

Southern Utah Ends Oregon Tech Season With Loss

Air Game Good, But Loss Taken

COLLEGE OF SOUTHERN UTAH, Cedar City, Utah—Bob (The Bulldozer) Battle was a well-contained here Saturday afternoon.

The Southern Utah Thunderbirds were pointing for the big guy and their stacked defense, which may be called either a five-four or the more realistic nine-man line it was, was sufficient to lower Battle's ground game considerably.

As a result, the Oregon Tech Owls took to the air on the talented arm of freshman Mike Glines.

However, his aerial success was not enough to stop the hometown Thunderbirds as they collected a 13-7 season finale win over the Owls.

The diminutive ex-Crater Comet scooter, took to the air 32 times and connected on 13 of these including one touchdown heave for a total of 273 yards.

The huge passing yardage is testimony to the stoutness of the Southern Utah ground defense as the Owls gained a net of just 62 yards rushing.

Several times the Owls were in scoring position only to have the hosts' defense end the threats.

Oregon Tech first threatened following the opening kickoff as the first drive carried to the Thunderbird six before an untimely fumble ended it.

The Owls started anew still in the first quarter and moved the ball to the Southern Utah seven but the Thunderbird defense proved tough and ended this threat.

The Owl defense proved as tough through the first period before the Thunderbirds mounted a drive in the second period. It was a 65-yard effort completed when Son Sudbury carried over from the two. Rick Traasahl added the PAT on a kick for a 7-0 lead.

The host club scored first in the third period as a drive was capped with three minutes left in the quarter when Sudbury again scored, this time from seven yards out.

The Owls came right back following the ensuing kickoff for their lone tally as Sonny Lake

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THE RETURN OF BOB BERRY... Aerial Warfare Won By Oregon As Cougars Fall

PULLMAN, Wash. (UPI)— Junior quarterback Bob Berry passed twice to senior end Rich Schwab for touchdowns Saturday as the University of Oregon overpowered Washington State, 21-7, in the 42nd football game between the Northwest rivals.

The Ducks spoiled Washington State's homecoming and left the Cougars with one of the worst records in Jim Sutherland's eight years as head coach—one win, five losses and a tie.

For Oregon it was the fifth win against three losses—two suffered with Berry either out of the lineup or hampered by injuries.

Washington State scored first taking the ball from its own 20 to the Oregon end zone in four plays. Quarterback Dave Mathieson, with the ball on the Ducks' 38, passed to Tom Kelley who ran down the left sidelines to score.

Berry passed to Schwab for TD's in the second and fourth periods, the first on a play good for 17 yards and the second on a 30-yard play.

Berry, who saw only limited action last week, was in for the distance Saturday and passed to half-a-dozen receivers for big gains in every drive.

On the ground, fullback Lu Bain rarely was stopped at less than three yards.

Washington State, which out-gained the Ducks both on the ground and in the air in the first half, was unable to move in the second.

Three Cougar drives were halted by pass interceptions and one by a fumble.

Oregon's final score, in the fourth period, came after center Oliver McKinney recovered fullback John Browne's fumble on the WSU 35. Halfback Dennis Keller took the ball to the 30 and Berry passed to Schwab for the score.

Mathieson outpassed Berry 198 yards to 147 but had four passes intercepted while Berry lost one to the Cougars. Both quarterbacks made all the aerial yardage for their teams.

On the ground Oregon out-gained the Cougars 142 to 62.

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (UPI)— Tommy Bolt, who fired two eagles in a four-under-par 67 round, and Frank Beard, a young Kentuckian, became locked in a tie for the leadership Saturday after 54 holes of the \$50,000 Frank Sinatra Open.

The 45-year-old Bolt sank an eight-iron shot for an eagle two on the par-four 15th hole, and then on the 17th sank a 15-foot putt for an eagle three.

Beard had first and second round scores of 68 - 72. One stroke behind the third - round leaders at 210 were Mason Rudolph, 71-72-67; and Jerry Steel-smith, 70-71-69.

Beaver Rally Falls Short As Hoosiers Hold On To Collect Close 20-15 Win

BLOOMINGTON, IND. (UPI)—Bruising fullback Tom Nowatzke, a 220 - pound junior from Michigan City, did about everything here Saturday to lead Indiana to a 20-15 victory over Oregon State before 25,895 homecoming fans.

Nowatzke, also the Hoosiers' big man in their 24-6 conquest of Minnesota last week, picked up 134 yards on 27 carries, kicked two field goals to set a school record for one season with four and booted two extra points. He scored one touchdown and intercepted a pass that stopped a Beaver march at the I.U. 15.

But it almost was not enough as the Beavers nearly overcame a 20-3 Indiana lead in the final 12 minutes of play. The Beavers scored two touchdowns and had another match to the I.U. 31 before the Hoosiers smothered quarterback Gordon Queen on a fourth down play and ran out the clock.

The last rally started after Nowatzke had kicked his second field goal to make it 20-3 with 12:27 left. The Beavers moved 69 yards in six plays with a 12-yard pass from Queen to Dan Espalin, giving them their first touchdown.

Six minutes later, with 4:31 left, Queen threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to Doug McDougal and closed the gap to five points.

A final desperate touchdown bid in the closing seconds moved the ball from the Beavers' 33 to the Indiana 31 before the Hoosiers held on fourth down.

Oregon State led in the first period 3-0 on a 43-yard field goal by Steve Clark, but Indiana tied it in the second period on Nowatzke's 24-yard field goal.

The Hoosiers went ahead with 2:48 seconds in the half when Nowatzke plunged for seven yards to end a 41-yard touchdown drive. A fumble had given Indiana the ball in Oregon State territory.

Indiana continued to roll in the third period and took a 17-3 advantage when quarterback Rich Badar tossed a 10-yard scoring pass to end Rich Wervey, with 10:8 seconds remaining in the period.

After stopping another Oregon State march at their 10-yard line on Nowatzke's interception, the Hoosiers moved to the 10-yard line and a 17-3 lead. Nowatzke booted another three pointer, making it 20-3.

The victory was Indiana's third in a row matching the streak of the 1958 team. The Hoosiers have lost four games, all in Big Ten competition.

Oregon State is now 5-3.

Huskies, Trojans Overcome Deficits; Texas Plays Ball Control As Baylor Eleven Falls

Longhorns Win

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)— The top-rated Texas Longhorns Saturday used excellent ball control and the hard-charging runs of tailback Tommy Ford to overcome Baylor's passing blitz for a 7-0 Southwest Conference victory.

Baylor's dandy passer Don Trull opened the game with a lightning-like passing attack which carried the Bears dangerously close to the Texas goal line twice in the first quarter.

But after those two initial attacks in the opening period, the top-ranked Longhorns took control of the game and shut Baylor out the next two quarters without a single first down.

The Longhorns scored just before the third period ended on a one-yard plunge by Tom Stockton at the end of a 45-yard drive. A 15-yard personal foul penalty against Baylor figured in the Texas scoring drive.

The Longhorns' ground game again proved superior under the direction of quarterback Duke Carlisle. Ford was the main object of his handoffs, running a total of 27 yards for a net of 101 yards.

Carlisle himself shut off Baylor's desperation pass attack in the closing seconds of the game when he intercepted a Trull pass in the Texas end zone with 22 seconds left.

Texas ran the clock out for its eighth straight victory of the season to remain one of the few undefeated and untied major colleges in the nation.

LOS ANGELES (UPI)— Halfback Willie Brown caught two touchdown passes Saturday to bring favored University of Southern California from behind in the second half as the Trojans scored a 25-11 uphill victory over Stanford University.

Badgers Rally

MADISON, Wis. (UPI)— Harold Brandt, who had given up his starting quarterback role to Dave Fronek, came off the bench in the fourth period Saturday to lead defending Big Ten champion Wisconsin to a come-from-behind 17-14 victory over Northwestern.

The Badgers, plagued by six fumbles and two interceptions through the first three periods, rolled 89 yards for a touchdown midway through the fourth quarter to tie the score 14-14 and then, with less than two minutes to play, Fronek booted a 27-yard field goal for the victory in the Wisconsin homecoming game.

Bears Topped

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)— The University of Washington's Huskies, riding high on the road to the Rose Bowl, spotted California early leads twice Saturday, then came back to grind down the Golden Bears and win a wild 39-26 ball game.

With Bill Douglas engineering the plays, the hard hitting Huskies rode roughshod over the Bears through the last three quarters and had to punt only once all day.

The Huskies, going 0-7 and 7-14 in the early going, came back strong to take a 21-14 lead at halftime and maintained ball control completely after that. The Huskies piled up well over 500 yards passing and running.

Fullback Junior Coffey, ripping off tremendous yardage nearly every time he got the ball, scored once on a 12-yard run and another time on a one-yard plunge for the first two Husky touchdowns.

Utes Edged

WEST POINT, N.Y. (UPI)— Ken Waldrop rocketed eight yards for a touchdown and quarterback Carl Stichweh plunged for the gamely-favored Army a tight 6-7 victory over Utah Saturday.

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
