

# Southern Utah Final Opponent For Owls

## Oregon Tech Seeking Fourth Win In Finale

College of Southern Utah—the final opponent for the Oregon Tech Owls as the 1963 season comes to a close Saturday afternoon.

They're called the Thunderbirds and the record to date is the same as that of the Owls—three wins, four losses.

Consequently, both teams will be digging hard for that fourth win to insure a break-even season.

Little is known of the Thunderbirds.

Southern Utah is one of the older schools in the West founded in 1897 by the Utah State Legislature as a branch of the University of Utah.

Just this year, the Thunderbirds began play as a four-year college and the school is a member of the NAIA.

The Thunderbirds have met such teams as Eastern Arizona College; College of Idaho; Fort

Lewis, A&M of Durango, Colo.; Arizona State College "B" team, and California Lutheran College.

The Fort Lewis team has been met twice, with a 21-20 victory posted in the first meeting and a 27-0 loss sustained just last weekend.

In meeting the Thunderbirds' conference College of Idaho Coyotes, the Thunderbirds were handed a 20-0 setback.

The Thunderbirds run a winged-T offense and according to reports, "... throw the ball often."

Handling the passing attack for Southern Utah is Daryl Monahan, a 170-pound sophomore from Henderson, Nev., and considered the team leader.

The leading ground-gainer is halfback Bill Carter, a 185-pound sophomore from Salt Lake City and an all-conference choice as a freshman. Carter is

reported to have good speed.

The other halfback is Merrill Wilding who weighs 170 pounds and possesses outstanding speed and goes on both offense and defense.

Another fast back is fullback Roger Moon, a 185-pound junior who also handles a defensive end position.

One of the Thunderbirds' top linemen is center Cal Hair, a 190-pound junior who has been a regular for three years.

An Oregon prepster, who is a starter for the Thunderbirds, is former St. Helens Lion Jerry Van Dolah at a tackle spot. Van Dolah weighs in at 215-pounds and is a junior transfer from Boise JC.

On extra point attempts and punts, the Thunderbirds move Van Dolah to center.

In preparing for the final contest of the year, the Owls have scheduled light, no-pads workouts this week, with pass offense receiving the most attention.

"Our passing attack hasn't been looking good in the last couple of games, so this is the phase of the game to be improved this week," coach Ron Pfeister observes.

He adds, "However, Mike Glines has been doing a great job of calling the plays and running the ball club. Last weekend against Eastern Oregon he called a real fine game and he also played about 40 per cent of the plays at the line (audibles)."

Monday the Owls looked at films of the Eastern Oregon game and went into light work Tuesday afternoon, with more of the same slated for today.

All hands survived the Mountain game minus injury and a healthy club was expected for the Thunderbird clash.

The Owls leave Klamath Falls via bus Thursday night at 6 o'clock, with their arrival time estimated at 11 a.m. Friday. A light workout is slated for later Friday.

Game time for the contest is 2 p.m. (MST) or 1 p.m. (PST).

## Liston-Clay Fight Set For February

DENVER (UPI) — Heavyweight champion Sonny Liston and challenger Cassius Clay will meet next February in a 15-round title bout expected to carry the richest gate in boxing history.

The only details remaining are the exact date and the site. And backers of the fight were sitting back today considering the bids after promising an announcement Nov. 19 and making it plan the city with the most lucrative offer will get the bout.

Shortly after Liston and Clay signed for the fight Tuesday at the Denver Hilton Hotel, three separate offers of \$1 million guarantees, two from Los Angeles and the other from Miami, were reported by associates of the two principals.

They said Las Vegas, Minneapolis and Chicago also bid.

Liston will get 40 per cent of an expected multi-million-dollar gross and Clay 22 1/2 per cent, a proportion Liston's backers said was the largest slice a heavyweight challenger has ever received.

Former champion Joe Louis and his United World Enterprises, Inc., of Los Angeles submitted the first offer of a \$1 million guarantee, plus the Parinassus of the Olympic Boxing Club, also of Los Angeles, was in with the second, and Miami promoter Chris Dundee was reported offering the third.

Liston was immediately installed as a 4-1 favorite by the New York oddsmakers, who also were giving even money that Clay would not last seven rounds.

## So What's New?: Texas, Illinois Still Favored

NEW YORK (UPI) — Top-ranked Texas was selected today to beat Baylor by seven points in a Saturday meeting that could break their first place tie in the Southwest Conference standings.

Texas, which has won its last three games by the margin of shoeless Tony Crosby's kicking, has a perfect 7-0 record for the college football season. Baylor has been impressive in its last two victories that were led by Don Trull, the nation's leading passer.

The country's two other major teams with unblemished records are slim picks to go through another Saturday unscathed. Auburn, 6-0 and ranked 3th nationally, is a three-point choice over Mississippi State. Princeton, also 6-0, is favored by the oddsmakers to beat Harvard by at least seven points.

Illinois, the nation's No. 2 squad, is a 9-point pick over Michigan in a Big Ten battle that could give the Illini the impetus for a Rose Bowl trip. The contest also has a personal touch: Pete Elliott coaches Illinois and brother Bump is the Michigan mentor.

Mississippi, rated third, isn't even on the boards for its cross-sectional game with Tampa. The Rebels are prohibitive favorites.

Jolly Roger Staubach and a Navy team steaming toward a mythical Eastern championship are picked to beat Maryland by 14 points. The No. 4 Middies are out to hand the Terps their sixth loss of the season.

The remaining top teams are expected to win, but only Oklahoma (No. 6) is a big favorite.

The Sooners are rated 17 points better than Iowa State. Michigan State, ranked eighth, is a field goal choice over Purdue and No. 9 Pittsburgh is figured to defeat Notre Dame by the same margin.

Nebraska, tenth, is a touch-down favorite against Kansas. Seventh-ranked Alabama is idle.

Army, successful in its inter-service rivalry with the Air Force last week, rates 17 points better than Utah in a leading Eastern contest. Dartmouth is 1 over Columbia, Yale 7 over Penn, Syracuse 14 over West Virginia, Cornell 6 over Brown, VMI 7 over Holy Cross.

In the Midwest, Wisconsin is 6 over a deflated Northwestern, Ohio State is 7 better than Penn State, Indiana 1 over Oregon State, Iowa 4 over Minnesota, Cincinnati 14 over North Texas State, Miami (Ohio) 14 over Toledo.

## Three Champs Cited

NEW YORK (UPI) — Three world champions are bracketed as "fighters of the month" by the Ring Magazine today because of their victories in recent non-title bouts that stimulated boxing interest.

They are Emile Griffith, welterweight, who outpointed Jose Gonzalez in Puerto Rico; Carlos Ortiz, lightweight, who beat Maurice Cullen in London; and Sugar Ramos (featherweight) who stopped Sammy McSpadden in London.

Middleweight Joey Archer of New York was boosted from fourth among middleweight contenders to second because of his upset victory over Rubin (Hurricane) Carter of Paterson, N.J. who remained No. 8.

Former heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson was dropped from fourth among heavyweight contenders to sixth.

Terry Downes of England, former middleweight champion, was moved into the light heavyweight ratings at No. 9 because of his comeback activities in the 175-pound class.

Eddie Cotton of Seattle, Wash. who defeated Henry Hank of Flint, Mich., replaced the inactive ex-champ Harold Johnson as top light heavyweight contender.

## Horse Titles Taken By Germany, Canada

NEW YORK (UPI) — Germany and Canada have made off with the first two major jumping titles in the New York horse show — confirming the pre-show impression that the United States' domination of the current tour would be broken.

Kurt Jarasinski, Hermann Schridde and Alwin Schockemuehle of Germany won three of the first five places in Tuesday night's Democrat Memorial Challenge Trophy event after Gail Ross of Canada took first place in the afternoon's MacKay memorial challenge round.

United States' stars had dominated blue ribbons in the Pennsylvania and Washington, D.C., shows but foreign stars needed those shows to become accustomed to the smaller indoor rings in this country.

The only threat to the German sweep was by Frank Chapot of the United States, who had been the leading rider in the two previous shows. Chapot closed with the fast round he needed but his mount, Shady Lady, knocked down the last barrier.

No international jumping is scheduled for this afternoon but competition resumes tonight with the Murray Memorial Challenge Trophy.

**Ski Area Receives First Snow**

BEND (UPI) — A snowstorm dumped more than a foot of snow on the slopes of Bachelor Butte 21 miles west of here and winter sports enthusiasts began making plans for opening the season this coming weekend.

First use of the slopes will be on the T-bar tow hill which has been smoothed with enders with stumps and rocks removed from the area.

The double chair lift, which reaches to the timberline, will be placed in use when two feet of snow has accumulated on the upper slopes.

## Lewis & Clark Ranked 15th In National Poll

NEW YORK (UPI) — Unbeaten Delaware, one-sided victor over major college competition twice this season, Wednesday edged past Northern Illinois into first place among the nation's small college football teams in the United Press International Board of Coaches ratings.

The Blue Hens routed Buffalo, a major college team, 34-6 last Saturday to climax a six-week drive to the top spot, held by Northern Illinois since the third week of the season. Delaware also romped by Ohio University, another major college outfit, three weeks ago.

Northern's Huskies ran their winning streak to eight this fall by shading Western Illinois 29-22 but drew only 12 first-place ballots compared to 16 for Delaware. Florida A&M, No. 3, Northern Illinois and Delaware have been the only three teams to occupy the top three spots this season.

Unbeaten, one-tied Wittenberg remained in fourth place, Massachusetts, with an identical

6-0-1 record moved up to fifth and San Diego State also advanced one place to sixth.

Western Kentucky, with only a tie to mar its record in seven games, jumped into seventh position, along with Texas A&I, which dropped three places to a seventh place tie after losing, and St. John's (Minn.) finished its season unbeaten and moved into ninth. South Dakota State completed the top 10.

Coach Dave Nelson's Delaware team relies on a 41-point-per game offense and a stingy defense which has allowed an average of eight points per contest. Chuck Zolak, a senior quarterback, is the offensive leader for the Blue Hens.

Southwest Missouri State, tied with seven straight wins, tied cross-state rival Washington of St. Louis in 11th place; Eastern Carolina climbed three places to 13th replacing No. 14 Western State (Colo.), and unbeaten Lewis and Clark fell to 15th.

Northeast Oklahoma, undefeated McNeese State, and

Southwest Texas State, also unbeaten, shared 16th, Montana State ranked 19th and Luther, another unbeaten eleven, No. 20.
