, unpressed pants and a shirt open at the neck, the man held Mary Livingston, the comedian's wife, at gunpoint while he selected the jewels he wanted.

Included in the haul was a 27-carat diamond ring valued at \$100,000. Miss Livingston fainted as she stared at the bandit's gun, but otherwise was not hurt.

"Mary will be a wreck," Benny said while in Pittsburgh for a benefit performance. "She loved that ring."

Police were working with her description of the man—who was thin, pale and about 38 years old—and the missing jewelry—two pairs of diamond earrings, a diamond and emerald pin, a diamond-emerald ring, a pair of pearl and diamond earrings, and the large diamond ring.

There was no immediate comment from the hotel on its security precautions for guests and their belongings. Earlier this year another guest at the Pierre, Broadway producer Irene Meyer Selznick, lost \$300,000 in jewels to burglars.

Car Plunge Claims 11

NEW YORK (UPI) — Police today continued dragging the Harlem River for the bodies of three persons killed with eight others when their car hurtled a low barrier at the foot of a dead-end street and plunged into the water.

The accident occurred early Sunday as the 12 occupants of the auto were returning to their homes in Brooklyn from a festive christening party in the Bronx. There was one survivor, Isias Martinez, 40, who crawled from the submerged auto and made his way to shore.

There was a warning post a few feet from the point where the car hit the one-foot barrier and dropped into more than 30 feet of water. But the two blinking red lights on it had been broken, apparently by vandals.

Later, City Highway Commissioner John T. Carroll ordered an immediate survey to find if there were other dead-end streets without proper warning signals.

Seven of the bodies were found inside the car when it was pulled from the river by a crane shortly after the accident. The eighth was recovered later in the day.

Police, using powerful spotlights, worked through the night dragging the river for the missing victims: David Martinez, 9, son of the survivor; Mrs. Norma Iris Berrios, 21; and Robinson Aponte Velez, the owner of the car, who was believed to have been driving.

The others killed were Martinez' wife, Judith, 25; their daughter, Dalia, 4; Luis Berrios, 22, husband of Norma; Haydee Berrios, 21, his sister; two of his children, Angel, 1, and Iris, 3; Mrs. Amelia Aponte Velez, 34; and Juan Borrell, 40.

Big Bubble Energized

THE DALLES (UPI) — Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., will trigger the United States' entry into the field of long distance high capacity transmission when he energizes a \$2 million bubble at the Big Eddy substation here Tuesday.

The bubble, an air-supported plastic dome 200 feet long, 100 feet wide and 58 feet high, is part of Bonneville Power Administration's test center authorized by Congress last year.

It is the first of its kind in the free world.

Research on extra-high voltage direct current transmission will be conducted in a two-year test program, according to BPA administrator Charles F. Luce. Equipment to be used includes two rectifiers and transformer assemblies, each weighing more than 400,000 pounds, a 4.7 mile direct current test line, an insulator leakage test line and a flashover test line.

Luce said the conversion equipment can transform 13,800 volts of alternating current to 1.1 million volts of direct current. This is the highest voltage ever placed on a similar transmission line in the U.S.

The 2 p.m. ceremony is being sponsored by the trade and industry bureau of The Dalles Chamber of Commerce.

Weekend Road Mishaps Claim Ten Oregonians

By United Press International Traffic accidents claimed the lives of 10 Oregonians over the weekend, all but one of them in the state.

Charles Vertz, 23, Portland, was killed Sunday night when the car in which he was riding plunged 40 feet off a new road serving a north Portland industrial area. Three other persons were hurt in the crash.

James Rittenhouse, 55, Beaverton, died when he was struck by a car as he walked along U.S. Highway 99W just east of Newberg Sunday night. Police said the car was driven by Wilbur Mallory of Yamhill. No citation was issued.

A Coos Bay couple died of injuries after their car went out of control and rammed into a power pole Saturday. Howard Berry, 71, died later in the day and his wife, Julia, 67, succumbed Sunday morning.

DROPS NOON MEAL FARGO, N. D. (UPI) — The city jail may lose its catering service.

Police Chief Edwin Anderson said he has proposed eliminating the noon meal — which is handled through a catering firm — in order to save money.

Anderson suggested giving the inmates dry cereal for breakfast and frozen dinners for supper — all prepared in the jail.

Also killed Saturday were Ronald Schwingle, 28, of Salem and Judith Kay Bean, 21, of Oregon City. Schwingle died in a one-car crash 4 miles east of McMinnville and the Oregon City woman was killed in a crash which injured three other persons between West Linn and Oregon City.

Near Cheney, Wash., a Pendleton Air Force man, Donald C. Elkin, 20, was one of four servicemen killed when their car plowed into a gasoline tanker and caught fire.

Accidents late Friday brought death to Madge Laney, 46, of Klamath Falls; Michael Latendresse, 17, Medford; and Dale A. Williamson, 51, Winston.

Mrs. Laney was killed by a car as she walked across State Highway 39 about 10 miles south of Klamath Falls and Latendresse lost his life when the car in which he was riding struck a utility pole in Medford.

Williamson died in a Roseburg hospital after his Jeep went off a logging road and plunged into a canyon near that city. He had been elk hunting.

Negroes Protest Racial Customs

Negroes paraded in Connecticut and North Carolina during the weekend to protest racial customs. The Connecticut demonstrators engaged in a bare-knuckle brawl with police, and six were ordered to appear in court today on breach of peace charges.

Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace continued his campaign to win northern support for his segregationist views with appearances scheduled today at Harvard University.

The governor, who twice forced the use of federal troops to carry out court-ordered integration in his home state, currently is on a five-day tour of the North.

Wallace appeared Sunday on a television program with Vermont Gov. Philip H. Hoff and vowed to continue his battle against integration "within the law and within the courts."

Vote On Fund

PORTLAND (UPI) — Some 2,600 members of the Oregon Bar Association have been sent ballots to vote on whether the organization should establish a Clients' Security Fund.

The fund would provide total or partial restitution to the client of a dishonest lawyer.

The ballots must be returned to the association's office here by Nov. 15.

The Connecticut demonstration erupted in a fist fight when about 30 picketing members of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) refused police orders to quit blocking traffic leaving the Yale-Dartmouth football game at New Haven.

One policeman was knocked to the pavement, another was punched in the face, and one of the pickets was hit on the head. The Negroes were protesting bad housing conditions in a predominantly Negro neighborhood.

Other racial developments: Lexington, N.C.: About 50 Negroes marched from a church to a white-only theater Sunday night and held a prayer service.

ice. They then repeated the service at a segregated restaurant and quietly dispersed. There were no arrests.

Biloxi, Miss.: The Mississippi NAACP convention accused authorities of dragging their feet in bringing the killer of civil rights leader Medgar Evers to justice. Evers was shot from ambush on June 12. A white man, Byron De La Beckwith, charged with the crime, is being held in jail while the courts decide whether he should undergo a mental examination.

Atlanta: Negro leaders announced a platform for achieving complete integration in Atlanta by Christmas. Its main plank was adoption of public accommodations and open occupancy housing laws by the city.

New Orleans: Negro leaders called for a mass rally today to protest the failure of city officials to act on a list of grievances presented last week.

Sweetbriar, Va.: The Sweetbriar College board of directors voted this weekend to seek legal aid to determine if a will that set up the college bars desegregation.

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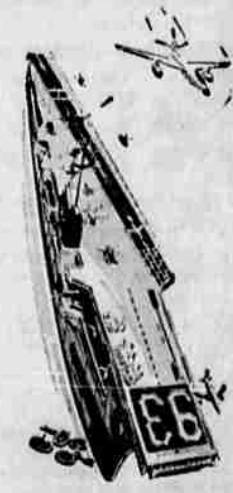
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
