

## Retarded Children Are Sensitive, Too

NEW YORK (UPI)—Retarded children are more like other children than unlike them. Like normal children, retarded children are sensitive to the opinion of others. And, there is much the mentally retarded children can learn, if parents and teachers help him with what most normal children absorb or figure out by themselves.

These are among the several points made in a publication which arrives only a few days after President Kennedy signed legislation authorizing a \$329 million program to deal with mental retardation through the construction of community health centers and through research and treatment.

The President's sister, Rosemary, oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph P. Kennedy, is in an institution for the mentally retarded.

"People used to be ashamed of a mentally retarded child," the President's mother told one reporter recently. "That's not true today. People don't think a child should be shunted away, and not mentioned."

Mrs. Kennedy told of the family foundation that has given more than \$16.5 million since 1946 to hospitals, institutions, day care centers and research projects in the field of mental health.

The author of the publication, "The Retarded Child Gets Ready for School," is concerned particularly with education because she says it determines to a great extent how successful the child will be in leading as normal a life as possible.

The booklet is the work of Mrs. Margaret Hill, education chairman of the Wyoming branch of the National Association for Retarded Children and writer on the subjects of mental health, child-rearing and education. The publisher is the Public Affairs Committee, a non-profit education organization founded in 1935.

Mrs. Hill explains there are

varying degrees of retardation and that sometimes it is necessary to institutionalize a child who is so severely retarded that his physical care makes the family tense, irritable and overly-fatigued.

The author shows through the contrasts in the story of twin boys, one of whom is retarded, one not, how a family can prepare a retarded youngster for school.

She reminded that a handicapped child should not be identified by his exceptionalities as "that deaf boy," "that retarded child," "the girl with the limp."

"Retarded children are more like other children than unlike them," she said. "And general goals for educating the retarded should follow, in so far as practical, the same goals for education of normal children... (in) self-sufficiency, economic usefulness, satisfying human relationships, civic responsibility."

"Obviously," she added, "the degree to which each of these goals can be fulfilled varies according to the nature and severity of the child's mental deficit."

### Talks Revolt

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Enrique del Rosario, Dominican ambassador to the United States under the government of Juan D. Bosch, believes that his country's ruling military junta will be overthrown "probably within 60 days."

Del Rosario told a news conference Tuesday the counter-coup would be led by the nation's younger military officers. He said Dominican military leaders were becoming increasingly dissatisfied with the present ruling junta.

He urged the United States to continue to withhold recognition and economic aid from the present Dominican government. He said the Dominican people were "united in their contempt and distrust for the illegal junta."

## Judge Cited For Illegal Spotting Of Deer From Plane

GOLDENDALE, Wash. (UPI)—A superior court judge has been charged in Justice Court here with illegally spotting deer for hunters from an airplane, a misdemeanor.

The jurist, Ross Rakow, 31, of Klickitat and Skamania counties, was ordered by Justice of the Peace Jack O'Neil to appear in Justice Court here Monday. Judge Rakow posted \$28.50 bail.

The incident occurred Oct. 13 the second day of the current hunting season. Rakow said he had gone flying with some friends, "just for a ride," when

they saw a deer below. They flew back to the airport and his friends went by automobile to where they had seen the deer, Rakow said.

"I then flew out to see how they were doing," he explained today. "When I saw the deer going in the opposite direction, I landed in a field and told them where the critter was."

Rakow, who is in Seattle on an exchange with King County Superior Court Judge James Milfin, said he was "amazed and chagrined" to find how extensive the Game Department regulation is regarding such

matters. "What's worse, I was ignorant of the law," he added. "I was

wrong. But like anybody else I can make a mistake and pay the same bill."

## Election Results Please Kennedy

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy and other Democratic leaders exulted today in the party's performance in taking the big prizes in Tuesday's elections. Kennedy was pictured as "very satisfied" with the outcome of what National Chairman John M. Bailey called "clear tests of party strength."

Republicans contended that the GOP victories in a number of local contests showed solid evidence of a grass roots resurgence that could pave their way to the White House next year.

President Kennedy was especially pleased with the Democratic victories in mayoral races in Philadelphia, San Francisco and Columbus, Ohio, and the Kentucky gubernatorial race, the White House said.

The President, who stayed up late listening to results, was not quoted on the Democratic win in the Mississippi governor's race, however. Both candidates there ran on an anti-Kennedy platform.

The White House took special note of the Democratic victory, however narrow, in Ken-

tucky where Kennedy was outpolled by Richard Nixon in 1960.

Bailey said the victories in Kentucky and Philadelphia were "repudiation of Republican efforts to win votes by racist appeals..."

Bailey said the Democrats won the important races "while

there were the expected number of off-year turnovers in local elections on local issues."

The Republican National Committee said, however, that "we made dramatic inroads in areas known as Democratic strongholds and in many other contests a definite Republican trend is apparent."
