

Trojans Homecoming Meeting Tonight; Henley, Malin Seek Wins Over Champs

A couple of basement battles and a pair of games in which Klamath County teams will be seeking to hand the newly-crowned champions unexpected losses.

This is the picture for prep grid teams in the area tonight as the regular season closes.

In the basement frays, Ross Cariga's Sacred Heart Trojans host the Lakeview Honkers at Modoc Field, with kickoff time set for 7:30 p.m.

Both teams have their final chance of the year to break into the win column in the Rogue Valley League, with six

consecutive setbacks sustained by both thus far.

Additionally, the Trojans are seeking the first victory of the season and go into the fray with a 0-8 overall record compared to the 1-7 mark of the Honkers.

For the Trojans, it's Homecoming time with Frances DalBroi named queen at ceremonies Thursday night.

Princesses are Jane Moty, Nancy Ongero, Lucy Shiff, Eileen Hurley and Marcia Nicholson.

The Trojans will face the Honkers with a definite handi-

cap due to a knee injury suffered by quarterback Marv Davis last week.

In the other basement battle, the Chiloquin Panthers and the Bonanza Antlers meet at Henley in Klamath B League action.

The two teams met earlier in the season and a 7-7 deadlock was recorded.

The Panthers take the better league record into the tussle with one win recorded against the Malin Mustangs in early-season play, 13-7.

However, the Antlers have the better overall season mark with two victories recorded against four setbacks, while the Panthers have dropped five.

Still the two teams are as evenly matched as the previous meeting deadlock indicates.

Malin and Henley are in the position of having the opportunity of stopping teams already possessing the league championships.

For the Mustangs it's a meeting with the Klamath League champion Merrill on the Huskies' field.

The Mustangs have come on for three consecutive triumphs in league action to take a 3-3 league mark into the final contest.

The last game lost by the Mustangs was to the undefeated (7-0) Merrill eleven.

Henley has the most difficult chore of the county teams as the Hornets travel to Phoenix for the final meeting of the year with the Pirates.

The Buc, winners of the Rogue title for the second year last week, have been the No. 1 rated A-2 team in the state throughout the season.

An upset loss to the St. Mary's Crusaders at Medford last Saturday night knocked the Hornets out of a chance for a title tie and possible berth in the state playoffs.

Len Weber's Hornets will probably surprise the Pirates with a number of changes on both formations and players.

And in independent play, the Tulelake Honkers attempt to continue their winning ways at home tonight as they host Elna in the season finale.

The Honkers stopped Battle Valley of Dorrik last weekend to raise their overall record to 5-3.

Owl Outlook

The 1963 grid season is almost over with the exception of the bowl-bound squads. OTI winds up its season this weekend at Cedar City, Utah, against Southern Utah. The Owls' '63 season had its brilliant moments and its frustrating times also.

Although the Owls' record isn't spectacular neither is it one of which to be ashamed. The year 1963 was a building year on the gridiron for the Owls. The OTI coaching staff gathered an entirely new squad on the mile high campus. They blended the excellent talent with the less experienced gridders and developed a club that played rugged wide-open football.

A good thought for Owl fans to keep in mind is that if the majority of the gridders return the Owls will have experience and talent in their favor next fall. The Owls, unlike many squads, always face a rugged schedule and the '64 agenda is another rough one. Included on the Owl calendar will be Humboldt State (yes, again) and Chico State.

It is almost the time of year when coaches and sports writers voice their choice for All-Conference and All-American players. It is often difficult to single out an individual as being the best on his squad. It takes at least eleven men to complete a team and football games are won by teams not individuals. The OTI squad is no exception. There are several outstanding individuals who aided the Owls. However, when "dream" teams are selected it would be difficult to overlook the Owl captain, Ken Lenhardt.

Lenhardt, 6-0, 205-pound offensive guard, has been consistently outstanding in his play for the Owls. Lenhardt's love for contact in the rugged pigskin game is obvious by his ability to open holes and lead plays. He is extremely fast and agile and demands the most from himself and his teammates.

Lenhardt, in his second year of college ball, often handles himself like a veteran. Ken is probably the best downfield blocker in recent years in the OCC. If you asked the other 37 men still out for football at the local college this season to name the player on their squad who has clobbered the most opponents at and beyond the line of scrimmage, 10 will get you 20 that 36 would name Lenhardt, the other one would name somebody else — that would be Ken's vote, of course!

Ken is a team leader. He is a player who continually gives his very best until the final whistle.

To prove his versatility, Lenhardt has played linebacker and defensive guard. At both positions he has excelled to heights above the average griddier.

On the mile high campus Lenhardt majors in surveying. He is a rare breed of griddier who dedicates his off-seasons to strengthen his football ability. The philosophy is, "If I'm going to play football I should be in better shape and tougher than my opponent so I'll enjoy the

game and make it miserable for him."

Indeed the Owl guard has made life miserable for all his opponents. When football ends for most gridders, the hard work really begins for Lenhardt. His consistent dedication to the game has made Ken into a top-notch candidate for All-Conference and Little All-American honors.

Huskies Offer Bears Coffey; Southern Cal Favored By 12

The big, gad wolf, in the form of a Washington Husky, comes to University of California Saturday, intent upon ripping apart the rejuvenated Golden Bear and taking another giant step toward the Rose Bowl.

Fresh from a 22-7 clouting of favored USC, the thrice-beaten Huskies are rated eight-point favorites to whip a California team that came to life last week with a 25-0 victory over woefully weak UCLA.

"We'll have no trouble keeping our boys 'up' for this one," says coach Jim Owens of the Huskies. "They know we've got to win if we are going to make it to Pasadena."

The addition of fullback Junior Coffey to the squad, after sitting out the first half of the season with a broken foot bone, has made the difference in the Huskies.

"The problem with defensing Washington," says coach Marv Levy of California, "is that if you tighten up the line to stop Coffey, they turn loose their passing attack."

Since Coffey joined the team, the Huskies have completed 30 out of 42 passes.

The game brings together the two leading total yardage gainers in the Big Six conference: quarterback Bill Douglas of Washington who has gained 620 yards passing and 243 rushing; and quarterback Craig Morton of Cal who has lost 30 rushing, but gained 1,669 passing and hurled 11 touchdown passes. Douglas has completed six passes for TDs.

Southern California hosts Stanford in what should be another good contest. The Trojans, who have lost three games, too, are 12-point favorites to knock over the Indians.

Stanford is optimistic. "But I think we can beat them," says the ever-optimistic Stanford coach John Ralston.

On the basis of what his team did to Notre Dame two weeks ago, Ralston is right. If it can get the blocking for halfback Steve Thurlow, Stanford will be tough to stop.

USC's task will be made tough by the fact that its No. 1 quarterback, Pete Beathard, is sidelined with injuries.

However, the speed of halfbacks Willie Brown and Mike Garrett is expected to be too much for Stanford.

seven starts, goes against a tough Air Force team with a 4-3 record. The Falcons number among their victims the Washington club.

Oregon, upset last week by San Jose State, still is hurting in the injury department as it tries a comeback against Washington State.

Oregon State hits the road for another inter-sectional—this

one against Indiana. The Beavers, with a 5-2 record, have played only three West Coast games so far this year.

In other major games, Arizona State is a slight favorite to ruin homecoming for San Jose State. Arizona is expected to turn back Idaho and San Diego State should hand University of Pacific its seventh setback in a row.
