4th Hand Bidding

Chicago bridge bidding is almost the same as in rubber bridge. The major difference occurs in the fourth hand opening on either the second or third deal and particularly on the second.

On the second deal the dealer's side is vulnerable. If you are in fourth seat and there have been three passes you should try to open the bidding. If you pass, there is another deal by the same dealer. If you open, the hand is played and irrespective of result your partner will deal the next hand and the vulnerability will have turned around. You will be vulnerable and your opponents not vulnerable.

South's fourth hand opening was one of these typical Chicago bids. He wanted to change that vulnerability around. He wasn't happy about his partner's jump to game. He did not really expect to have any play for game when he opened, but he was willing to pay 50 points to get rid of his opponent's vulnerability.

When he looked at the dummy, happiness returned. Not only was he going to get rid of that bad vulnerability, he was also going to show a nice profit. The defense could only take three tricks and South scored 429 points.
