State's Husband-Wife Legislative Team Could Dominate Coming Special Session

SALEM (UPI)—Oregon's husband-wife legislative team could dominate the special session which begins Monday.

Democrat Ben Musa, who runs an accounting business at The Dalles, is president of the Senate.

His wife, Katherine, is chairman of the House Rules Committee. The combination could have a dramatic impact on legislation considered during the special session.

Musa, and most senators, have voiced opposition to enactment of any new taxes at the special session. In Musa's view, this includes the one-shot bill the governor has requested to add \$12 million to the state's income tax this biennium.

THE DOCTOR SAYS Use Of Hormones Requires Check-Up

Q—When a woman is having the menopause, is there a danger in taking female hormones for a long period? I have been taking them for about 10 years and I still have hot flashes.

A—The cause of the hot flashes that often accompany the menopause is not definitely known. In some women they persist long after the menopause (cessation of ovarian function) is complete. Female sex hormones may cause the retention of salt in the body and as a result edema or water-logging of tissues. No one should take them for a long time without periodic check-up by a physician.

Q—I am 67 years old. When I wake up in the morning I sometimes have pins and needles in my fingers and my joints feel stiff. After I get up, these symptoms go away but some pain remains in the finger joints. What causes this?

A—The sensation of pins and needles is due to continued pressure on a sensory nerve. The pressure temporarily deprives the nerve of its blood supply and the nerve "goes to sleep." When the pressure is relieved the returning blood supply causes the sensation in the tissues supplied by the nerve.

Q—I recently entered the hospital and was given a D.N.C. What does this term mean?

A—What sounded to you like D.N.C. was a D and C. This is medical shorthand for dilatation and curettage, an operation in which your doctor dilates the uterine cervix and scrapes the uterine walls. This operation is done for a wide variety of reasons.

Boxcar Return Is Increasing

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Association of American Railroads reported today boxcar deliveries to western railroads at Chicago and St. Louis terminals at the rate of about 1,000 a day.

Bountiful harvests in the grain belt have piled up awaiting enough boxcars to carry them to market. One of the reasons cited for a boxcar shortage in the Midwest and West has been that the eastern railroads have not returned the boxcars promptly when they reach their eastern destinations.

The 1,000 a day return of boxcars to the two terminals is about twice the number being returned on Oct. 21, an association spokesman said.
