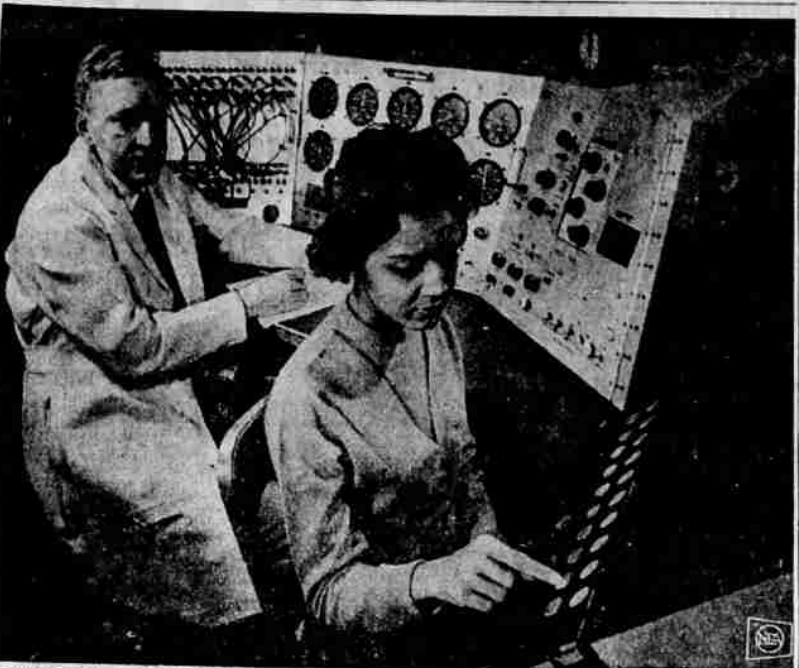




UNLOCKING THE SECRETS OF AGING: Dr. Birren and assistant at work at electronic machine which measures reaction time.

Research Team Uncovers New Facts In Aging Study

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Dr. James E. Birren, after 16 years of intensely studying old people, is convinced that a healthy man in his 70s can often hold his own or beat a young man in his 20s or 30s in keen thinking in a considerable number of fields. He also found that "lighting the aging process" is a good way to head off depression.

Dr. Birren, 45, doesn't agree with psychologists who contend a man's brain declines 1 percent a year after age 30. A kindly-faced researcher, Birren is chief of the section on aging of the National Institute of Mental Health.

Studies of elderly people are in their infancy, but he and a team of scientists have made a survey of 47 healthy men aged 65 to 91. They have investigated mental outlook, senility, vigor and imaginativeness of thinking.

Air Fares To Hawaii Lowered

HONOLULU (UPI) — Hawaii was a little closer to the average budget Saturday after major airlines serving the ocean hop from California to the 50th state introduced \$100 thrift fares.

Pan American World Airways and United Air Lines inaugurated the thrift fares Friday in a move that industry sources said would double travel to the islands within two years.

Pan American's first thrift flight to Honolulu from Los Angeles was sold out, but there were some empty seats on United's first flight to the islands.

Pan American will have 8,372 thrift fare seats on 52 flights weekly while United will have 4,845 seats on 51 flights. Passengers will be served no meals or alcoholic beverages, but will be offered milk, tea or coffee during the sub-five hour ocean hop. United opposed the thrift fares at first but later changed its mind.

It now costs 3.91 cents per mile to travel between the West Coast and Hawaii, compared with 5.68 cents between Los Angeles and New York and 7.61 cents between New York and London.

October Auto Production Establishes New Record

DETROIT (UPI) — The U.S. auto industry produced more cars during October than any month in history.

However, Ward's Automotive Reports said a bid for an 800,000-unit month was thwarted by strike threats and two walkouts. The walkouts were at General Motors plants at Norwood, Ohio, and Doraville, Ga. Automakers matched the record of 794,015 units set in March, 1955, the statistical agency said. A total of 139,400 trucks were produced during the month, highest since 1951.

Ford Motor Co. said it built more cars and trucks in October than any month in company

history. Combined car-truck production at Ford totaled 274,272 units set in November, 1955.

Passenger car production of 232,276 units topped the previous monthly record of 210,692 set in November of 1955 and October truck production of 41,705 was higher than the record of 41,339 established in May, 1959.

General Motors produced 402,353 cars during October compared with 374,969 during the same month last year. For the first 10 months of 1963 GM has turned out a total of 3,283,124 cars compared with 3,049,507 during the like span last year. Chrysler Corp. reported production of 110,378 cars for the month compared with 90,067 during the comparable month last year. Calendar year production to date totaled 835,070 passenger cars compared with 534,651 units during the first 10 months of 1962.

American Motors turned out 42,604 Ramblers during the month compared with 41,009 during October, 1962. That raised the production for the year to 396,489 units in comparison with 292,305 units during the comparable time last year.

Increase Noted In Construction

SEATTLE (UPI)—Heavy construction contracts in Oregon during October totaled four times the volume for the same period last year, according to a report from Pacific Builder and Engineer, construction trade journal.

Awards totaled \$10,431,131. This included \$5,314,979 worth of highway contracts, several bridges and a \$3,051,811 contract awarded by the Bureau of Reclamation for earthwork, pipelines, reservoirs and a pumping plant for The Dalles project on the Columbia River.
