Soil Study Initiated
LAKEVIEW—The upper division of the vocational agriculture classes at Lakeview High School began the study of soils on Oct. 1. Sophomores, juniors and seniors are participating in the study.

In this area they are studying soil composition, structure, soil nutrients, and soil properties. They have also learned to make soil tests for nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium.

On Friday, Oct. 4, the three classes went on a field trip to the chapter farm and then to the farm of Jack Radford. They were accompanied by Oris Rudd and Bill Messer, county extension agents, who showed the boys how to take a soil sample, fill out the information card, and send it to Oregon State University. Putting this information to use, the classes are taking soil samples of their farms to determine fertilizer needs.

Anyone desiring a soil test by the students should contact the Vo-Ag department of the Lakeview High School.

Pupils Seek Devil, Bugs
Devils glared from the Sacred Heart Academy bulletin boards, history lined the halls, and sophomore biologists searched all corners for insects during September and October.

The devil, as treated in various forms of literature, became a topic of prime interest among junior English students during the first term.
