

# County Prep Teams End Season; Trojans-Honkers In Modoc Clash

It's the final game of the season on tap Friday night for all county teams, with the exception of the champion Merrill Huskies.

Five games are on the football agenda, with the Klamath County B League and Rogue Valley League championships already wrapped up.

Gene Christensen's Merrill Huskies insured a return to the state playoffs last Friday night with a 24-7 victory over the Chilquinn Panthers.

In the Rogue Valley race, Len Weber's Henley Hornets were stopped by the St. Mary's Crusaders and this loss coupled with Phoenix' win over Lakeview gave the title to the Pirates for another year and the state playoff berth which accompanies it.

In Klamath B play, the Huskies host the Malin Mustangs in closing out the regular season for both teams. The Huskies are undefeated in seven outings and are 5-0 in league action.

Andy Travis' Mustangs, who have come on in the last three outings to move into second place in the league standings, take a 3-3 counting record into

the final game and a season mark of 4-4.

In another league contest, the Chilquinn Panthers and the Bonanza Antlers collide for basement honors on the Henley field.

The Panthers take the better record of the two into the contest with a 1-3-1 league mark and a season record of 1-5-1.

The Antlers are 2-4-1 for the season for the better overall mark, but are 0-4-1 in counting action.

The one tie on the records of

the two teams was a 7-7 stand-off three weeks ago.

Rogue Valley League action ends for the Henley Hornets as they travel to meet the No. 1 rated A-2 team in the state, Phoenix.

The Hornets take a 4-2 league record into the fray and a season mark of 5-3. The Pirates have rolled along undefeated in eight season contests and are 6-0 in league play.

The battle for basement honors is scheduled for Modoc Field

Friday night as the Sacred Heart Trojans host the Lakeview Honkers.

Ross Carriage's Trojans have failed to win in eight outings and are currently tied with the Honkers in league action at 0-6.

The Lakeview eleven has a posted one non-counting victory for an overall record of 1-7.

Darrell LaRue's Tulelake Honkers attempt to continue their winning ways at home Friday night as they close out the season hosting Etna.

The Honkers have come on big for recent victories to raise their overall record in independent play to 5-3.

This is the lineup of grid contests slated for the area teams this weekend as the 1963 campaign comes to a close for all teams with the exception of the Merrill Huskies.

The Huskies will rest next weekend before moving into the state semifinal action against an opponent as yet undetermined.

Machen, who looked fit and trim at 197 pounds, Tuesday night knocked out Bill McMurray in the seventh round of their scheduled 10-rounder before 3,000 fans at the local auditorium.

Eddie was No. 1 ranked challenger before money and career worries caused a breakdown last December.

But since returning to the pro wars in good shape physically and mentally, he has won three straight and went into Tuesday night's battle as the sixth ranked heavyweight.

# Oregon Tech Banquet Features George Shaw

The annual Oregon Tech football banquet is slated for Sunday evening, Nov. 17, at the Winema Hotel, with former University of Oregon all-American George Shaw the featured speaker.

Shaw recently completed nine years of professional football seeing action with Baltimore, New York and Minnesota of the National Football League and Denver of the AFL.

The former Oregon great still holds numerous passing records at Oregon.

In 1951, when freshmen were allowed to compete with the varsity, Shaw set a new record for most passes intercepted as he picked off 13 for 136 yards returned.

Shaw's three-year career passing total adds up to a record still held at Oregon. In three years, the former Grant

High School star connected on 195 passes out of 431 for a 455 average and 2,676 yards and 15 touchdowns.

Also, Shaw's record on total offense is still tops at Oregon, with 430 yards added to the passing total in three years for a total of 3,105 yards.

On defense, Shaw ended four years of varsity play with 18 pass interceptions, including his record 13 in his freshman year.

The former Duck also holds numerous other individual records such as most yards passing in a single game — 244 against California in 1952 and most total yards — 244 in this same game; also against the Bears in 1952 the most passes attempted (50) and the most completed in a single game (23) against California.

The best season for Shaw at Oregon was his senior year

(1954) when he gained 1,338 yards passing, threw for 10 touchdowns and added 178 yards rushing for a total of 1,536—still a record at Oregon.

In speaking at the Oregon Tech banquet, the meeting between Shaw and Owl mentor Ron Pfeister is somewhat of a reunion as both played on the same Grant General prep teams and on the Oregon team.

At the banquet honoring the Ovi grid-ders, fans will see numerous awards made in addition to hearing comments of the coaching staff and the guest speaker.

## Offense Battle Due As Bears Host UW

The two total offense leaders in the Big Six conference will fight it out Saturday at Berkeley when California hosts Washington.

Craig Morton of the Bears leads after seven games with 1,029 yards gained. But Bill Douglas of Washington has come out of nowhere to move into second place with 871 yards.

Morton is also suddenly getting a battle in the passing department. He has completed 70 passes for 1,059 yards, while Dave Mathieson of Washington State has clicked on 67, although he has gained only 699 yards.

Mike Garrett of Southern California seems destined to lead the league in rushing. The spectacular soph has gained 503 yards, to lead second place Clarence Williams of Washington State by 107 yards.

In 10th place with 495 yards is last year's champ, Junior Coffey of Washington. Coffey missed the first four games of the year after breaking his foot.

Washington State Junior Ger-

ry Shaw has caught 23 passes for 191 yards while Willie Brown of Southern California has snagged 22 for 329 yards.

Ernie Jones of Southern California is still the leading kicker with a 40.9 average on 31 tries.

Dick Ragsdale of Stanford scored five touchdowns in the first two games of the year and leads the loop with 30 points.
