Ecumenical Council Fathers Disagree On When Elderly Bishops Should Retire

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Ecumenical Council fathers engaged today in an emotional debate over whether bishops should be forced to resign when they become too old to govern their dioceses.

Some fathers strongly urged a mandatory retirement age of 75. Others were vehemently opposed to any kind of pressure on an aging bishop to give up his diocese.

Archbishop Michele Gonzi of Malta, who is 78, told the council with great emotion that a compulsory retirement age would "put bishops in the same category with civil service officials." He said he was appalled at the idea of forcing a bishop to "break his bonds with his beloved diocese."

Bishop Albert Conrad De Vito, 56, of Lucknow, India, also deplored compulsory retirement. He said that many bishops would be deprived of any means of financial support and would have to "live like Lazarus, begging crumbs from the rich man's table." He said a bishop who is the father of his diocese "and aged parents have a right to live in their own home and to expect their children to support them even if they are sick and feeble."

But Archbishop Corrado Minico, 62, of Monreale, Italy, arguing for compulsory retirement, said that the majority of prelates are unable to function efficiently after 75. Asking them to resign voluntarily when they grow too old won't work, he said, because old age tends to tie a man to his office and to give him a feeling he is indispensable.

aged bishops that they will be left penniless if they retire. Fernando Cardinal Cento of the Roman curia intervened in today's debate to propose the establishment of a sort of ecclesiastical social security fund.

He suggested that all bishops of the world contribute to a common fund during their active years and that this fund be used to provide adequate retirement pensions.

Although retirement was the Council's pending business today, two cardinals took advantage of the considerable latitude allowed prelates of their rank to get in a few verbal licks on the basic dispute between liberals and conservatives over the doctrine that bishops have

a right to share with the Pope in the government of the church.

Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York, reflecting conservative distaste for this doctrine of "collegiality," told the council that from what he has read in the newspapers it needs to be emphasized that the Pope still possesses "full and total power" in the Catholic Church and he does not need the help of bishops or anyone else to exercise it.

W. B. Eddie, 45, of Henderson, Ky., was hauling his rig behind a car driven by Pvt. Richard T. Dillard, 20, and his wife, Carolyn, 19, who were on

their way home in Memphis from Ft. Campbell, Ky. The car blew a tire and crashed through a bridge, plunged down an embankment and landed in the path of a fast-moving Louisville & Nashville passenger train.

"I was scared to death it wouldn't stop," said Eddie. He whipped out two flares from his truck and dashed down to the tracks where he waved the train down. It stopped and trainmen helped him pull the couple from the wrecked car.
