Hopes Fade For Non-Agression Pact

LONDON (UPI) — Any hope of an East-West non-aggression pact has been virtually ruled out by Russia's toughening of the Berlin access routes, diplomatic sources said today.

They said the latest convoy blockade on the autobahn in East Germany has more than vindicated the West's longstanding demand to link such an agreement with safeguards for unimpeded Western rights on the Berlin routes.

The Soviets have been seeking a non-aggression pact as one of the priority issues to ease world tension. The Russians are expected to bring up

the subject again next month when the Geneva disarmament conference resumes.

The Western Allies have been hesitant from the start toward the Soviet idea of a non-aggression agreement between North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) members and those of the Warsaw Pact.

The suggestion was considered superfluous by the West since members of the United Nations are pledged under its charter to refrain from aggression.

The diplomatic sources say the latest interference with Allied access routes to Berlin — the blockade of a U.S. Army convoy for more than 41 hours — has set off second thoughts about a cold war "thaw" in

Nikita Sees Sino-Soviet Agreement

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev today told the West not to gloat about Chinese-Soviet differences because "I am sure that we will come to an agreement sooner or later."

Khrushchev made his prediction of a solution to the ideological dispute with the Peking camp at a revolutionary anniversary reception in the Kremlin. He also took the occasion to lash out at U.S. Cuban policy and predict that the Soviet Union would pass America economically in seven years.

Among the 2,000 guests at the ceremony in the glittering Palace of Congresses were foreign diplomats and almost a score of top American business executives who were toasted specially by Khrushchev.

But the premier's remarks in the traditional dawning of cognac or vodka were more barbed than honeyed when they referred to the United States.

And he had a rather stiff exchange with U. S. Ambassador Roy Kohler, who perhaps with the recent Berlin convoy incidents in mind, told the Soviet premier it was a fine party but "where is the spirit of Moscow that you talk about."

Special Session Will Take Up Fiscal Headache Monday

SALEM (UPI) — The Oregon legislature will meet in special session at noon Monday—Veterans' Day—to try to find the answers to the \$90 million fiscal headache created by voters at the Oct. 15 referendum election.

It will be the 12th special session in Oregon history.

The session six years ago was called to reduce taxes because the state had built up a multi-million dollar surplus.

That surplus ran out this year

forcing the legislature to enact a tax package to raise an additional \$60 million to finance a \$404 million general fund budget—largest in the state's history.

Package Soundly Whipped

A group headed by Albany publisher J. Francis Howard was successful in its drive to get the tax measure defeated. The tax bill was defeated 3 1/2 to 1 at the Oct. 15 election.

In the wake of the defeat,

Gov. Mark Hatfield junked \$18 million in capital construction and salary hikes, trimmed \$17 million from agency budgets, proposed nearly \$11 million in basic school cuts, and asked the legislature to re-pass a one-shot speedup of withholding tax collections to add \$12 million to the biennium's income.

Reductions in basic school, and adoption of the one-shot measure require legislative action.

Hatfield and legislative leaders have indicated they believe the session could end in 10 days. But there is no guarantee it will.

Many lawmakers have voiced dissatisfaction with U.S. Hatfield austerity program, many appear opposed to the one-shot plan, there is no agreement on how much basic school should be cut, or whether governor or legislators should make the detailed reductions.

Sales Tax Suggested

There is increasing agitation for a sales tax plan to be submitted to the voters.

Past special sessions have run from one to 20 days. The session six years ago, at which taxes were reduced, lasted 19 days.

The 141-day regular session earlier this year was the longest in Oregon history.

House and Senate Way and Means Committee members began informal meetings here Thursday to get a "running start" on budget review.

Both the House and Senate members are slated to caucus Sunday night to organize and adopt rules.

Senate President Ben Musa and House Speaker Clarence Barton have announced each chamber will operate with a skeleton staff during the special session.

Defense Department Backs Vote Drive

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Defense Department is organizing a campaign to get out a big absentee vote for the 1964 presidential election.

Officials hope that it will be possible to get ballots from at least half of the 3.5 million Americans eligible to cast absentee votes. Little more than one-third of this group has voted in past presidential elections.

Approximately 40 per cent of the eligible members of the armed services cast absentee ballots in 1960. The proposition is presumed to have been smaller among civilians overseas.

As proof of what can be done through an organized drive, the Marine Corps in 1960 got 80 per

cent of its members to vote by absentee ballot.


As a further inducement to absentee voting, many state barriers, such as requiring a personal appearance for registration, have been dropped in the past three or four years.

The new drive will be under the leadership of Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara. The 1955 Federal Voting Act designates the defense secretary as "voting coordinator" for the armed services as well as for overseas representatives of other agencies.

The law applies to the 2.7 million members of the armed forces stationed in the United States or abroad, but only to civilians if they are assigned overseas.

During the first meeting Wednesday at the Pentagon to begin the drive, it was agreed that the most important element was to insure that every potential absentee voter received a "federal voting post card" as provided under the 1955 law.

The voter sends the free air mail card to the voting official of his resident state and is, in turn, sent necessary registration and balloting materials.
