

# Afternoon Open House Festivities Staged For New St. Pius Addition

The formal opening of the new multi-purpose addition to St. Pius X Catholic Church was celebrated Sunday afternoon, Oct. 27, with a two-hour open house attended by more than 400 members and friends of the parish.

Dedicated Sept. 31, the \$73,727 unit includes two halls equipped with sliding sound-proof partitions which can be arranged for any combination of rooms, two storage rooms, kitchen, and lavatories.

The church, previously without a parish hall, will use the building for all social activities and for the religious instruction of parishioners.

Rev. David J. Hazen, assistant pastor, served as master of ceremonies for the program which opened with the acceptance of the keys to the parish hall. Edward Brostehous of the Brostehous Construction Company, building contractor, presented the keys to Rex Morehouse, parish consultant.

Gifts of appreciation were

presented to George Brostehous, Brostehous Construction Company, and to Murdo Morrison of Morrison, Howard, and Starbuck, architectural firm, by parish consultants Howard Dewey and Dr. Mel Amsherry.

Preparations are being completed by the Klamath Falls congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses to attend the California Circuit No. 27 convention scheduled Nov. 15-17 at the Del Norte County Fairgrounds in Crescent City, Calif.

The delegates will work to improve the feature of their ministry dealing with door to door activity and knowledge of the Bible and to strengthen the home Bible study program by making the studies more interesting and educational, he added.

According to Hriciszec, the convention will be the first in this area since the Rose Bowl assembly of some 118,000 persons. It will feature the public address, "The Bible Triumphs in a Scientific World," by Lester M. Dugan, New York minister.
