Gordy Kuit's Chiloquin Panthers got the big jump on the Bonanza Antlers at Henley Friday night via an 80-yard kickoff return for a touchdown to roll on to a 12-0 Klamath B League victory.

It was the second counting victory for the Panthers and the second of the season and made amends for a 7-7 deadlock in the previous meeting of the two teams.

For the Antlers, it was the fifth setback against one tie in league action.

Al Foreman gave the Panthers the big advantage on the opening kickoff of the final game for each team as he moved behind the wall the blockers set up and raced down the right sidelines to the first score of the game. The PAT attempt via a run failed and the Panthers owned an early 6-0 lead.

The two teams battled in the mud throughout the next two quarters before the Panthers struck again in the final stanza.

It was an 80-yard drive put together by the Chiloquin eleven carrying to the score as short gainers during the drive consumed a large portion of the time remaining.

Jim Bridge, the Panther called upon through most of the drive, carried over from the one-yard line for the second Chiloquin tally and a 12-0 lead.

The Panthers had threatened earlier in the contests as they drove to inside the Bonanza 20 before fumble ended the threat. Fumbles proved a vital factor in the contest, as both teams bobbled the ball five times, with the Panthers losing the ball three times and the Antlers twice.

The Antlers threatened in the final stages of the game as they recovered a Panther fumble on the 20 and two plays later gave the ball back to Chiloquin on another fumble.

Bridge was the biggest individual ground gainer as he totaled 172 yards during the evening.

The Panthers ended the game with a big margin in the total offense figures of 307 to 84 yards. The Panthers also collected 17 first downs to nine for the Antlers.

So ended the grid season for both teams, with the Panthers ending with an overall season record of 10-1.

An 18-game winning skein extending over a two-year period was completed by the Weed Cougars Friday night at home Dunsmuir Tigers, 22-6.

It was the passing of 5-8, 160-pound senior quarterback Larry Blankenship and the running of Omri Hildreth pacing the Cougars to their lopsided victory.

The triumph also gave the Cougars the Siskiyou County League title.

Hildreth scored twice in the run-away on joints of five and nine yards, while Blankenship passed for four touchdowns and Bob Delgado scored three times.

The Cougars completely dominated the contest as they amassed the overwhelming total of 512 yards rushing.

Hildreth paced the ground work with 194 yards in 18 carries and Delgado gained a total of 178 yards in 10 carries.

Tigers Upset

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UPI)—Once-beaten Harvard throttled Princeton's potent running game Saturday and tumbled the Tigers from the nation's thinning unbeaten ranks in a stunning 21-7 Ivy League upset.

The Harvard, who two weeks ago shattered Dartmouth's longest-in-the-nation major college winning streak, were handing Big Three rival Princeton its first loss after six straight victories.

Princeton had been one of three major unbeaten teams in the country going into the game. The Crimson, who pulled within half a game of still leading Princeton in the tight Ivy race, put together sustained drives of 66 and 52 yards in the first and third periods to win the game.

Miami Beach Boxing Commission Throws Out Referee's Ballot

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—The Miami Beach Boxing Commission Saturday threw out referee Cy Gottfried's score as "incorrect" and called Tony Alongi winner of the fight with George Chuvalo.

Alongi recovered from a third round knockdown to take a controversial split decision over hard punching heavyweight Chuvalo.

The commission said that Gottfried, who gave the fight to Alongi, had "scored his card incorrectly" after a protest was lodged by Chuvalo's Manager Ed Trotter and a hearing was held Saturday morning.

Gottfried and Judge Jim Ruby both gave the fight to Alongi 95-93, while Judge Bunny Lovitt

scored it 99-93. Chuvalo, The United Press International card had it 98-95 in the Canadian's favor.

The winner of the fight was to have received a crack at either Eddie Machen or Ernie Terrell in a nationally televised bout here Dec. 27.

Alongi's manager, Chuck Serriani, complained bitterly after Friday night's bout despite the fact that his fighter won.

"He's (Chuvalo) rough, tough and dirty... Tony was lucky," Serriani said.

Complaining about Chuvalo's rough tactics which lost points for the former Canadian heavy-weight champ and had referee Cy Gottfried warn him five times, Serriani said "I have

never seen anything like it."

"That guy committed so many fouls that they should have stopped the fight long before the last round was over."

"You know, Tony fought a good fight — Chuvalo is a tough man and a hard puncher — but to let a guy get away with rabbit punches and hitting on the break could hurt someone eventually."

"Tony was lucky he didn't get hurt."

Chuvalo, 26, who lost his first bout in six outings this year including a disputed rough-house decision over Mike DeJolin, seemed shocked when the decision was announced. It was the burly Toronto native's seventh loss in 31 pro fights.

State Prep Playoff Picture Set; Medford Takes Southern Title

By United Press International The lineup was set for the state class A-1 high school football playoffs next weekend, but not before one of the state's top-ranked teams was upset and several others received bad scares.

Defending champion Medford, Roseburg, North Salem, West Linn, and Beaverton all qualified for the playoffs Friday night, joining Pendleton, Grant and Parkrose.

Medford claimed the Southern Oregon title with a 13-9 win over Grants Pass. The Black Tornado, rated No. 1 in the state, will meet Roseburg there in the quarterfinals.

Roseburg, Lions Tie Roseburg and Cottage Grove tied for the Midwestern League

title Friday night, but the Indians got the playoff bid on the basis of a win over the Lions during the season. Roseburg rolled past Sheldon 33-13 and Cottage Grove topped Willamette 34-6.

Marshallfield, which had figured to make it a three-way tie for the title, was upset 13-7 by North Bend.

North Salem had to score in the fourth quarter to beat South Salem 13-7 and claim the Valley League championship. The Vikings will meet Intermountain League champion Pendleton at Pendleton next weekend.

The Buckaroos also were extended Friday night, edging Hermiston 7-0.

Beaverton Wins Title Beaverton wrapped up the

Metropolitan League crown with a 27-0 win over Centennial and will meet Wilco League champion Parkrose, which ripped Canby 26-6. West Linn collected the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley League crown by edging St. Helens 6-0. Its first playoff opponent will be Grant, the Portland champion, which downed Lincoln 17-7.

In the A-2 ranks, Williamina's 6-0 win over Yamhill-Carlton gave it the Yamama title. Phoenix, Douglas and Woodburn already have qualified for the playoffs and the other four teams will be decided by tonight.

The Mustangs came back to score first in the second half as a 72-yard drive was completed in 10 plays. It was a 15-yard run by Dale Parrish as the longest gain of the drive and finally Jack Worthington latching over from 15 yards out for the score. Parrish added the PAT on a run for a 24-7 score.

Three times the Huskies hit scoring territory in the first period and added another score in the second chapter and two more in the third stanza.

The Mustangs, not completely out of the picture in the third quarter, closed the score to 24-7 with their first touchdown and added a final score in the last period.

But the strong attack of the Huskies proved too much as they opened with a 30-yard aerial for the first score.

And it was a change from the usual for the Huskies in that quarterback Dale Kurtz was on the receiving end of the touchdown pass tossed by Ken Smith.

With the ball on the midfield stripe following the kickoff, Kurtz handed off to Smith on a fake sweep and the talented Huskie halfback moved to the right and hit Kurtz on the pass just beyond the line.

The southpaw field general gathered in the pass and raced the distance to the initial score.

The Huskies struck again following a Malih punt. Starting on their 48, the Huskies went the distance in five plays assisted by a 13-yard penalty assessed the Mustangs.

It was Smith taking the ball on the option from Kurtz and racing 20 yards to the score for a 12-0 count.

Following another Mustang punt, the Huskies hit paydirt again as they started on their 15 and moved the ball to the Merrill 45.

From this point, Smith went off right tackle the 65 yards for the score.

In the second stanza it was Bob Moore picking up 16 yards in the drive starting on the Merrill 26 and the final dash was a 52-yard run by Smith as he went on the dive play behind big blocking and went the distance.

An undefeated season was closed out by the Merrill Huskies Friday night as they rolled over the visiting Malin Mustangs, 38-13.

The potent Merrill offense left little doubt about the outcome of the contest as the Huskies moved a 24-0 halftime lead almost with ease.

Henley's Hornets headed for the Class A-2 state show at Coos Bay and went their first outing against Elmira before dropping the next two to Coquille and Vale in that order.

Merrill traveled to the Class B tournament again losing two straight to leave early.

Kent Gooding of the Hornets was the lone player to be selected for first team all-state honors.

Repeating Chances Look Good...

In collegiate play, Jim Partlow's Ows of Oregon Tech won their second consecutive conference crown, however, since not an official member of the NIAA — a situation too ridiculous to warrant discussion at this time, but at a later date — was unable to continue into the NIAA playoffs and the second place Oregon College Wolves were named to the berth.

The chances of these teams repeating? Henley and Merrill good, however, the Ows, having lost a starting five including such standouts as Willie Anderson and Sweet Sammy Smith, not so good.

And the chances of the Pelicans returning to the state show after an absence of a year, at this early stage, fifty-fifty.

As Al Keck says, "We should be strong on the boards and our offensive punch will have to be developed."

However the season ends and regardless of what teams advance into state tournaments, the fact remains the season not designed nor recommended for cardiac patients is here.

Of The Long Grid Season...

It's been a long season for Ross Cariaga and the Sacred Heart Trojans.

It's not easy for a team and coach to continue working all season long and to continue to take their lumps.

Such has been the grid season just completed by the Trojans.

Losses by a close score are not quite so bad. A one-point or one-touchdown difference between a pair of teams can normally offer a possible reason for the loss.

However, losses such as handed the Trojans — most by large margins — are real difficult to take.

In the case of the Sacred Heart eleven, a couple of good reasons might be offered:

One would be the fact the Trojans were competing in A-2 ball for only the second year and the school is the smallest in the league and the other fact the Trojans counted a turnout of 28 which dwindled to 21 at season's end with just three seniors.

Thus the tiger from Oregon State is looking to better things next year and rightly so.

Cariaga will have at least 18 players who have gained valuable experience in a losing season — learning how to compensate for any situation. And a vital lesson in how to lose or even be clobbered and still come back for more.

No Excuses From Cariaga...

The Trojan mentor is the last person to offer excuses for losses.

He doesn't like to make excuses — to him they're easy to use. Still, on behalf of himself and the players certain factors should be revealed.

The Sacred Heart Academy is the smallest in the eight-team Rogue Valley loop, with an approximate population of 200.

Slightly more than a Class B school which it had been since the start of sports activities.

The Academy was originally a girls school and the result is the school counts a wide margin of girls compared to boys to this day.

Turnouts have been small as witness the 28 counted this year.

However, neither the Trojans returning nor Cariaga are completely discouraged.

As stated, all but three on this year's team which learned in the "school of hard knocks" are returning.

"We have players who have learned to hit hard and tackle hard and this will help us considerably next year," Cariaga offers. "And, they want to play football," he adds.

These two attributes plus the "learning" season could prove to be a large problem for Trojan opponents come another grid season.

Perhaps A Good Match...

A wire story a couple of weeks ago offered the news that "... unbeaten Temple and Delaware are among the teams being considered for the Liberty Bowl."

If such a game were to come off, the Blue Hens might have the last cackle.
